A new wage-price policy was in a dispute over the forthcoming steel price increase.

WASHINGTON (UP)-The Senate labor committee today approved a bill to raise the minimum wage to 65 cents an hour. It added amendments which would bring between 2,-000,000 and 4,000,000 additional workers under the wage-

mitted the revised wage-price policy to the president after he had rejected a proposal to revive strict ceilings for wages. The revised draft was said to call for more liberal price controls to encourage employers to grant

wage increases. In Detroit, Charles Wilson,, presidentof strike - bound General Motors Corporation, denied today that his company, the steel and electrical industries and meat packers have adopted a coordinated policy against CIO unions.

Wilson testified at a national

labor relations board hearing on charges that Gtneral Motors had failed to bargain in good faith during the 86 day old strike of 175,000 CIO United Auto Workers against GM.

Under questioning Wilson revealed that GM executives had met with steel and electrical industrialists and packing house executives in New York after the Washington labor - management conference and before the first meeting of President Truman's fact-finding board in the General Motors case.

Meanwhile New York tugmen returned to their jobs today. The four major rubber companies and the United Rubber Work-Union CIO agreed to meet in Washington Monday to work out a settlement of their dispute on an industry-wide basis.


