

# **B-29S ASSIGNED** TO STUDY OF **ATOMIC RAYS**

BERKELEY, Cal. (UP) - A tudy of cosmis rays from "flying laboratory" B-29 Superfortresses soon will be launched by University of California scientists in cooperation with the Navy. Equipment for the study already

has been designed and is ready for operation, Dr. Wayne Hazen, assistant professor of physics at the university, disclosed. With the instruments the scien tists will go up to approximately

45,000 feet, where they hope it may be possible to find out more about cosmic rays. Hazen said. The instruments, designed and built by Hazen, consist of a small model Wilson Cloud Chamber and

a modified version of the machine with which scientists hope to be able to photograph the path of The experiments will concen-

trate on primary cosmic rays, Hazen said, which hurtle into the earth's atmosphere from space, crash into atomic nuclei in the atmosphere and thereby create explosions which liberate secondary cosmic rays.

Since most of the primary cosmic rays are spent before reaching the earth's surface, the scientists believe more can be learned about the mysterious force by conducting experiments aboard Superfortresses high in the sky.

With Hazen's Cloud Chamber, photographs may be taken of the path of the rays because the rays bump into atoms, knock off electrons and create a general atomic distrubance. By making water vapor droplets condense over the particles knocked off by the rays, the path of the rays can be charted, Hazen said.
