Children Need Health Protection In Winter, Too

Young children may suffer as uch from winter illnesses as they o from those commonly known as summer complaints," in the opinon of Dr. George W. Cox. state nealth officer, and his advice to parents as the winter season aproaches is to guard babies and young children against these winer health hazards.

Influenza, tonsilitis, pneumonia. ronchitis, and asthma are included among those disease which may be dangerous winter illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such disease as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold. they may follow as an after effect of measles or whooping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. These diseases of the respiratory system are more prevalent in winter than in summer and are much more difficult to combat than digestive ailments such as summer complaint.

"These winter diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children," Dr. Cox stated. Nearly all of them are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and



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

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
