



## Time To Plant

From now until October 20 is the time to plant a number of plants, such as sweet william, larkspur, columbine, snapdragons, pansies, annual phlox, corepsis and others. Portulaca, planted and others. Fortulaca, planted now in pots, will make excellent flowers for the house this winter and many tised in the flower show not the flower for the blooms

will stay open the greater part of the day. Grow some of the newer varieties; Jewel, a deep rose red has blooms an inch and a half in diameter.

There are two methods of planting seed at this time of year. The first is to plant in a well prepared bed in the garden and cover with gunny sacks tacked to light frames. Keep top soil damp until the seed begin to sprout. Remove the sack covering, and water with a fine spray until plants have become established. These plants will stand through the winter if dry. Thinning will give larger nurse, sturdier plants.

The second method is to plant in seed boxes, flats, or pots. A good sprouting medium is half and half of peat moss and sand. sand covered with fine spaghum have developed permanent leaves, transplant to pots, later transplanting to garden or cold frame.

### Idaho Orchardists Find DDT Does Trick


MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)-Nearly all of Idaho's orchardists have swung to the use of DDT sprays.

Fruit growers and entomologists have discovered that the differ. ence between the old lead arsenate sprays and new sprays shows up most in the quality of fruit on the trees. A dozen arsenate spray treatments still allowed codling moths to scar nearly half of an orchard's fruit. 
