All three of the amendments apparently carried, on the basis of statewide returns.

GI Flying School **Building Planned**

Plans for erection of a 20x60 foot tile and concrete classroom and office building at the Eastland Municipal Airport to house the GI flying school soon to open there were disclosed this week by City Manager K .B. Tanner.

Tanner said he had been assured the government would pay half the cost of erecting the building. under its airport improvement program. Revenues from the school would pay out the other half in little more than a year, Tanner said. Classes in the school to be oper-

Tanner said nothing definite has been done on the building yet, but that he expects to ask bids soon.
