BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY 341tc COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EAST-LAND. TEXAS: SECTION I: No person shall hereafter sell, use, or discharge

any kind of firecracker, torpedo, or other detonator within the City of Eastland. Texas.

SECTION II: Any person violating the foregoing provision of this ordinance shall be punished by fine of not more than twenty-five and no-100 (\$25.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in jail for not more than five (5) days, or by both such imprisonment and fine.
