And well he might, because an awkward situation had arisen for once in a game with which he had no connection at all, and for once he could just sit and watch without being compelled to do anything at all about it.

Which reminds me once more that the life of a football coach is a hard life, but Little says he likes it.

Morton Valley 4-H Girl Wins State Honor

Delores Fay Williamson of the Morton Valley 4-H Club was announced this week as the winner of a \$50 War Bond as state winner in the Individual Dairy Foods Contest.

Delores Fay, member of the 4-H Club for five years, was dairy demonstrator for her club and made milk drinks, followed correct practices in the care of milk utensils, and prepared milk and cheese dishes during the year. She also gave a demonstration on the care of milk utensils to fellow members of the Morton Valley club.

She gave the Dairy Foods Demonstration on 4-H Rally Day. She conducted the demonstration as a Snack Bar. She exhibited a tray of party pick-ups made with cheese, including rainbow and other small sandwiches, potato chips spread with cream cheese, and prunes stuffed with cheese, and gave directions for making. Last she mixed two milk drinks, a grape blossom and an apricot color made with ice cream. After the demonstration she invited club members to come by the bar and have a snack.

Over 500 Attend Livestock Raisers' Barbecue Here

Over 500 cattlemen, farmers, and business men from all parts of the county were guests of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association at the annual barbecue at the City Park in Eastland Thursday night of last week.

The group feasted on barbecue beef, goats, bread, pickles, beans, onions, and coffee, prepared and served by members of the association, formed four years ago to help promote the livestock industry in the county.

Dan Childress, former past president of the association, acted as master of ceremonies following the feed. Those on the program were Fred Brown, Eastland banker and cattlemen and an officer of the association; J. M. Sauls, Cisco, who informed the group that the new livestock show barn constructed this summer in Cisco was ready for the show on Feb. 21 and 22, and invited all members to bring animals to the show; Judge Clyde Grissom, Eastland, appeals court justice and Hereford breeder who told the group of the future possibilities of such an organization, and L. R. Pearson, Ranger, oil man, lawyer and rancher. Pearson commented on the better quality of cattle found in Eastland County today compared with a few short years ago. M. E. Fry, Cisco new president of the association, was introduced and spoke briefly to the group. Fry, formerly of Brown County, is a breeder of Polled Herefords.

Childress thanked the committee composed of C. M. McCain, Pete Tindall, Sid Arthur, Jr., Brandy Humphries, and Hoyt Davis of Eastland and George Fee and Sutton Crofts of Cisco for their work in the preparation of the barbecue and trimmings.

He also thanked several commercial concerns for donations of paper plates, paper cups, coffee, and other commodities.

An invitation was extended to anyone in the group to join the association at the conclusion, and many of those present joined.

The barbecue is an annual affair and usually held at the City Park in Eastland.

One of the foremost objectives of the association was accomplished when the new show barn was built near Cisco. Eastland, Ranger and Cisco were invited by the association to submit plans and proposals for such a show barn where an annual show in that city for the next five years.

13 Girls' 4-H Clubs Formed In County

Thirteen girls' 4-H Clubs have been organized for the coming year in Eastland County, with a total of 272 members, it was announced this week.

The clubs are at Gorman, Olden High, Olden Grade, Ranger Hodges Oak Park, Ranger Young, Scranton, Desdemona Grade, Desdemona High, Carbon Grade, Carbon High, Morton Valley, Pioneer, and Rising Star.

Members of the club selected Food Preparation and Clothing as the two demonstrations for the year. The club will have two meetings a month. The county home demonstration agent will meet with each club once a month, and the club sponsor once a month.

In planning programs for the year, the girls decided to work on a point basis. Club members will score each goal completed, and points will be given. Demonstrations on stenciling with textile paints and making aprons are being given this month.

Work To Begin In Clothing Factory In About Week

Stanley B. Hertz and Lester Green, in charge of putting in the new brassiere plant of the Hollywood Corset Company in Eastland, were on the job this week, and Hertz said the plant would be in operation in a week or so.

Mrs. Eunice Jones, in charge of the company's affiliated plant in Hollywood, Calif., will arrive Monday to supervise hiring of workers for the new plant, and on the following Monday Mrs. Eleanor Cunningham, in charge of the Arkadelphia, Ark., plant, will arrive to give instructions on the sewing operations that will be a large part of the work of the plant here.

Hertz said the plant will start out with only about 10 employees, and as these are trained the force will be enlarged until ultimately 70 to 75 women will be employed.

Employment applications are being taken at the local U. S. Employment office.

The plant, in the lower floor of the Masonic Building, converted by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce into an industrial site, will be one of the most modern in this section. The women will have fully adequate neon lighting, Hertz said, all rooms will be air conditioned, and a large lounge room has been built in the new part of the building, and will be furnished. The room has baby blue walls.

Taxpayers Already In With \$125,306.93

Eastland County taxpayers already have paid \$125,306.93 of their 1946 state and county tax bill, or 72.39 per cent of the \$173,094.39 total bill, Tax Assessor-Collector Neil Day said this week.

Most of the large taxpayers and many other paid in October to take advantage of the three per cent discount offered then, he said. Tax collections for the current year began Oct. 1.

Day reminded those who have not paid the remaining \$47,784.46 of 1946 taxes that they will receive a discount of 2 per cent if the taxes are paid in November and 1 per cent if paid in December.

Winter Cover Crop Approval Suggested

Winter cover crops should be planted now, but under AAA regulations, approval of the county committee must be obtained before any practices are carried out under the 1946 or 1947 program, AAA Administrator Emmitt Powell said this week.

Approval is necessary so money can be set aside to aid in paying for the practices, he said. Although many farmers have approval, Powell said he felt sure that there are many more who plan to plant cover crops and have not obtained approval. Those who plan to sow cover crops and have not obtained approval were urged to contact the county AAA office.

Hart Bowman of Dallas, father of Howell and president of the school here, was in Eastland Monday and said he was greatly pleased with the way things have gone so far.

He said arrangements are being made to teach the general public, as well as veterans, how to fly.

Legislative Costs To Be High, Lions Told By Pearson

Despite any efforts that may be made in the opposite direction, the forthcoming session of the Texas Legislature may be the most expensive in the history of the state, State Rep. L. R. Pearson of Ranger told Eastland Lions Tuesday.

Stressing that he was not speaking in his official capacity, and that any remarks he made were merely the result of things he has heard here and there, Pearson nevertheless had some pertinent and revealing things to say of the coming session and of the legislative picture in general.

After a term as a legislator, he said he would be in favor, he now thinks, of halving the size of the Texas House of Representatives and lengthening the time of the biennial session. Too much rush is in evidence now and too many mistakes made, such as the one that caused counties of the state to spend over \$200,000 on a special election last week, he said.

As to the cost of the coming session, Pearson said the state now has in its general fund a record sum of about \$30,000,000, but that the money will melt away under the flood of demands to be made on the legislators by teachers, old age pensioners, state institutions, the State Department of Health, and others. And, he said, all of the requests for more funds will have good, solid, justifiable arguments behind them.

Pearson also said that the matter of a state university for the colored race is sure to come up and to get serious attention, since if Texas does not provide such an institution, the federal courts are apt to force present all-white graduate schools of the University of Texas to accept colored applicants.

However, at the end of his talk, Pearson said that he was not predicting what would happen, because "no man can predict the actions of the Texas Legislature or of Texas weather."

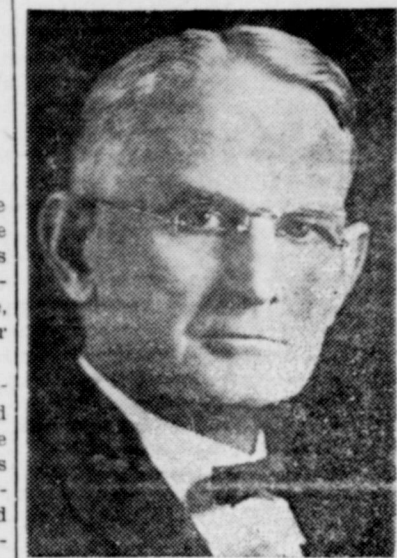
Because of the weather, many entries failed to appear, but approximately 30 were on hand. The hard wind caused numerous crack-ups among the little planes.

Eastland's Bid For UN Headquarters Again Considered

Eastland's bid for the United Nations headquarters, sent last March and given little attention then, was getting more notice this week after the whole matter was reopened by the U. S. State Dept.

The invitation was sent by unanimous vote of the directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. However an answering telegram from Senator Tom Connally of Texas said he believed there was small chance of Eastland being considered.

The chance may still be small, but is somewhat better, as may be seen from the following Associated Press dispatch carried this week in Texas newspapers:

"LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 13—An invitation from the Chamber of Commerce at Eastland, Texas, will be among the bids received for permanent homesite of the United Nations when the world organizations headquarters committee meets Wednesday to consider the long pending problem."

"Although offers have been received from 19 states, delegates were in general agreement that that the field has been narrowed to five sites.

"They are Westchester County, New York, New York City, San Francisco, Boston and Philadelphia.

"The Eastland invitation was received at United Nations headquarters March 18."

C Of C Directors Welcome New Doctor

Mavericks To Go To Hamilton For Game Tonight

Their hopes of a district title dashed when an eligibility dispute was settled in favor of De Leon, the Eastland Mavericks will be gunning for second place in the district when they meet Hamilton in Hamilton at 7:30 p. m. Friday.

Last Friday at home the Mavericks snowed under the Hico Tigers 51 to 0.

The eligibility question came up over Cled Heathington, De Leon player who previously had played basketball for Duster. The district committee in an afternoon meeting at De Leon Tuesday decided Heathington was eligible, and that was that.

A special bus will carry Eastland rooters to the game at Hamilton, expected to be another victim of the Mavericks but not near as easy one as was Hico.

In that game, played in Eastland the local team ran up a 19 to 0 score in the first quarter, a 32 to 0 score at the half, and coasted in the second team playing most of the last half.

Although outclassed, Hico managed to threaten two or three times.

Eastland touchdowns were scored by Bobby Blair, on a 10-yard gallop; Billy Eddleman, on the receiving end of a flea-flicker pass; Dick Sparks, after a lateral from Blair who had taken a Johnny Hicks pass; Hicks, on a 15-yard dash after picking up a fumble; Jimmy Mathews, on a six-yard scamper; Billy Brasher, on a plunge through the line, and then again on a 45-yard, weaving broken-field runback of a punt, and Jack Chamberlain, on a yard plunge.

Billy Johnson kicked three of the points after the eight touchdowns.

The Mavericks in the Hamilton game will be pointing toward Cisco which looked very good Monday in downing Ranger 38 to 12 on the Ranger field.

Eastland supporters of the Mavericks who saw the game, and there were many, left with faint hopes that Eastland could come out of the Cisco game with more than a respectable loss.

The game with Cisco will be played in Eastland Thursday night Nov. 21.

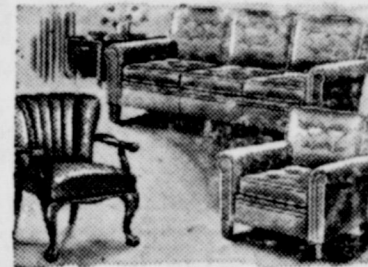

Hunters Warned Against Ticks, Fever Carriers

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—With the hunting season now open, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging that all hunters or other persons spending time in wooded areas use all possible precautions against being bitten by ticks which may infect the victim with relapsing fever. He further advises that when a tick is found, it be removed from the body as soon as possible and that care be taken not to crush the ticks in handling them.

Relapsing fever, commonly called Dr. Cox explained, "either from the bite of infected ticks or by absorbing the infectious material through breaks or scratches in the skin." According to Dr. Cox, the disease does not spread from person to person by direct contact but only through the bite of an infected tick or body louse. Prompt removal of the insect is of the utmost importance.

Relapsing fever, commonly called tick-bite fever, is characterized by sudden onset, intense headache located in the front part of the head and pains in the back and limbs. The fever lasts from three to five days before slowly declining. The temperature will then remain normal for about a week when the fever repeats itself. There may be three, four, or even more such relapses, which accounts for the name of the disease.

Dr. Cox said that the wearing of suitable clothing so as to prevent ticks getting next to the skin is of importance in the prevention of this disease. The insects may be removed with the fingers but the use of tweezers is recommended since this helps to prevent leaving the head embedded in the skin. After removing or handling a tick, the hands should be washed carefully with soap and warm water.

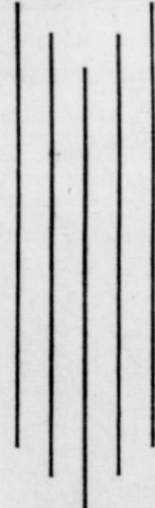

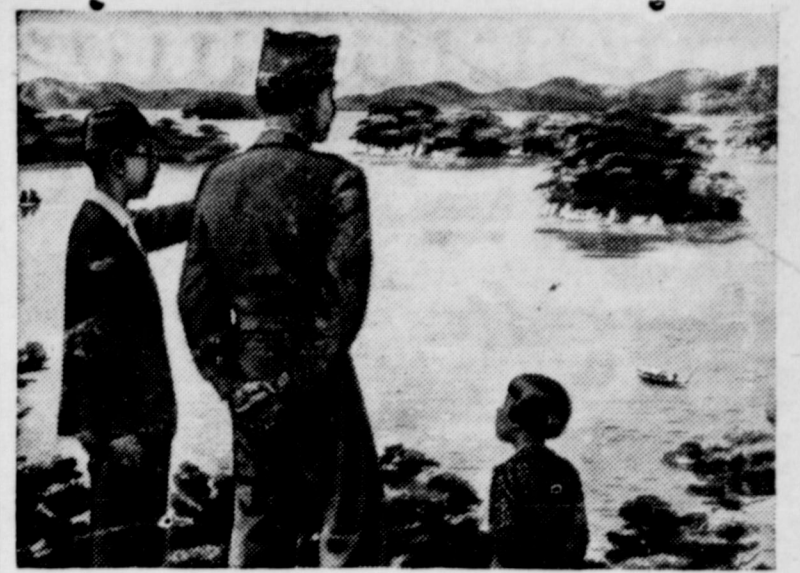

ORDINANCE
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE, USE, AND DISCHARGE OF FIRECRACKERS, TORPEDOES OR OTHER DETONATORS WITHIN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, FIXING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION I: No person shall hereafter sell, use, or discharge any kind of firecracker, torpedo, or other detonator within the City of Eastland, Texas.

SECTION II: Any person violating the foregoing provision of this ordinance shall be punished by fine of not more than twenty-five and no-100 (\$25.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in jail for not more than five (5) days, or by both such imprisonment and fine.

SECTION III: The fact that there is no effective penal ordinance of the City of Eastland covering the above subject, and the fact that the sale, use and discharge of firecrackers, torpedoes, and other detonators constitutes a fire hazard and danger to the public health and safety of the City and its peoples, creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule requiring an ordinance to be read and passed at several meetings, and this ordinance shall be in force upon passage and publication as provided by the charter of the City of Eastland.


