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Important Issues To Be Decided In Election Tuesday

Eastland County voters will go to the polls next Tuesday and again on Thursday, probably in small numbers, to vote on state questions of major import, and without doubt to elect Democratic nominees who already are "in" this Democratic state.

The general election will be held Tuesday, and voters may cast their ballots at the same polling places as in the primaries. The special election Thursday will be held in the same manner.

Except for the routine of scratching candidates of the Republican, Prohibition, Socialist, etc., parties Tuesday, voters will have little to do except decide on three important amendments to the Texas Constitution.

The first is a plan to authorize payment of \$75,000 for a building at John Tarleton College, Stephenville, that was built nine years ago but could not be paid for because of a clerical error.

The second amendment authorizes a pension and retirement system for state and county employees.

The third, and possibly most important in affecting the people as a whole, would freeze gasoline taxes for building and maintaining highways, except that one-fourth would continue to go to the common school fund.

Then on Thursday, in an election which is necessary because of another error in Austin, a fourth constitutional amendment will be voted on—one authorizing the state to issue \$25,000,000 in bonds to buy land for resale to World War II veterans on long, easy terms.

One important function of the so-called "Good Roads Amendment," the third on the ballot in Tuesday's election, will be to provide permanently that the state shall continue to pay on principal and interest of county and road district road bonds voted prior to Jan. 2, 1935.

In Eastland County, this will be a great relief, since the state funds now are paying the major portion of a large amount of old Eastland County road bonds, but authorization for such payment must be renewed each two years by the Legislature and such renewal might be forgotten in some "error" some time.

The good roads amendment's first portion reads:

"The Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1935, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the State's credit for any purpose."

Schools Of County Receive \$19,803

Schools of Eastland county recently received checks totalling \$19,803 as the first payment on this year's state apportionment of \$30 per scholar, said County School Supt. Homer Smith.

The sum received represents a \$3 payment on each of the county's 6601 eligible school students. This figure represents an increase over the school census of 6532 at the same time a year ago.

Eastland schools received \$2283 of the apportionment, based on 761 scholars. At the same time a year ago, the scholars in the local schools numbered 758.

Mavericks Win From Dublin 31-0; To Play Comanche

The Eastland Mavericks gained their first victory of the season in convincing manner last week by thumping Dublin, 31 to 0, and will seek to stretch their victory string to two at 7:30 p. m. Friday in a conference game at Comanche.

Time of the game was changed to 7:30 because of the shortening of the days, and it was announced by Eastland school officials that from now on all night games will begin at 7:30.

The Mavericks will be favored to win from Comanche just about any way they want to.

The Eastland Municipal Band will accompany the team to Comanche, and a large turnout of local fans is expected.

In the Dublin game the Maverick second team played a large part of the time, and made a showing that was outstanding. In fact, a good many spectators felt that the second stringers could have won without any help.

The first string gained almost at will when not fumbling, and scored all the touchdowns that counted, except one.

Dublin, with only four reserves on the bench, never threatened.

Three Eastland plays that went for apparent touchdowns were called back for rules infractions or other causes.

About 1500 people saw the game.

The Mavericks marched for a score 30 yards the first time they got the ball and could hold it, with Blair going over from the three. A few minutes later another goalward thrust was stopped on the Dublin 23 by a fumble, but the Mavericks soon afterward took a Dublin pass on their own 40 and drove the 60 yards in three plays, with Billy Brasher passing to Lewis Crossley for the final 34 yards.

Before long, Eastland recovered a fumble on the Dublin 14, and Billy Eddleman ran it to the one on the old Statue of Liberty play, three downs produced no results, and on fourth down Coach Johnny Little ran in the second team, with Johnny Hicks directing the play. Blair promptly went over.

The next time Eastland got the ball, Jimmy Mathews took off on a quarterback sneak play from the Eastland 33 to the Dublin 5, for a total gain of 62 yards, and in three plays Hicks went over.

The next and last score that counted was almost a repetition of the second as Brasher passed to Crossley who scampered over for a total gain of 43 yards. Brasher kicked the point, the only one made.

The second team showed up well during most of the part of the game it played. Especially outstanding were the play of Jimmy Doss, Jack Chamberlain and Dick Sparks. Chamberlain caught one 25-yard pass, and Sparks caught a Dublin pass and returned it for one of the scores that was called back. Doss was outstanding as a defensive player.

First down were 17 for Eastland to two for Dublin.

Survivors include a son, J. H. Armstrong of Eastland, two daughters, Mrs. Pruitt Dawson and Mrs. Paul Lane both of Carlsbad, N. M., and several grandchildren.

Benefit Football Game Set Here November 14

All boys enrolled in the clubs will carry on projects with poultry, swine, sheep, goats, dairy cattle, beef cattle, any field crop, or a garden. Requirements are that each club member own and care for his project or projects and keep accurate records of his work under supervision of his parents, local leader, or the county agent.

S. and Young School, Ranger; Morton Valley School; Carbon High School and Carbon Grammar School; Gorman Grammar School; Desdemona High School and Desdemona Grammar School; Pioneer School; Rising Star Grammar School; Scranton High School and Scranton Grammar School.

Cattle Grub Treating To Be Demonstrated

Ranchers and cattle owners of Eastland County were invited this week to attend a cattle grub control demonstration on the Dan Childress Ranch five miles north of Cisco at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday.

County Agent J. M. Cooper will demonstrate on 25 head of cattle.

Children told Cooper that after treating his cattle twice last fall and winter with a rotenone-sulphur mixture such as will be used Tuesday, his cattle are in good shape and have not been bothered with heel flies much.

Cooper said cattle should be treated three times with the mixture at 25-day intervals. Treated cattle will produce more meat and milk, he said.

Tax Sale Scheduled At Courthouse Here On January 7th

The first tax sale under the Eastland County tax collection program being conducted by Horace Walker, special tax attorney, will be held at the Courthouse steps Jan. 7, beginning at 10 a. m., Walker said this week.

Orders of sale were issued Oct. 17 on 195 lots and tracts of land in Eastland County, to be sold at the sale. All but one are located in Ranger, the exception being acreage at Rising Star.

Walker said that other tax suits are now being prepared for filing "in the immediate future," and that "all the delinquent taxes will be collected or the property sold."

The program here has gone very well, so far, Walker said, with over \$300,000 in delinquent taxes collected.

Vets Wanting Homes Urged To Get Priority

Word was received this week by H. J. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, that buildings in Camp Berkeley, Abilene, probably will be sold in a short time to veterans.

Under the plan as explained to Tanner, the buildings likely will be sold in place, to be torn down by purchasers. Tanner suggested that two or more veterans might bid on a building and each get necessary materials for a home from it.

However, bidding veterans must have an HH priority, he said. Forms for applying for the priority are in Tanner's office. He urged speed for veterans who wish to bid on the Berkeley buildings.

S. P. Crawley Services Are Held At Kokomo

O. J. Rea Is Owner Of New Industry; Machinery Here

Work was under way this week on construction of a building block-making plant adjacent to the new Texas Light Weight Aggregate Company Haydite plant in Eastland.

The new plant will make pressurized concrete blocks with Haydite as a base material.

Owner of the new firm is O. J. Rea, formerly of Clifton. Rea has his block-making machine on hand, and is making preparations for installing it on land obtained from the Haydite manufacturing firm, and just north of the Haydite plant.

Rea said his initial investment will be about \$20,000. He will make about 2,000 lightweight Haydite blocks a day, enough to build outside walls for two five-room houses each day, or enough each day to build a five-room house completely of Haydite blocks.

He said the plant will employ six to eight men.

Although no Haydite has been produced in the aggregate plant since a trial run on Oct. 1, President C. W. Cline this week said he believed the plant would be on a regular production schedule next week, and would be in full operation by Nov. 15.

Most of the plant's machinery is in place, but the screening probably will not be in operation until the middle of the month, Cline said.

Eastland Falls Short Of USO Drive Goal

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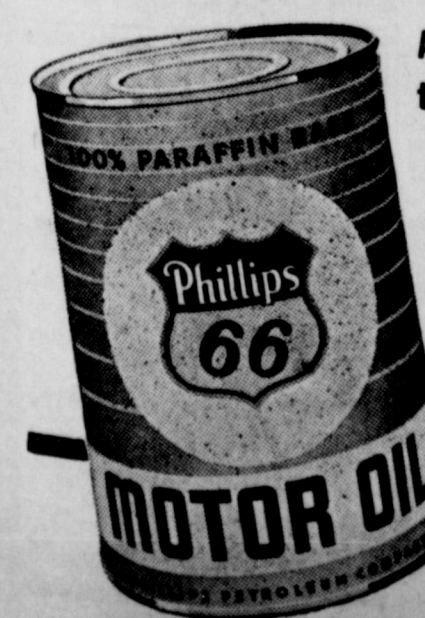

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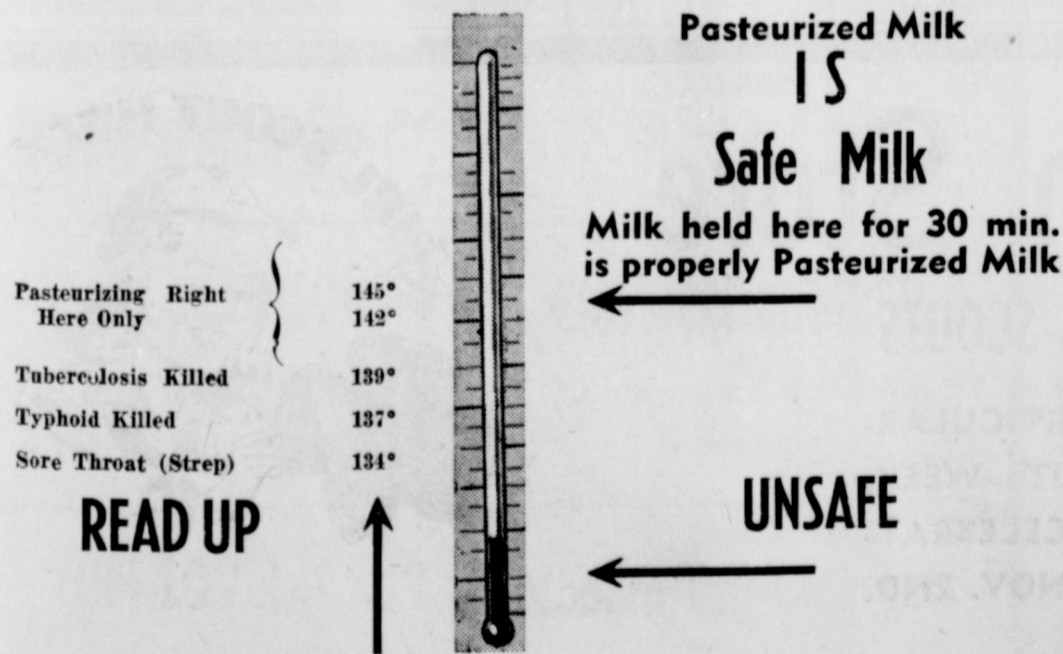
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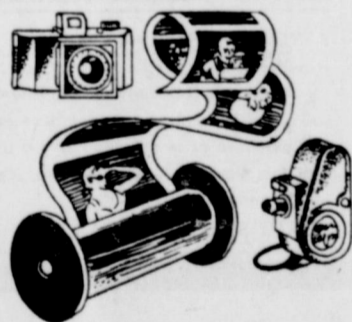

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. When should lights be turned on laying hens?

A. Lights should be turned on when the days begin to get shorter than 12 hours, in order to provide a 13 to 14 hour day.

Q. At what age should pigs be wormed?

A. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company recommends that pigs be wormed at about 12 weeks of age, or when they weigh between 45 and 65 lbs.

Q. What is the best age to vaccinate calves for Bang's disease?

A. Calves should be vaccinated between the ages of four and eight months, although six months is the preferable age.

Q. How much water will growing turkeys consume?

A. An easy figure to remember is that turkeys consume about two pounds of water for every pound of feed.

Q. What is the proper way of marking rabbits for identification?

A. Breeding stock should be marked for purposes of identification and record-keeping by tattooing the ears. Numbers and letters are tattooed on the inner surface of the ears by means of a hand or an electric tattooing needle.
