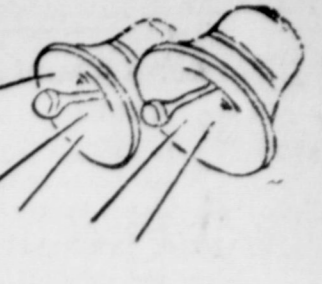
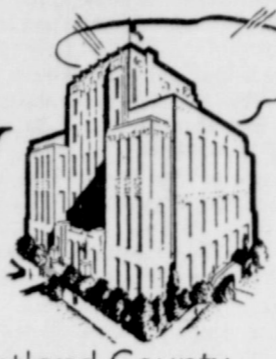

Side Issues

This is the time of year when people take stock of what has taken place during the year past and peer into the future to try to see what the coming year holds.

Certainly, Eastland cannot complain about the past year, but can point with pride; and if there are any large black clouds on the horizon ahead, they are not casting their shadows before them.

So many gains have been made in the business and industrial life of the city that it is hard to record them all. If material prosperity is the key to happiness, which it certainly is not, there ought to be a lot of happy people in Eastland.

Among the more obvious signs of progress in Eastland are the two new industrial enterprises, the Texas Lightweight Aggregate plant and the Hollywood Corset Company factory. Both are brand new and add new payrolls to those already here.

But of course there are other obvious signs of progress such as J. O. Earnest's new frozen food locker plant and grocery store, Ben Hamner's new funeral home, the new McGraw Motor Co. and Lamb Motor Company buildings, the new Pullman Store building and a lot of others that we more or less take for granted even though they have been here only a few months.

All of these happenings have been reported on from time to time in stories in The Record, but the sum total makes a rather impressive addition to the business life of a town the size of Eastland.

The new Majestic Theatre might have been on the above list of course, but the work has gone so slowly that it looks as if I will have to save it for my round-up of a year from now.

And by that time there will be more additions, too, some of which I know about such as Pop Gaines' new auto parts house going up on South Seaman Street, and some of which probably nobody knows about, yet.

The agricultural outlook is no less promising than the business prospects. I got a news release today from a tile institute, of all things, saying that farm and livestock income last year, presumably in 1945, in Eastland County was more than double the total for 1940, and totalled a record amount of \$4,222,000.

As the saying goes, that ain't hay, although some of it represents the sale of hay.

This year's farm income almost certainly is even higher, with a larger peanut acreage and as good or better peanut crop, and with livestock prices at record highs during at least part of the year.

Along that line, a number of observers have told me that farms of the county are being worked harder than they have been in many years, and I can well believe it.

When prices are so low that it hardly pays to raise a crop, the natural feeling is one of "What's the use?"

But things are different when a lot of work invested in a crop means a big return. And that almost certainly is what has happened in a lot of cases.

Also, more money on the farm means more attention to such things as crop rotation and soil conservation, because the farmer can see where bigger crops per acre will mean far bigger cash returns.

This winter's plantings of cover crops in the county are by far the largest in history, and there may come a day when just about every acre planted to a summer crop will be planted that winter to a cover crop.

That day will be a memorable one. A big factor that is delaying it is a scarcity of fertilizing materials; experts say the soil must have phosphates and nitrates added if winter cover-crops are to do much good.

But at any rate the farmers are on their way, and with no prospect of any major slump in prices for the coming year, the broad base of prosperity for the county seems fairly well assured, barring a major drought or other natural catastrophe.

In the retail business picture, some of the lushness that came in the late war years and the first year of peace has disappeared as people have quit throwing away their money like drunken Indians and once more are using a critical eye with regard to values.

Not that all people threw away their money in the way described, and not that all prices were of the hold-up variety. But there were a lot of instances of each, and now the tide seems to have turned and more goods is available and the acute fear of shortages has declined almost to the vanishing point.

Stores still are selling a lot of stuff, but not with the rapidity of a year ago, and price cuts have been common during the past two or three months to move goods off of shelves to make room for more.

What the next year holds for Eastland depends on so many different things that I cannot make any prophecy that would be worth the paper it is printed on.

There certainly will be a lot of home building here if materials become more plentiful and not so expensive, but it seems to me that such a turn of events will take more than a year to happen.

Various other business establishments are in line for new buildings also when and if the people who will build decide the time is ripe.

And regardless of the way prices act, there almost certainly will be a continuation of the remodeling and improving of present homes that has been so noticeable in the past two or three years.

Prices of present houses are not likely to go much if any higher; in fact, there has been a slowing down of the real estate market here during the past few months, and the next turn if there is one any time soon is apt to be slightly downward.

However, a man who has dealt in a lot of real estate in Eastland cautioned against looking for any big drop in prices during the next two or three years; the factors just are not present to create such a drop, he said. Most people who own property are not willing to cut reasonable prices in order to get rid of it, he said, and rentable houses still are so much in demand as to put a floor under the market, in effect.

All in all, the outlook for the next 12 months in Eastland is quite bright, and the professional pessimists who still are selling Eastland short on the basis of what happened in the past may be forced to pull in their horns one of these days as the town continues to grow and prosper.

How much has it grown? Well, I'm no authority, but Herbert Tanner, who keeps tab on such things because he is manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said the other day that utility connections and other indices led him to believe that the population now is about 5700.

And, he said, that isn't just the usual chamber of commerce line of ballyhoo, either. That is an honest estimate, honestly arrived at.

So Eastland is on the move. Let's go along with it!

Airline To Begin Eastland Schedules In Mid-February

Pioneer Airlines probably will begin operations through Eastland by mid-February, running two schedules east and two west each day, officials of the line said here late last week on an inspection trip.

George K. Harris, superintendent of stations for the airline, and H. L. Lawrence, assistant to the vice president in charge of operations, inspected the Municipal Airport, which will be the stopping point serving Eastland, Ranger and Cisco.

The men said the line will have three permanent employees stationed here, including one man trained in radio and ticket sales who will handle the office and will be sent in, and two others who probably will be hired locally.

They asked city officials to provide, if possible, an office and waiting room at the airport. City Manager K. B. Tanner said this week the space probably will be provided by revising plans for a building already scheduled for construction to house offices and provide a ready room for the Eastland Flying School, teaching former servicemen to fly at the airport.

The planes to be flown into Eastland will be DC-13's, 24 passenger two-engine ships.

The two daily schedules will give Eastland County residents fast connections with planes flying everywhere over the world, Manager H. J. Anner of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce said.

The Pioneer officials said the field here is in good shape, but said they would like it better with paved runways. City Manager Tanner said the city's financial condition bars even thinking about paving the runways at this time.

Pioneer's chief pilot is scheduled to come to Eastland soon to check over conditions and test the landing field with one of the airline's big ships.

Street Work Done In Parts Of City

Extensive work was being done in the southeastern part of Eastland this week on grading up streets, cleaning out borrow ditches and otherwise improving unpaved streets.

City Manager K. B. Tanner said city employees are taking advantage of the good weather to prepare the streets for the rainy seasons which may come in the winter.

Christmas Business Reported Good By Merchants Here

Christmas business in Eastland this year may not have set a record for volume, but it came awfully close.

Some store operators said they ran neck and neck with the previous year's record volume; some said they didn't quite make it, and numbers of others said they exceeded it.

The trend this year was toward late shopping, in sharp contrast to the experience of the three or four years before. Monday's shoppers thronged the town in numbers almost as great as Saturday's, and Tuesday, Christmas Eve, saw stores busy all day long and into the evening.

In contrast with the previous year's Christmas season, when a number of Eastland stores were "stuck" with Christmas merchandise that did not move, few merchants had much strictly seasonal goods left this year.

A trend was noticed in some stores away from the flashier gift items that had been bought heavily during the war, and toward more practical items such as clothing and home furnishings.

This may have been accelerated by sharp mark-downs on many clothing items from previous prices, as continued warm weather made winter clothing move comparatively slowly.

Wheel toys were present in bigger volume, and sold more heavily than in any recent year, it was reported. However, prices were far above those of pre-war years.

Merchants on the whole were well satisfied with their Christmas season, and were ready for the ordinarily "slow" months of January and February.

Little said Tuesday that so far he had received five acceptances and two rejections of invitations sent to 18 teams to play in the tournament.

Play in the affair will begin the afternoon of Friday, Jan. 10 and continue through the following evening. Little said that details of tournament play will not be decided until he hears from more teams.

The tournament will in a way dedicate the improved Eastland High School gymnasium, which has been remodeled this year with new seats, a sanded and repainted floor and relocation of the basketball court nearer the south wall of the building.

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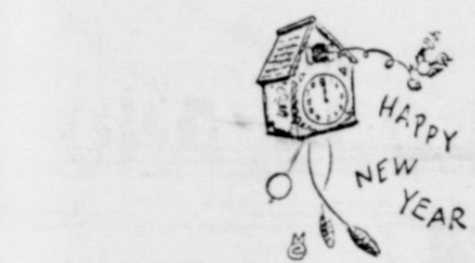

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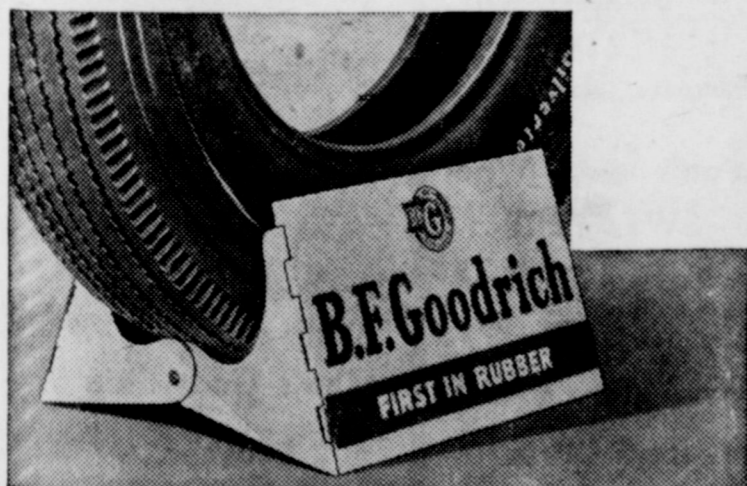

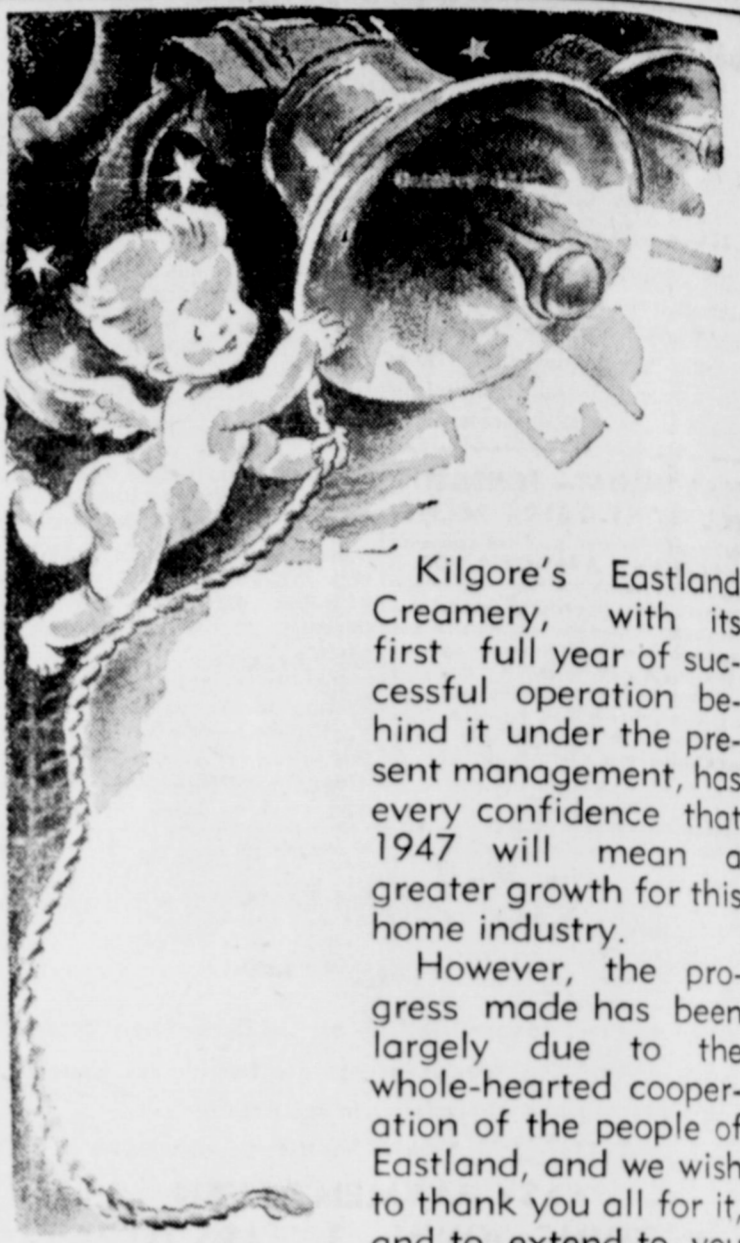
