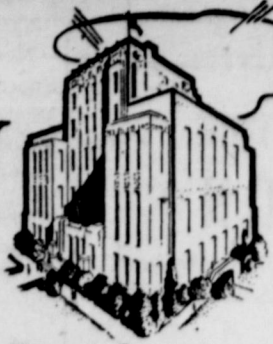

Mavericks To Seek Second Place In Gorman Contest

Eastland's Mavericks will seek second place in district football play Thursday afternoon when they take on Gorman in a game at Gorman that has been called for 2 p. m.

The corrected game time was confirmed Wednesday by school officials.

The Mavericks will be overwhelming favorites to beat the only other Eastland County Class A eleven, and thus wind up a clear runner-up to DeLeon in the district.

MAVERICKS DOWNED BY CISCO, 20 TO 0

The Eastland Mavericks played their hearts out against the Cisco Lobos on Maverick Field Thursday night of last week, but lost to a superior team, 20 to 0.

Stanley Williams, the tall Cisco back who might make all-state if he were on a team that was headed for the state playoffs, was just too much for the Mavericks—Williams and the bruising Cisco line that looked at times but always tightened up when it needed to.

Eastland, starting with a moderately strong north wind at its back, threatened twice in the first quarter, once when a Cisco kick was partly blocked and taken by Bobby Blair on the Cisco 33. Jimmie Mathews made four yards, and Johnny Hicks took a lateral to the 24 and then drove for a first down on the 22. Billy Brasher knifed through to the 18, but Bobby Blair fumbled on the next play and Cisco recovered.

Cisco promptly staged a drive of its own, feature of which was a 54-yard gallop by Flournoy Cleveland to the Eastland 26. But raged line play by Eastland stopped the drive on the 22, and Mathews quick kicked to the Cisco 11. However, a Cisco penalty cancelled the play and gave the Mavericks a first down on the Eastland 42. Eastland had to punt on fourth down and Williams was stopped almost in his tracks on the Cisco 21 by a vicious tackle.

A few plays later, Billy Johnson recovered Williams' fumble on the Cisco 25, and Hicks passed to Lewis Crossley on the 18. There the play Hicks lost to the 30 when quarter ended, and on the next

Side Issues

This is the season of Thanksgiving, and in this fat and opulent land of ours it is hard to realize the circumstances under which this joyous celebration began.

Of course there always has been a thanksgiving of some sort since man first tilled his land and got his harvest in the fall, but our own celebration, stemming from the early days of the pilgrims and other first settlers of the wilderness of North America, seems to all of us typically American, with the turkey and pumpkin or mince pie and cranberries and all the rest of the good things that have made American Thanksgiving tables something that most residents of the world would gaze at unbelievably if they had the chance.

We would give thanks indeed if we only had a chance to compare the things we have with the things available in other nations of the world, with very few exceptions.

For it is a fact that most of the people in the world—human beings, even as you and I—have too little food, not enough clothing, far too little medicine and medical skills, hardly any of the luxuries we are so accustomed to, and often not even adequate shelter.

We talk of shortages, and in our magnificent America, we have failed frequently in the past few years to have all the things to which we have become accustomed. There have not been enough automobiles, bathtubs, telephones, sides of bacon, pounds of butter, beefsteaks, cigarettes, alarm clocks, nylon hose, hotel rooms, tickets to the show "Oklahoma!" or houses.

The housing shortage has been by far the most hurtful, and even in this field we live in a land whose garages would be viewed by large segments of the world's population as quite superior abodes.

Of course there are people in our own land who do not have many things to be thankful for, and I believe one of the great political holds the late President Roosevelt had on the American people was his championship of the cause of the one-third of our people he said were ill-fed, ill-clad and ill-housed.

Whether his figure is true or not, the fact remains that our bottom one-third of the population in creature comforts live like princes compared with a large percentage of the people of the world in this year of 1946.

Right here in Eastland there are very few if any who do not have enough to eat and wear, and undoubtedly there are many who feel they live in the best town in the best state in the best country in the world.

Those who can feel that way certainly have a great deal to be thankful for.

But if we are thankful for any or all of these things we have, we should not forget to be at least a little humble. Our ancestors who tamed this mighty land had no soft and easy lives; many of them lived lives of incredible hardships that their children might have an easier time of it.

Whether their children were worth the sacrifice is another matter: the point I seek to make is that those early leaders and workmen and explorers and soldiers had as much wisdom and foresight as we do.

And we should be thankful in all humility that this great land offered so much opportunity for carving out a great civilization.

How would you like to have your same station in life in India? In China? In Germany, or even in France or England or Russia? If you are not quite wealthy and powerful, you had better hope that you never get a plight as bad as your counterpart in any of those nations is in.

Thanksgiving in America? Why, it's made to order these days. The one big trouble is that so many people can't seem to enjoy the things they have for fear they cannot get more, or are afraid someone else is getting more.

And maybe a little old-fashioned thankfulness would eliminate a lot of that.

Gym Remodelling Is Under Way; Seats To Hold 500

Remodelling of the Eastland High School gymnasium was under way this week, with work already completed on tearing down the old seats on the north side.

Under the program, sponsored by the Eastland Quarterback Club, the basketball court will be moved to the extreme south side of the gymnasium, with added space on the north side to be devoted to stands.

The basketball goals will have to be moved and the floor will be sanded and varnished.

Later plans call for improved lighting and refinishing the interior of the building, which was never fully completed when it was constructed.

The new stands will seat about 500 people, estimated Coach John E. Little. The old stands would hold no more than 150 to 200 people comfortably—and not very comfortably then.

Lumber for the new stands is being taken from the old ones and from the old wooden football bleachers torn down at Maverick Field in September.

Some new lumber will be used to box in the under side of the stands to make an equipment storage room for football uniforms and other athletic equipment.

The Quarterback Club is spending about \$285 on the stands and other work, and the school is financing the rest.

Safety Conference Reorganized With Tanner Chairman

Reorganization of the Oil Belt Safety Conference was effected at a meeting in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Wednesday night of last week, H. J. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, was elected chairman of the reorganized group, and Eastland's invitation for the conference to meet here in the spring was accepted.

Tanner recalled that in 1938 the old conference meeting in Eastland was a big success with a parade, floats, bands, meetings and speakers.

Bob Smith of Austin, representative of the Texas Safety Association, said the association would help bear expenses for speakers and prizes of such an event up to three or four hundred dollars.

The conference, made up of Eastland and Stephens counties, is to promote safety on highways and in industrial plants, and safety education of all kinds.

Smith outlined the state safety group's legislative program, which includes a drive for more state highway patrolmen, changes in court procedures on traffic cases a uniform traffic code, and other similar safety objectives.

It was pointed out at the meeting that Eastland county has had 15 traffic deaths this year, with highway accidents costing automobile owners approximately \$600,000.

Details Not Learned Yet; Pioneer To Be Operator

President Says Line To Announce Plans As Soon As Local Facilities Can Be Arranged

(Special to The Record)

DALLAS, Nov. 27—Pioneer Air Lines will begin operation of its new route to Eastland as soon as possible, Col. Robert J. Smith, president, announced here today. However, little can be determined about the actual date of starting operations until some time next week, he added.

The time lapse between CAB's authorization and beginning of service is necessary to permit the airline to acquire airport and ticket office facilities and personnel, and to make numerous other arrangements he said.

"It is gratifying to me, and to the other officials and employees of Pioneer Air Lines that the Civil Aeronautics Board has seen fit to include Eastland on the new routes granted us," Colonel Smith said. "The citizens of Eastland may rest assured that Pioneer will render the best air transportation it can to the community."

"Pioneer is functionally a community-type airline; that is, we fit our service and schedules to the community's needs, because a substantial part of our passengers both begin and end their journeys at points on Pioneer's route."

"However, Pioneer connects with the trunk lines of the continental networks and thus all the cities on our system will be joined by air to every other community in the world that is served by air transportation."

Addition of the new routes gives impetus to the life and growth of each of the communities Pioneer will serve, Colonel Smith declared.

"Each now has greater outlet to the nation and to the world, for its business, commerce and culture," he said. "Each now is a greater part of the modern instrument of progress, aviation. The airline will render all of the air transportation services, including transport of passengers, mail, express and air freight."

Prior to inauguration of service, citizens of Eastland will be given an opportunity to examine at close hand the Douglas airplanes flown by Pioneer, Smith said. Preparations are being made also for ceremonies to inaugurate service, he said.

22 Girls At Work In Garment Factory

Twenty-two operators were busy at work at the Hollywood Corset Company's new brassiere plant in Eastland Wednesday as the plant ended its first full week of operation, and Stanley Hertz, company official who is getting the plant started, said the beginning had been better than he hoped for.

However, Hertz put out a call for more girls to operate the machines in the plant and said 60 will be busy there within a short while.

Pioneer Air Lines, Inc. has been authorized by the Civil Aeronautics Board to give airline service to Eastland, Mayor Victor Cornelius was notified Wednesday in a wire from Senator Tom Connally.

Details of the authorization had not been received, but from information available it appeared Eastland would be on a feeder line from Fort Worth to Abilene by way of Weatherford and Mineral Wells.

There was a possibility the line might make only one stop in Eastland County, and that it might be at Ranger or Cisco, but Cornelius said Eastland's central position in the county would give it an apparent initial advantage if such is the case.

Connally's telegram said simply, "CAB has authorized Pioneer to give your city air service. Tom Connally."

Congratulatory wires were received from Gov. Coke Stevenson and Gov.-Elect Beauford Jester.

Pioneer already is operating the only feeder line so far authorized by the CAB, from Lubbock to Houston, and has been approved for several other routes.

Belief that Eastland eventually would be given airline service, and that airlines will mean to a city in the future what railways and highways have in the past, led to the development of the Eastland municipal airport by the City Commission.

More than \$20,000 has been spent in developing the airport in the past two years, and it has been called one of the best small air fields in the Southwest, considering amount of investment.

The port has hangar, repair shop and gasoline facilities, with the hangar and shop now leased to Will Garrett, and has native grass runways that are usable in practically all weather, although they become somewhat mushy after a long rainy spell.

Operating at the airport now is the Eastland Flying School, managed by George Howell of Dallas. The school at present is engaged principally in teaching flying to former servicemen under the GI Bill of Rights.

Tom H. Sparks Dies At Home In Eastland

Tom H. Sparks, 77, died at his home on South Seaman Street Tuesday night after an illness of three weeks. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Hamner Funeral Home. Mr. Sparks had lived in Eastland County for 67 years.

Rev. H. D. Blair and Rev. Fred Porter officiated.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Cora Lee Sparks, and by the following children Mrs. J. M. Lovings, Dean Sparks, and Miss Kay Sparks, all of Eastland; Mrs. E. P. Perrin of Ranger; Jim Sparks of Odessa, Alvin Sparks of Lamesa; Jack Sparks of Big Spring; Johnnie Sparks of Baird; Mrs. Deola Parmley of Lamesa; and Mrs. Viola Baskett of Seattle, Wash. who was unable to attend and by 14 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

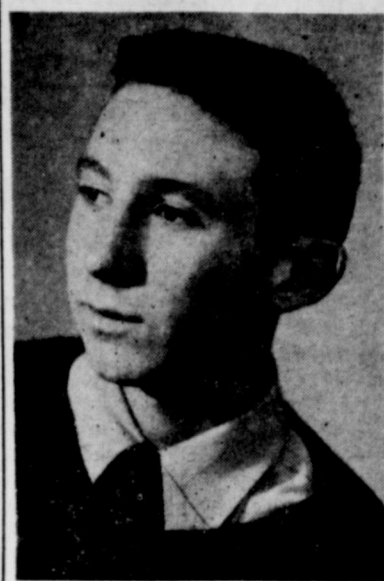
GREAT FOOTBALL TEAMS

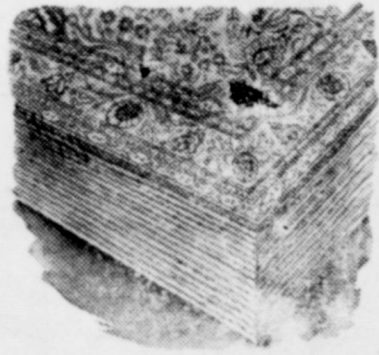

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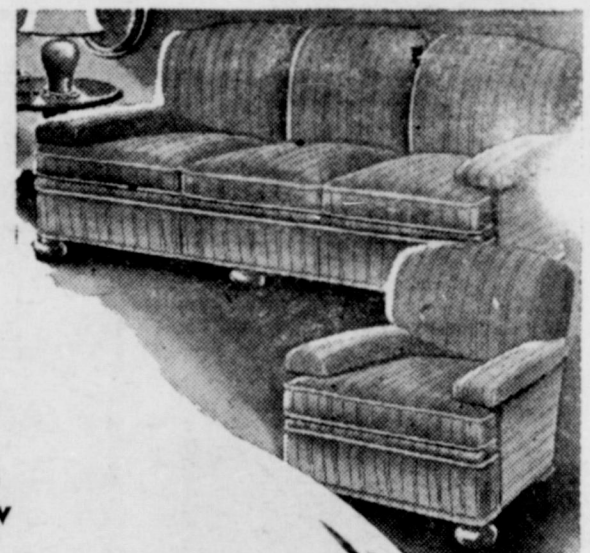

he was trapped after taking a lateral. Brashler completed a pass to Mathews on the 21, but it was not long enough and the ball went over.

Charles Pence caught a couple of Cisco passes for first downs. Williams took one for another, and from the Eastland 35, Williams drove for a score in three runs, the last for the 18.

Pence kicked the point. A few minutes later Mathews of Eastland intercepted a pass on the Maverick seven-yard line after it had been batted around by two or three players, but after taking the excellent punt out by Mathews and receiving a 15-yard roughing penalty to their own 40, the Lobos drove for a score in four plays, with Cleveland carrying over on a sneaker that started on the Eastland 37. Again Pence kicked the point.

The half ended a few plays later. Midway of the third quarter, Mathews attempted another quick kick from the Eastland 22 as Cisco blocked it and recovered on the 23. Cleveland ran to the 13 for a first down. Pence caught a pass on the 2 for another, and Gerald Smith plunged over. The try for point was missed.

Against the Cisco second team in the fourth quarter Eastland staged a march that carried 73 yards in all, the last 14 on a pass play from Brashler to Mathews after the Cisco first string had been rushed in to kill the threat. But with a first down on the 7, two passes were incomplete, one glancing off Blair's fingertips in the end zone. Mathews lost three yards, and Pence of Cisco intercepted a fourth down pass and ran it to the 12.

On the next play Williams made the most spectacular run of the game as he took a wide lateral and raced 88 yards for an apparent touchdown, but the play was called back and Cisco penalized to the one-yard line for clipping. Then Cisco kicked out, and the Cisco second team went in, and the game wound up uneventfully.
