Motor Vehicles To Go On Sale On September 23

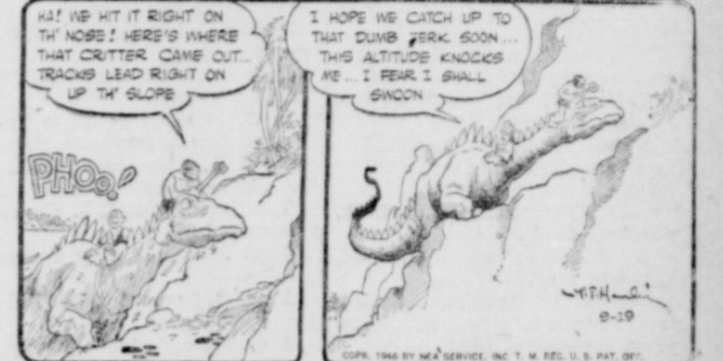

While perhaps you pre (if they think of me at all) think of me as a writer of humor, as a matter of fact, my first two books were of a serious nature—and not particularly successful, from a sales standpoint.

Two of the chapters appeared in the Saturday Evening Post, before the book came out. "Oil Boom" received a fair amount of attention from some of the national critics and received an award or two—
