#### UNITED FOREIGN POLICY

It has been suggested that Sen. Warren R. Austin be appointed an Undesecretary of State or elevated to a Cabinet post when he assumes his duties as this country's chief delegate to the United Nations. The suggestion, though Republican in origin, seems logical, desirable and untinged by politics. Further, it is likely to find favor with President Truman as well as Congress.

Such a move would be consistent with the bipartisan, or rather nonpartisan, complexion of our foreign policy. This lack of political division on international affairs is certainly one of the happiest pages in the current history of our foreign relations. This history is not unclouded, but at least there is now no fear that the United States will repeat the unfortunate chain of events which followed the first World
