You will please pardon my delayed response to your invitation that I write a story for publication in your splendid paper about my recent trip back to Texas. the state of my nativity and in which I lived until grown and married. It quite naturally follows that I

Lt. Jack Brown Is Promoted To Lt. Commander

Jack W. Brown of Eastland was promoted recently from Lieutenant to Lieutenant Commander. USNR. He is at present billited as Engineering Officer of Air Ferry Service Squadron One (VRS-1) o the Ferry Wing of the Naval Air Transport Service with headquarters at Floyd Bennett Field, New York.

Commander Brown entered the Navy in September 1942 and underwent the Navy training course in Aeronautical Engineerng at Massachusetts Instistute of Technology at Cambridge, Massachusetts, followed by the Pratt and Whitney Engine course at Hartford, Conn. He was assigned an aviation engineering billet at Naval Air Station, San Diego, and then went to Seattle where he worked with a unit which cerviced and maintained carrier aircraft. In April 1944, he went to the Mariannas in the Pacific as Engileering Officer with a unit servicing carrier aircraft. He was then transferred to a patrol bombing squadron in the Mariannas and low Jimo as Engineering Officer. His Squadron of Vega Venturas was the first Navy Squa dron based on low Jimo in March
