IS NOTHING SACRED from the Supreme Court? Recently the nation's highest court ruled that Rotary Clubs must admit women.

This was the result of nine years of litigation, in which the Supreme Court rejected the concept of Rotary as a "private men's club."

Within a week of the court's decision regarding Rotary, the area's Lions Clubs have received instructions from their International headquarters advising them to admit women if any wish to join. Apparently, the Lions would rather switch than fight.

But the court's decision may change the entire concept of some of our civic clubs. There have always been men's clubs such as Lions and Rotary, and women's clubs. Most of the men we know wouldn't want to join a woman's club, and likewise, most women would rather find a club of her own that she could attend and support.

Most Rotarians have been upset about the Supreme Court's ruling. One angrily predicted that the Boy Scouts would be the next institution to be challenged by the female invasion. "You take a bunch of fellows and you drop a woman in the middle and there is a chemical change," said Rotary International president-elect Charles Keller.

The decision came due to a small Rotary Club in California which decided to admit women, so as not to lose their club, whose membership had dwindled to eight. That set off the fight within the Rotary organization which eventually led to the Supreme Court having to serve as referee.

Will men attempt to invade the all-female service groups? If so, they may have a fight on their hands. Several all-female organizations, including Altrusa International, Pilot and Zonta, have warned the Supreme Court that they want men to stay out of their organizations, to "preserve their character, intent and identity."

As president of the Friona Evening Lions, ye editor was reading the recommendation from Lions International to our local members, in regard to admitting women if they attempted to join.

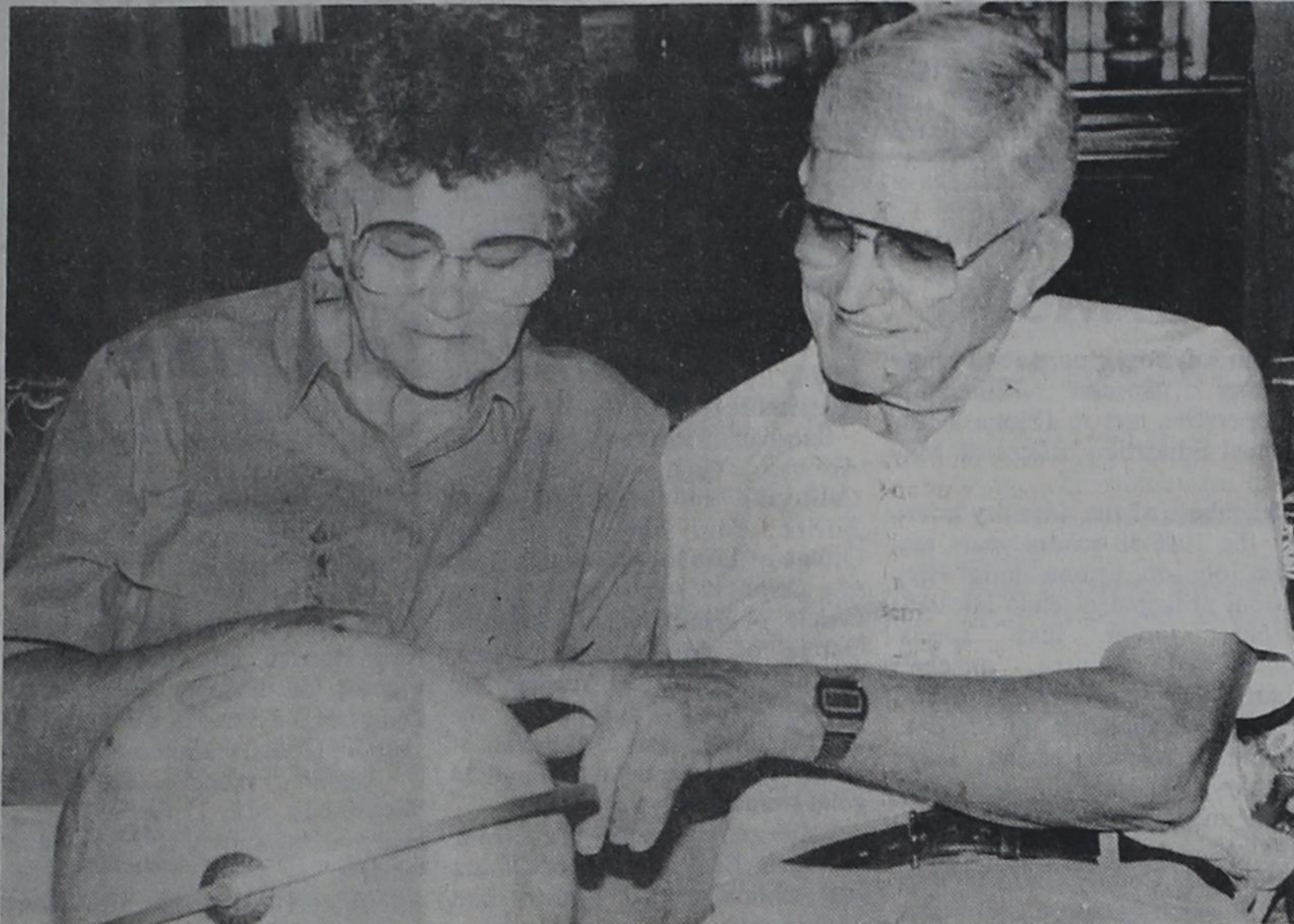

**Bill Will
Authorize
Funds**

The House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee passed a bill on May 6 that would require counties and municipalities to use a percentage of funds collected from property seized from drug offenders to fund community-based drug abuse prevention and treatment services.

Sponsored by Larry Don Shaw (D-Big Spring), House Bill 1120 amends the Controlled Substances Act to increase the amount of money available for prevention and treatment from the current 10 percent to 25 percent of the funds from these seizures. The legislation also mandates rather than allows, the use of funds for this purpose.

AUSTRALIAN TRIP

Ezells Give Report On 'Down Under'

Gene and Genevieve Ezell have returned recently from a trip to New Zealand and Australia. In their many miles of traveling around the world, they said this was perhaps the most scenic trip they had taken.

They flew to Los Angeles, California, then on to Sydney, Australia, where they took a two day tour and visited the capital, Canberra. The people there spoke English, but the Ezells said the natives had difficulty understanding their Texas drawl.

While there they saw many sheep ranches and watched the trained sheep and sheep dogs. They saw many kangaroos and Koala bears.

They took a bus tour of 3,106 miles in New Zealand and saw many interesting sights during their 12-day tour.

The Ezells first took a city tour of Auckland including the waterfront, panoramic view of the Queen City from the top of Mt. Eden, and extinct volcano. They drove through the lovely Auckland Domain before heading south through the dairy rich grasslands of the Waikato Province Nigaruawakia, centre for Maori culture and the home of the Maori Queen.

They took a guided boat tour of the Waitomo Caves. This was an area with huge caves that were lit by the bodies of thousands of glow-worms clinging to the cave walls. The Ezells said they actually looked like stars and these stalagmites and stalactites have been growing there undisturbed for millions of years. They said the Maoris people knew they were there but were too wary of the so called "cave monsters" to go inside.

world famous thermal region. They stayed at a travel lodge in Roturua, a high quality retreat with its own thermal pool. Following dinner that evening they were entertained by the Maori Concert.

The next day they visited Whakarewarewa Thermol Reserve with its boiling mud pools and geysers. They visited the Maori village where they saw many arts and crafts.

At Agrodome they saw both rainbow and brown trout in their natural habitat at Rainbow Springs.

The Ezells then went south through man-made pine forests, important in the pulp and paper industry. They arrived at the fascinating Wairaker Steam Valley where geo-thermal energy is harnessed to provide electricity in a unique power project that interests experts all over the world.

They saw the spectacular Huka Falls and passed around the shores of Lake Taupo, New Zealand's largest fresh water lake, a favorite spot for campers and fly-shing fishing.

They then left the volcanic central plateau traveling south along the Desert Road, in this case the "desert" has been caused by the effects of the volcanic ash.

Before embarking on their inter-island cruise ship to South Island, a brief sightseeing tour was taken by the group of the dramatic city of Wellington, the Nation's capital, where steep bush-clad hills enforce a tight city-scape and provide opportunity for resourceful domestic architecture.

The next morning they drove to the Buller Gorge to join the West Coast and they passed the old gold-mining town of Charleston. They spent the night at the Ashley Motor Inn, close to the beach, with an indoor heated pool and spa.

The following day Gene and Genevieve took a short drive to Shantytown where an old gold-mining town had been recreated. Here they had a chance to try their luck at gold-panning and to explore this little village.

They traveled south and passed lakes Lanthe and Mapourika before seeing the Franz Josef Glacier, then entered the Westland National Park.

The next day they traveled across the Haast River Bridge and Clark Bluff to the gates of Haast along one of the most exciting scenic roads ever built. They traveled along the shores of Lake Wanaka and Hawea and on to Arrowtown, an important area of gold mining history. That night they stayed at Lake Regency where

the rooms had a million-dollar view from balconies overlooking beautiful Lake Wakatipu.

The next day they viewed unforgettable scenery at Coronet Peak and later that evening took a cruise on Lake Wakatipu on board the vintage steamer "Earnslaw." They spent the night at Queenstown.

The following day they took a launch trip on the sound, viewing Mitre Peak and magnificent Bowen Falls.

They traveled the rolling plains to the southernmost tip of New Zealand's mainland. They continued traveling to Dunedin, known as the "Edinburgh of the South" with building styles, inner-city parks and even a castle to emphasize the Kinship. That night they stayed at Dunedin Leisure Lodge, which was situated next to the Botanical Gardens.

Before leaving Dunedin they visited Olveston House with its fine collection of antiques and early New Zealand paintings. During their travels at sea level they were intrigued when they came upon Mt. Cook which rose almost straight up to 12,000 feet. This mountain is known as the "Cloud Piercer."

The Ezells took a spectacular scenic flight over the mighty glaciers and glistening peaks of awe-inspiring alpine region. Genny said this was rather spooky as they rode in a small 14-passenger plane and could look down and see space

Mindy Wins State Medals

Mindy Neal captured second and third place in two events at the state meet last weekend, giving Bovina 14 points on the state meet tally board.

Miss Neal had been the alternate to the state meet in the long jump, was able to compete after one of the state qualifiers could not attend the state meet.

That allowed Miss Neal to win her silver medal. She took second place with a jump of 17-4, the best of her career.

Mindy came up with her medal-winning jump on her second jump of the day. Each contestant was allowed six jumps.

The long jump began at 9 a.m. on Friday, in excellent weather. By the time the event was concluded, about 10:30, it had begun to rain, and Mindy's final jump was made in the rain.

Miss Neal placed third in the triple jump, with a best jump of 35-7. She was standing in fourth place in the event until her sixth and final jump, when she reached down and came up with her best effort, enabling her to claim the bronze medal in the event.

By the time the triple jump event was held, the weather was hot and humid, with the temperature at 88 degrees.

"Mindy was real excited, and we were real excited for her. She had quite a day, and it was quite an accomplishment," said her coach, Bruce Yeager.

The performance capped off a stellar athletic year for the Fillies' star, who has been honored with various awards for her basketball play, and has signed a letter of intent to attend Texas A&M University on a basketball scholarship.

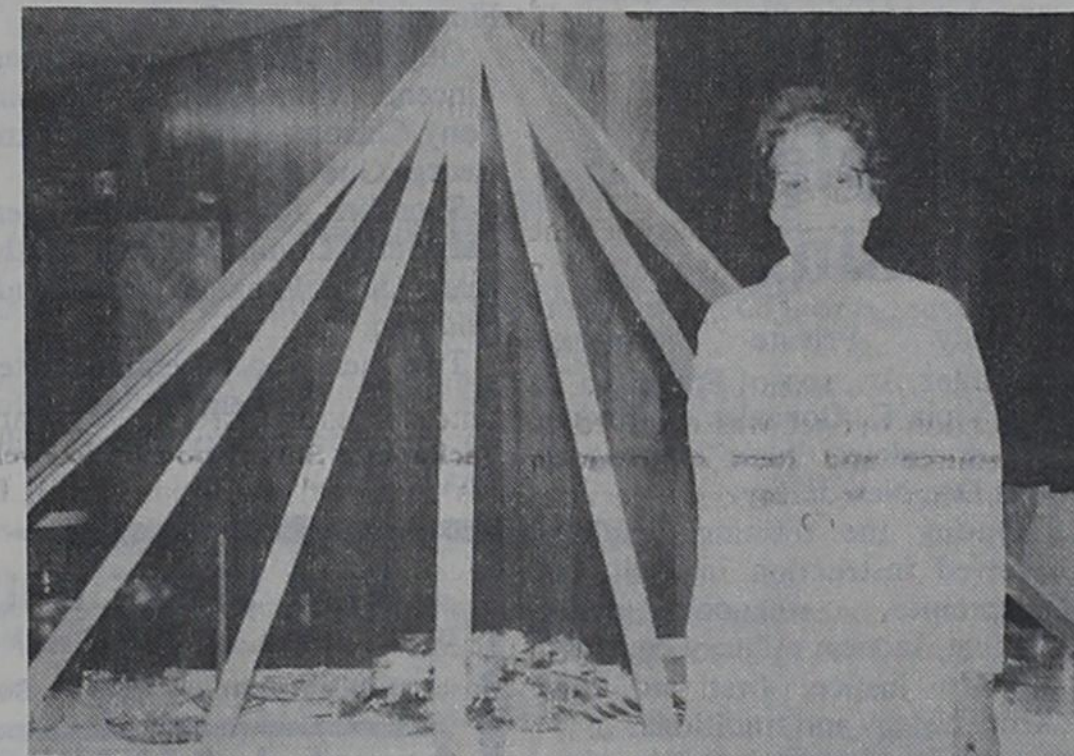

Buckle-Up Week Is Set May 18-25

A majority of Texans now fasten their safety belts, according to recent surveys by the Texas Transportation Institute.

If you're one of the minority, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts hopes you'll give your belt a try during Texas Buckle-Up Week May 18-25.

Governor Bill Clements has issued a proclamation, and many Texas towns will be conducting safety belt awareness campaigns. The coalition will put special emphasis on the proper use of car seats for small children and on belt use by high school and college students.

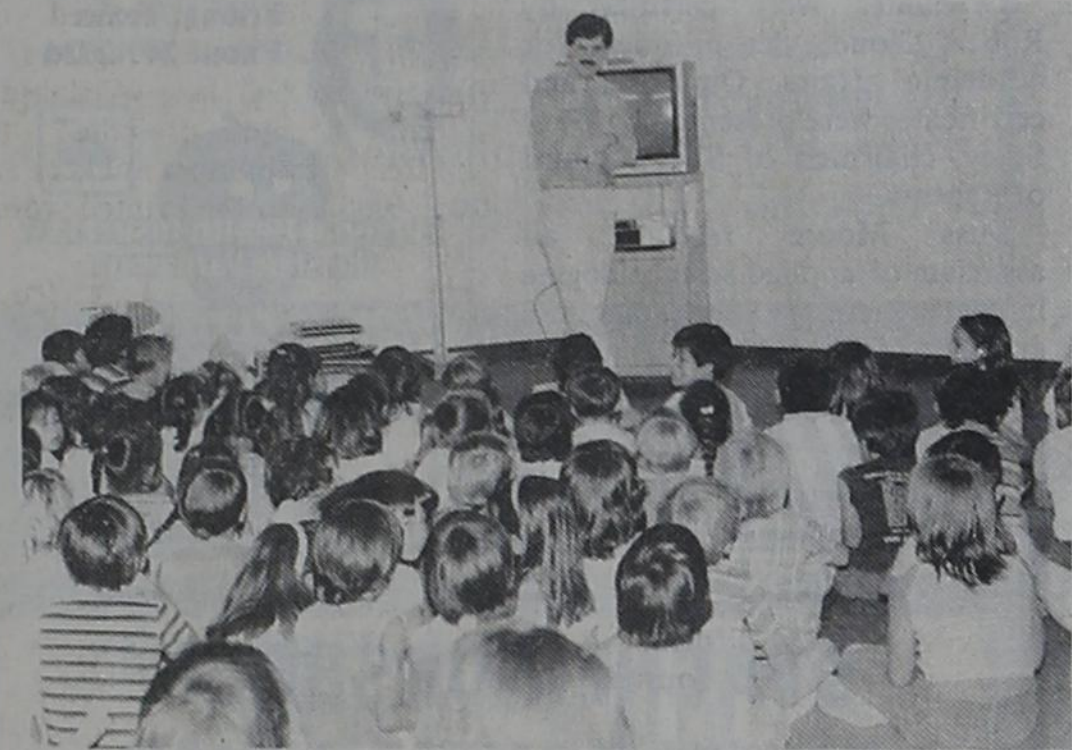
"The week before Memorial Day is always a good time to promote safety belt use," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the coalition. "The holiday weekend marks the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer, when Texans hit the road in numbers and the risk of a wreck goes up. Many of our young people graduate and travel to new

schools or jobs during this time.

"This year, with the speed limit going up to 65 miles per hour on rural interstates, the risk will be even higher," Gustafson added. "We'll have to work hard to keep up the good results we had in the first year under the safety belt law, when front-seat fatalities in cars and pickups decreased by seven per cent. And the 1987 survey by Texas Transportation Institute shows Texans are in need of a safety belt reminder."

In 1986, Texas had one of the highest belt-use rates in the nation, with 66 per cent of drivers buckling up in cars and light trucks. The latest survey, conducted in January, indicated usage had dropped to 59 per cent.

"That's still high, when you consider that the average for states with safety belt laws is 45 per cent," said Gustafson. "But Hawaii had a rate of 68 per cent for drivers and passengers last year, and North Carolina passed us this spring with rates above 70 per cent. Pride demands that we put Texas back on top."

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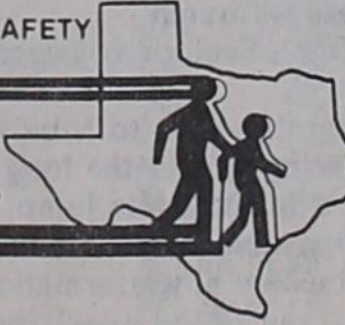

College Expanding Research On ALS

Baylor College of Medicine neurologists are expanding a study of the anti-rejection drug cyclosporine in the treatment of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), known as Lou Gehrig's Disease.

While the drug may not help all patients, preliminary tests suggest it may slow the progression of ALS in patients who are in the early stages of the disease, said Dr. Stanley H. Appel, chairman of neurology at Baylor.

The drug tests are based on the theory that ALS may be related to a change in the immune system, which causes antibodies to attack and destroy cells that control muscle movement. This gradual deterioration of the muscles and nervous system eventually impairs the ability to walk, speak and even swallow. There is no cure for ALS and no known cause. Most people live three to five years after diagnosis.

Cyclosporine is the major drug used to prevent organ transplant rejections because it suppresses the body's immune system.

"If ALS is caused by antibodies attacking the cells in the spine that control muscles, then a drug that will suppress the attacking antibodies might help patients," Appel said. "Cells that have been destroyed cannot be replaced, but if we can save cells from being attacked by the antibodies, we may be able to stabilize some symptoms of ALS and slow progression of the disease."

The expanded study will involve 120 male patients at Baylor and three other medical centers in New York and Wisconsin. Study participants will be given the drug cyclosporine or an inactive substance (placebo) in liquid form, and monitored closely on a
