Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Miller spent Sunday night with the John Tucker family.

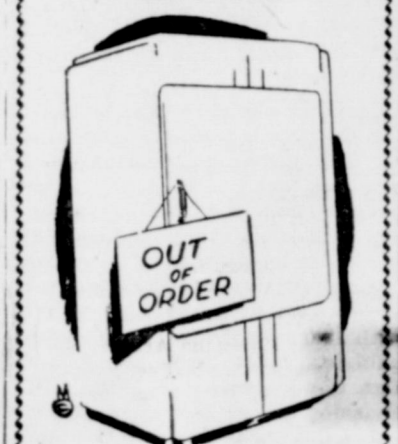
Raymond Case suffered a severe boil on his cheek last week, made him look as if he had a run through the thrasher.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE, USE, AND DISCHARGE OF FIRECRACKERS, TORPEDOS OR OTHER DETONATORS WITHIN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, FIXING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION I: No person shall hereafter sell, use, or discharge any kind of firecracker, torpedo, or other detonator within the City of Eastland, Texas.

SECTION II: Any person violating the foregoing provision of this ordinance shall be punished by fine of not more than twenty-five and no-100 (\$25.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in jail for not more than five (5) days, or by both such imprisonment and fine.

SECTION III: The fact that there is no effective penal ordinance of the City of Eastland covering the above subject, and the fact that the sale, use and discharge of firecrackers, torpedoes, and other detonators constitutes a fire hazard and danger to the public health and safety of the City and its peoples, creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule requiring an ordinance to be read and passed at several meetings, and this ordinance shall be in force upon passage and publication as provided by the charter of the City of Eastland.
