Mr. Womack also stated that the Eastland schools were employing at this time 26 teachers and that the average salary paid them on the nine months basis was \$162.00 per month.

The schools, Mr. Womack said, were financing repairs being made on Maverick football field and that a projector and screen for motion pictures had been purchased by the school.

> A dual completion in the oil industry's rather confusing language means completion of a well in such a way that it taps oil deposits from different oil bearng sands or shales and produces them through the same pipe.

Recently the Railroad Commision has been tightening up on issuance of permits for such form of operations. The danger of costly blow-outs and other damage has been given as a reason to ban the practice in some fields. to be sufficiently firm to make the practice safe.




