### Chronicle Begins 61st Year Of Service

With today's issue the Eastland Chronicle begins the second ten years of the second half of its 160 years of existence.

Established November 1, 1887, by Capt. June Kimble, a native of Tennessee, Confederate war veteran and a former County clerk of Eastland county, the Chronicle has served faithfully the citizens of its trade territory.

For more than 30 years of its life the writer, as editor and business manager—and for many years, owner—has been at its helm; for the past 25 years it has been under the present ownership. It has served through three wars. It enjoys perhaps the largest list of readers of any weekly newspaper published in the County.

During the 60 years of its life the Chronicle has absorbed, by purchase or agreed suspension of publication, a number of other Eastland newspapers included among which were the Eastland Tribune; Oilbelt News, Eastland County Index and the Eastland Daily Telegram.

"My cattle are in good shape. I attribute it to keeping both the heel fly grubs and other flies under control," Childress advised County Agent Cooper, as they planned the demonstration.

A rotenone-sulphur mixture will be used in the grub control demonstration as experiment station results have proven that this remedy is superior to any other.

Cattle free from heel fly grubs produce more meat and milk than those which are "grubby," Cooper said.

A total of 25 head will be treated at the demonstration which will start at 3:30 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.

### 'Teen Age Boys Confess To Orgy Of Car Stealing

Two 'teen age boys from Cisco, entered pleas of guilty to charges of car theft and burglary before Judge Geo. L. Davenport of the 91st district court at Eastland Wednesday morning and were sentenced to a state reform school to serve until they reach the age of 21.

The boys, in a signed confession made before Deputy Sheriff Elton Reeves, stated that on September 16 they stole a '39 model Ford coupe in Fort Worth which they drove to Kermit and back to Cisco, abandoning it near the Cisco cemetery. On Oct. 6 they stole a Ford at Cisco (this is the car it was reported another person stole) from Superintendent Cluek of the Cisco schools.

They started east and ran out of gas at Weatherford where they deflated the tires and left the car, and went on to Dallas. They returned to Cisco where on Oct. 23 they stole a '41 model Chevrolet which they drove to Brownwood and back to Rising Star where they abandoned it.

In addition to the theft of these automobiles the boys confessed that on Saturday night, October 19, they entered a grocery store in Cisco where they obtained cigarettes and some \$7.00 or \$8.00 in cash.

"In the early days in this country there were many wild turkeys and quite a few deer. I have seen several hundred turkeys in a bunch feeding in the draws about the country. Then we did not shoot them for sport, but only as we needed them to eat. I recall an incident at Desdemona when hounds running a deer chased it into our cowpen. ### FARMERS NOW IN MIDST OF HARVEST

### Weather Is Big Factor In Saving Hay And Peanuts

Eastland county farmers are in the midst of harvesting a \$2,500,000 peanut crop and with continued good weather should have it taken care of within a few weeks.

There is an estimated 60,000 acres in peanuts in the County this year as compared to 55,000 acres last year. The yield this year is said to be averaging 15 bushels per acre. The price this year is \$170 per ton for No. 1 grades, as compared to \$160 last year.

Taken into the estimated value of this year's crop is the peanut hay being harvested at this time. The economic prospects for the County will be determined by the peanut crop, says County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Second in importance in the County from an economic standpoint, is the livestock industry, which has been gradually increasing for several years. Especially is this true of sheep and goats.

### GI FLYING SCHOOL TO BE CONDUCTED AT EASTLAND AIRPORT

The GI Flying School, for the training of returned soldiers who desire to learn to fly and which is to be conducted at the Eastland Municipal Airport by George K. Howell, has been approved by the Civil Aeronautics Authority, it is announced, after an inspection of the Eastland field last Friday.

Improvements, which include the lengthening of the runways, have recently been completed at the Eastland port to meet requirements of the Civil Aeronautics Authority. An airplane engine mechanical shop, which is to be operated by Bill Strange of Cisco, has also been installed.

At this school GI's may, if they pass the requirements, receive private flying license and also commercial flying license. Training service will be started soon.

Oil Field Notes

Of the twenty-seven Notice of Intention To Drill forms filed with this district office, which handle the needs of the twenty-five surrounding counties, there were five for Jones County, three for Shackelford, six for Throckmorton, two for Coleman, one for Comanche, three for Brown, one for Taylor, two for Callahan, and four for Stephens County.

A new well in the Amity Field, Comanche County, is to be drilled by L. D. Cain et al of Rising Star. This is to be a cable tool well to a depth of 750 feet, located 150 feet from the south line, and 570 feet from the west line of an 87.5 acre tract of the D. S. Ray lease, LC S C survey sect. 5. This well number 2 is approximately 8 1-2 miles SE of Rising Star.

Jack L. Potter and Jack Skeen of Longview plan to drill the C. L. Garlitz well number 2, located 990 ft. north and 330 feet west of the mid point on East line of Survey number 75 of the Blind Asylum Survey in Stephens County. Number 1 well on this lease was dry and has been abandoned. Drilling is to start about November 1, with rotary tools, to a depth of 4300 feet. This location is about 14 miles SW of Breckenridge.
