At Austin Under The Dome

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Revival of the campaign by the League of Women Voters for passage of a "secret ballot" law during the next session of the Texas Legislature brings up the question of just how secret is the ballot in Texas.

Under the Australian (paper) ballot system in use throughout the United States, secrecy of the ballot in any state depends upon the honesty and qualifications of the election judges. Most judges are honest, but a well-organized crooked political machine can see to it that some judges are appointed from its "approved" list. It is the responsibility of these crooked judges to see that ballots of voters whose loyalty to the machine is questionable are marked in some way, so that in a counting a check can be made to see if the ballot was voted "right".

The present law in Texas makes identification simple for such a judge, or anyone else interested in the counting. As the voter enters the poll and has his name checked on the precinct registration list, a number is placed by the name and on the ballot. If anyone is interested in learning his vote, all that is necessary is to learn the number and watch for it when the ballots are counted.

The theory behind this numbering system is that it would enable judges in contested elections to know just who voted and how. Experience has proved, however, that most election contests arise over the total amount rather than because of individual ballot lots. This is one of the arguments presented by the League in favor of its proposed change in the Texas law.

The idea of number ballots dates back to the introduction of a method of stuffing the ballot box, known as the "Tasmanian Dodge." In other times, although the laws required that ballots be carefully guarded, a machine worker might obtain one and bring it to his boss. The boss would then round up his bought voters in a precinct, give the ballot, properly marked, to the first of them, and send him in to vote. Actually, the voter would pick up a ballot from the judges, enter a booth and pretend to mark it.

Instead, he would stuff the unmarked ballot in a pocket, leave the booth and put the marked ballot in the box. The ballot given him at the poll then be given to the boss to mark for the next man, and so on.

The numbering system was designed to prevent this type of stuffing by having the judges compared the voter's number given when he received the ballot—with the number on the ballot deposited in the box. If the numbers agreed, it most likely was the same ballot, not one which had been marked for the voter.

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number on a stub which is torn off after comparison with the registration number and before the ballot is put in the box. Many states now use some form of numbering system on their ballots, with either a single or double detachable stub. In the latter case, one stub may be retained by the voter. The proposed law for Texas would use the single stub.

In either case, the stubs are detached completely before the ballot is placed in the box. Missouri, however, used a non-detachable stub, but after the numbers have been compared, a seal is placed over the number before the ballot is placed in the box. The seal is put on in such a way that any attempt to remove it would be so difficult as to attract the attention of those watching the counting. If necessary, individual votes may be checked in legal proceedings by removing the seal.

The fundamental principle in maintaining secret ballots and honest elections lies in selection of qualified election judges for the polls, experts say. If they are not only honest, but have a good knowledge of election laws and methods of fraud, all will go well in any election.

Women, Old Soldiers Share Veteran's Home

LOS ANGELES (UP) — An oasis in the masculine world of old soldiers at the Veterans Administration home in West L o s Angeles is the Women's Cottage, residence for disabled women veterans of wars since 1898. Built in 1940, the Women's Cottage is a modern, four-story, 54-room building, designed to create a homelike atmosphere for the 60 "old soldiers" who live there. Typical of their number is Miss Bessie Howland, 76, a nurse in World War I. Disabled from arthritis, Miss Howland has lived at the cottage since it was built. It contains its own kitchen, dining room and dietetic staff. Recreation rooms, lounges, solariums, dispensary, sewing rooms and even a beauty shop are at the disposal of the residents.

Oil Notes

It might be of interest to many to learn of drilling in a wildcat area in Erath County in the Bluff Dale area. McCarthy Oil & Gas Corporation of Houston made application in July to drill the 8,000 foot rotary well on the Wyatt C. Hedrick lease in the Jesse Benton survey, and 5.7 miles SW of Bluff Dale, and this week announcement was made that work would begin immediately on another lease, the Fannie Keeney et al, located in the R. M. Dechene survey, and 6 miles SW of Bluffdale. This is also to be an 8,000 foot test. No report has been received of the results on the Hedrick well number 1 as yet.

Activity in the Manning-O'Connor Field in Stephens County continues at a high peak, and reports received indicate that the Roesser & Pendleton, Inc. & J. D. Sandefer, Jr., O'Connor No. 1 in T&P survey block 7, section 52 potential 421.74 barrels of crude per 24 hours, with a gas-oil ratio of 1920 cubic feet of gas per barrel of crude oil. Gravity of the oil produced was 44. Total depth of this well is 3402', and top of the pay is 3338'.

Fred M. Manning, Inc. have a new oil well in the Manning - O'Connor Field. The J. W. Clanton No. 1 in T&P Survey, Block 7, Section 42, Stephens County, produced 387 barrels of crude in a 24-hour period, with a gas oil ratio of 1590 cubic feet per barrel of crude, and the gravity of this oil is also 44. Total depth of this well is 3382', with a top pay of 3265'.

Completion reports for the Tom Potter et al. B. Hatchett number 3A in Stephens County Regular Field, Survey 33, Section 33 Orphans Aylum Land shows that the well made 145 barrels of crude in a 24 hour period, with gas-oil ratio of 613, and gravity of 44.2. Total depth of this well is 4214, with the top pay at 4198. This is the fourth producer in this wildcat pool.

Plugging of the Fred M. Manning, Inc. C. J. O'Connor et al number 8, T&P Survey, Block 7, Sec. 51 in Stephens County was completed on October 28, 1946. This well was drilled to a total depth of 3440, and a faint show of oil was listed in the 3431 to 3440' area.

Deepening of the T.G. Jackson J. W. Taylor well number 3, Eastland County, five miles NE of Desdemona to a depth of 3947 failed to produce any oil or gas and was plugged as a dry hole on October 25, 1946.

Plugging of another dry well 4 miles NE of Cisco has been finished. This is the George P. Fee number 1 drilled by Graham, Spears, & Graham in Blk. 4, Sec. 64, H&TC Survey. Total depth of this well was 2150.

In the Callahan - Eastland area one mile West of Dothan R. F. McClung of Eastland drilled the D. M. Kile number one. Total depth of this shallow well was 400 feet, and a small amount of oil was encountered in the 390 to 400' level.

Drilling will begin on November 4 on the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company, J. W. Davis well number 5, in Sec. 127, H&TB Survey, Stephens County. There are 5 wells on this lease, which

is located 5 miles NW of Ranger. Depth of this well will be 2000', and cable tools will be used. This well is 1270 feet from the East line of the section, 3301.4 feet North of the Stephens - Eastland County line and 950 feet south of the lease line.

Potential of the G. P. Brawner well number 2 drilled by J. D. Sandefer, et al was 18.62 barrels per 24 hours, with a gas-oil ratio of 6818, and gravity of 35. 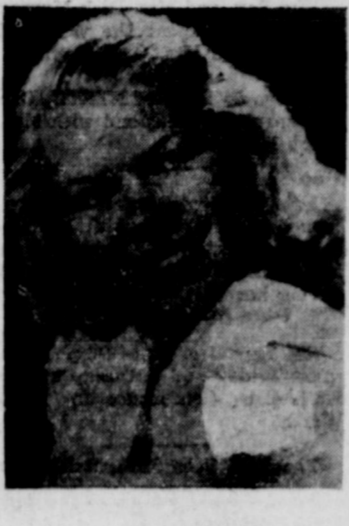

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Teachers Launch Statewide Fight For Higher Pay

DALLAS, Texas — Public school teachers of Texas are rallying to the call of the Texas Teachers Welfare Association, Inc., determined to wage a valiant fight for the right of teachers to earn a decent salary, and for proper recognition of the service they render in directing the education of Texas youth.

Plans are being made now for the annual meeting of this militant organization in December, at which new officers will be elected to direct the activities of the association. These include a membership campaign to enlist support of every teacher in Texas, a statewide educational campaign to inform the public of the grave crisis now faced by the school system, and sponsorship of legislation before the Legislature for increase in the pay of teachers.

Founders of the Republic of Texas made liberal provisions for a great public school system, but succeeding generations have not

met their responsibility fully in maintaining this great public educational system, Dr. Joe P. Harris, Dallas County School Superintendent, Secretary-Treasurer of the association, said.

The American Council on Education ranks Texas 33rd among the States in per capita expenditure based on average daily attendance; 31st in expenditure per classroom unit.

Dr. Harris said the Rural School Aid Law, which provides State funds to help poorer rural districts, should be amended. This law fixes ceilings on pay of teachers in Rural Aid Schools, starting at \$1,215 with increase each year of \$14.50. Maximum salary for teachers with degrees is \$1,431.

These salaries may have been adequate when the law was passed, but they are far too low now, Dr. Harris said. The Texas Welfare Association will sponsor legislation to raise the pay of teachers.

(Continued From Page One) In welding, Otis L. Hill's shop in Ranger, which has a building 50'x100'. Hill owns 1 gas driven DC machine, 2 three phase P&H DC machines, 2 and 2 acetylene machines. The Eastland County Vocational School owns and has installed in Hill's Shop, 2-300 AMP three phase Lincoln DC machines, 1 AC Marquette and 1 Acetylene Marquette machines. There is also available in this shop, a metal lathe, grinder, power hack saw, and painting spray gun. The school owns a force necessary for preheating cast.

On a cooperative basis a Veteran working 18 hours a week in the welding trade is eligible to be a full time student and draw \$90.00 subsistence (with the ceiling of \$200.00 wage). Veterans who are working as laborers or in some trade other than welding may enroll on part time student without having a training agreement signed by the employer. However, they receive only \$45.00 subsistence. The \$200.00 applies to this also. A veteran may enroll as a cooperative or part-time student and have his tuition paid in that trade. There are 40 boys enrolled in the 2 welding classes at Ranger, additional classes will be set up in any town. When and if the enrollment justifies renting, leasing or building of facilities necessary to teach this or any trade in that locality.

Radio and refrigeration facilities have been leased from Mr. Bennett in Gorman, who is also to teach the course in same. Mr. Bennett is skilled in both trades and very capable of teaching those who wish to learn the trade. The Vocational School has an order for additional hand tools necessary for these trades, in addition to those already owned by Mr. Bennett.

Wide Masengale's Eastland shop has been leased for Plumbing and sheet metal work. Masengale has had many years of experience in the plumbing trade and his shop is fully equipped to teach the courses.

Mr. Freeman's woodshop in Eastland has been leased for courses in woodwork and carpentry with Mr. Freeman himself as teacher.

The Eastland County Vocational School has purchased and installed a planer, and a cut-off saw, a duplicating lathe and fluting attachment, a sander to supplement Mr. Freeman's equipment. He has available 2 bench saws, a hand saw, a jig saw, shape, wood lathe, drill press, jointer, planer, paint spray gun, sander, tenon machine, and tool sharpener.

Other trade courses are expected to be set up in the near future.

Agriculture equipment is available for farm shops at Cisco, Ranger, and Gorman. Equipment will be available at Rising Star, as soon as the Vocational Agricultural building is completed. Special equipment purchased for use in all classes include a sound film projector, Apex Projector, and other equipment needed for completion of the unit. The Agricultural Dept., of the Vocational School has 3 instructors who are graduates of A&M College in Agricultural Education. Mr. Jack Coxy is the head of the Agri. Dept. and Rolan Wiley, and B. S. Dudley are assistant to Mr. Gray.

The Distributive Education Dept., has on order books and equipment needed for completing Vocational Training for the Veteran in his respective field. There are 4 instructors in the D. E. Department, with Mr. Harry Kelsey as head of that department, Robert Lanford, a graduate of A&M Milton Perry, graduate of Southwestern, H. G. Garrett who has his B. S. and M. A. degrees, and Neal H. Rose, who has a B. S. from Baylor.

An veteran desiring to enroll in the Eastland County Vocational School or transfer in to the school should contact C. B. Edwards, director. The office is located in the Prairie Building in Eastland.

USO AUDITIONS DISPUTED ART WORK LABELED TO BE HELD IN DA VINCI, PLAGUES COURT

CLEVELAND (UP)—Leonard Furst, Cuyahoga County clerk of courts, soon may have an original Leonardo da Vinci painting to hang in his office. Clarence Congdon, Detroit art dealer, is willing to wash his hands of the whole mess.

The picture, "The Lute Player," during the past 15 years has built a hard luck legend around itself. For six years Congdon has been trying to sell it, without success. So he is going to return it to the Common Pleas Court here, which has jurisdiction over the painting.

Congdon claims the painting is a sister to da Vinci's famed "Mona Lisa" and once hung beside it in the Louvre.

The painting was brought here in 1926 by Baroness Ally von Magnus Schwartzberg. She tried to sell it for its reputed value, \$1,000,000, but its authenticity was questioned.

In 1932 Gordon Bentley, Inc., a local art dealer, brought suit for lien of \$2,353.01 against the picture. He claimed he advanced Baroness von Magnus Schwartzberg that amount.

Meanwhile, the suit dragged on and three more claims against the Baroness were filed by the Guardian Trust Co., the Bank fuer Deutsche Beamte (German Official's Bank) and Otto G. Zuck. Three of the four claimants had gone bankrupt by 1935, when the suit was decided, the two banks and the art dealer.

Four claims were allowed totaling \$30,000 and the painting was ordered sold for \$500,000. Still nobody offered to buy it, even at the new bargain-sale price.

In 1940 the court lowered the sale price to \$100,000 and the Guardian Trust and Bentley receivers assigned their rights to Congdon, who was to receive one third of the sale price.

Congdon recently informed the Common Pleas Court by mail he is returning the picture to them. It's only gathering dust now in a Detroit bank vault and all he gets is the storage bill for it.

It appears that the clerk of the court will become more or less permanent custodian.

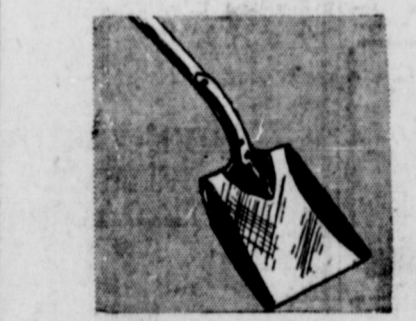
