

## "MY TURN"

HERE'S AN UPDATE of health news from various sources: Coronary heart disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S., killing more than 750,000 people each year. The Center for Disease Control, after an intensive analysis of several studies, now says that the link between heart disease and physical inactivity is as strong as the link between heart disease and high blood pressure.

Nearly 60% of Americans don't get any regular exercise, which is defined as three 20-minute sessions per week. Also 80 to 90% don't engage in a regular aerobic exercise program. In contrast, 18% do smoke a pack of cigarettes a day, 10% have a systolic blood pressure level above 150, and 10% have a blood cholesterol level over 268.

The CDC researchers suggest that even less-than-rigorous exercise, as long as it is performed regularly, may also be somewhat protective against heart disease.

Quite a lot of local people appear to be taking their daily dose of exercise in the form of walks around their neighborhoods or at the track each evening after supper.

Auto drivers heading down the street in a westerly direction have trouble seeing pedestrians (or much of anything else) at that time of day with the bright setting sun right at eye level.

Accidents are the third leading cause of death in this country, so we urge local walkers to use caution, walk close to curbs since there are so few sidewalks in town, and be prepared to hop onto the nearest lawn or driveway if a car appears to be driving strangely.

A recent bulletin published by the Texas Department of Health indicates that there have been 695 new cases of AIDS reported in Texas since January of this year. There have been 165 deaths from AIDS in Texas since January.

Harris County, which takes in the city of Houston, had by far the largest number of AIDS cases reported, 268 and 51 deaths. Dallas County was second with 194 reported cases, but had 55 deaths from the disease since the first of the year.

One of the persistent myths about this disease concerns the donating of blood. Health officials say that it is not possible to catch AIDS when you are donating blood. Blood banks use sterile, throwaway needles and collection equipment so there is no way that a donor could be exposed. Unfounded fears have contributed to a blood shortage.

It was recently reported that the incubation period for this disease is longer than was first believed. I have not yet seen a report on how this change might affect the current blood supply. I am worried about the fact that there are large medical facilities (using large amounts of blood) located in Houston, which also has the largest population of gays in the state and the largest incidence of AIDS cases.

We'll be keeping an eye on this situation.

Another health myth which has been around for a long time is that low blood pressure can be just as bad for you as high blood pressure. Wrong! Hypotension, as low blood pressure is known, is not considered a disease and cannot be the cause of weakness, headaches or fatigue. Some people maintain a blood pressure of 90/60 for all of their life without showing any ill effects. In fact, such a blood pressure level appears to go along with good health and long life.

## Bloodmobile Here

The Bovina Student Council is sponsoring the Coffee Memorial Blood drive on Thursday, October 15. The Bloodmobile will be at the Bovina High School from 2:30-6:30 p.m.

The hospitals of our area are still needing blood plasma. A pint of blood only lasts six weeks. If it is not used, it is discarded. The body is recovered and ready to give blood every eight weeks.

Again we would like to emphasize the safety factor when you give blood. Each donor will receive a new needle and then it is discarded. No needle is used more than one time.

Everyone has sufficient blood plasma to give others. The body is constantly replacing old blood cells that die away. Within a day the fluid is replaced and red cells are replaced in a few weeks.

Many 65-year-olds are as healthy and able to donate as anyone else. However, for their own protection they should call their own doctor first.

The majority of blood needs are for the very young and very old patients, who usually do not have

enough family or friends to meet their needs. We can help them.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center tests every pint of blood for the AIDS virus. They have tested since April 1, 1985. Each donation received has about ten tests. To date, they have found and discarded only one pint per 9,000 that contains the HIV antibody.

High school students that donate blood will be given t-shirts and children who accompany their parents will be given candy. The Bovina United Methodist Women want to thank all of you for continuing to participate in this much needed community project.

# Mustangs Topple Rival Steers, 17-6

The Bovina Mustangs scored a rare win over rival Farwell in their District 2-A opener at Mustang Field last Friday. The final score was Bovina 17, Farwell 6.

The Mustangs scored all of their points in the first half. They had a drive going in the first quarter that bogged down at the Farwell 21. Bud Venable came in to kick a 38-yard field goal, to give Bovina a 3-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Venable picked off a pass from Farwell quarterback Damon George and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown. He added the point-after kick, to hike Bovina's lead to 10-0.

Late in the second quarter, Bovina got the ball after Farwell fumbled a punt, at the Steers' 25 yard line. Time was running out, and the Mustangs went to the air. On a third down play, Scott Scaff hit Gabriel Mancini on a 14-yard touchdown pass. The play came with just nine seconds left in the

half. Venable's kick made the score 17-0.

"That gave us a big lift, and some momentum, going into the half," said Coach Bill Talley.

The Mustangs never could get into the end zone in the second half, when untimely penalties hurt the team on several occasions.

Once, Venable broke loose on a 65-yard run to the Farwell three, only to have the run called back.

"We hurt ourselves with some bad penalties. We're going to have to correct this situation," Talley said.

Talley had praise for the play of cornerbacks Noah Villa and Albert Espinosa. "They were in the right place at the right time, and pretty well shut down Farwell's running game," Talley said.

In addition, Villa had an interception to end Farwell's last scoring threat.

Also, noseguard Tom Fuentes was cited for his play against the Steers.

Venable gained 73 yards on 17 carries. Ware had 42 yards on 11 carries and Scaff 50 on only three carries. In addition to Venable's 65-yard gain that was called back, Scaff had a 20-yarder erased.

Bovina held Farwell to just one first down in the first half.

Talley also praised the punting of Scaff. Farwell was unable to return any of Scaff's booming kicks, and fumbled the one kick that led to a Mustang score.

This Friday, the team visits Lorenzo for another district game. The Hornets are 1-4 for the season and 0-2 in district play.

But Talley said that the Mustangs will have to be on guard Friday.

"Lorenzo runs a wide-open offense, with unusual formations. We'll have to be mentally alert. They also have a good linebacker who has been out with an injury. He may be able to play against us," Talley said.

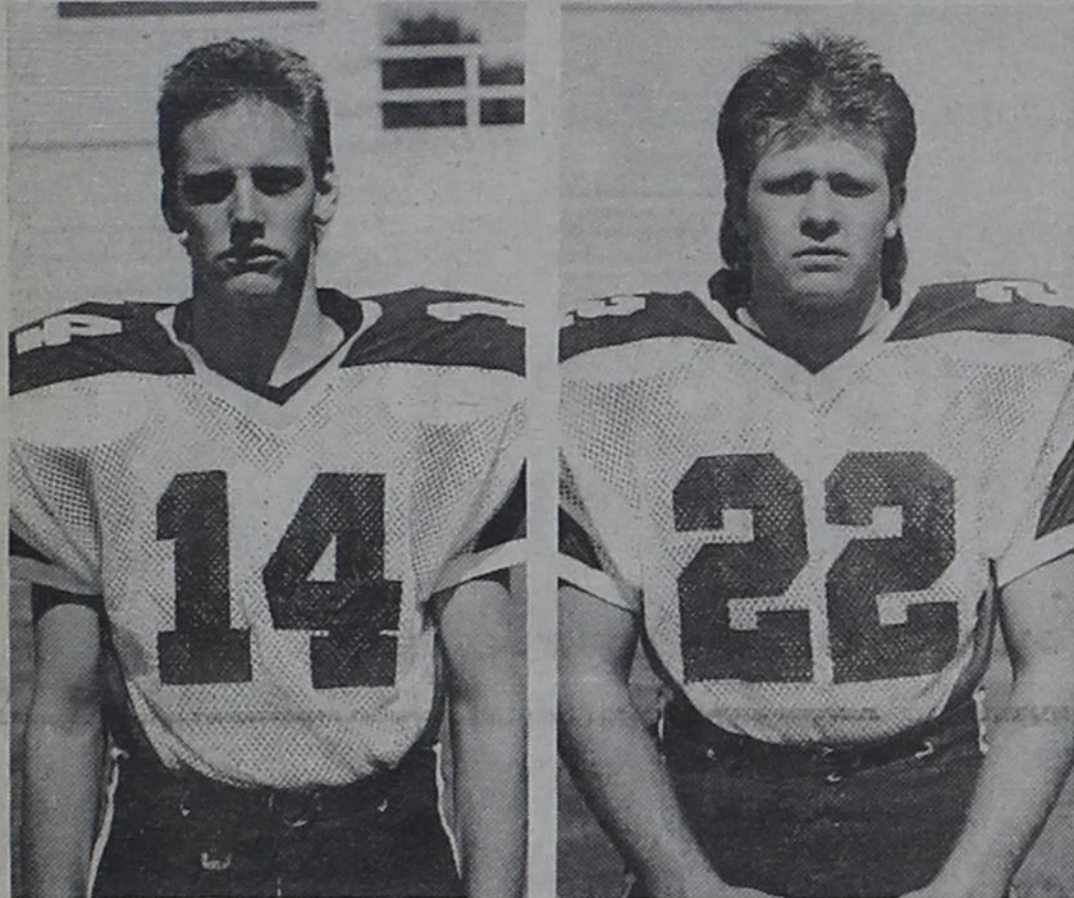

## School Corner

Concerns nationwide over Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and a recent memo from the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Department

of Health have prompted the Bovina Schools to study amendments to its communicable disease policies.

It is important that we have policies in place before any need arises in the district.

In a memorandum issued jointly by the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Department of Health, school districts have been told that Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), the virus causing AIDS, "is not transmitted in everyday school settings." Affected individuals should be dealt with on a case-by-case basis, depending on the risk of transmission.

Generally, students must be placed in a regular classroom, except in unusual circumstances. The State Board of Health's communicable disease chart for schools specifies excludable conditions that include open sores, or skin eruptions, biting behavior, and a lack of toilet training as relevant factors in making that decision. Students who must be excluded from the regular classroom must nevertheless be provided education, most often through the special education program.

Employees must be allowed to continue their work duties in most circumstances, according to the Commissioner of Education and the Commissioner of the State Health Department. Whether the district maintains an individual in the regular work assignment will depend on whether the condition interferes with the performances of regular duties.

The Texas Association of School Boards, of which Bovina ISD is a member, has prepared sample policies that reflect the latest legal developments and recommendations from medical and education experts.

It is important that the board and the administration be prepared if any student or employee contracts HIV. We are presently in the process of providing education to employees, parents and students on the nature, effect and prevention of the virus, as recommended by TEA and the Texas Department of Health.

Education is the only key that we have right now against the further spread of this dreaded virus, since there is no medical procedure for preventing or curing it.

# Scotts Return From European Tour

Gene and Edna Scott have returned home recently from touring eight countries in 26 days.

Edna's sister, Bobbie Mitchell of Riverside, California met the Scotts in Dallas and their flight was direct from Dallas to London on American Airlines.

The group took a bus to the east coast of England and then travelled on a big ferry to the North Sea of Denmark. Gene said it was a 700 foot ferry and they were on it 21 hours before reaching their destination. Highlight there was the Westminster Abbey, regal setting of coronation ceremonies since 1066.

In Esbjerg, they boarded a coach across the Jutland peninsula to elegant Fjordside resort of Vejle and close by were two Viking runic stones set up by King Harold Bluetooth in memory of his father.

While in Norway, they visited the Parliament and Royal Palace which included the Akershus Castle, the 14th century fortress guarding the harbor.

They visited the Heddal Stave Church, an amazing wooden structure dating from the 13th century.

They went by ferry to Bergen and were guided through typical Scandinavian towns. They visited the home of composer Edward Grieg and then to the 12th century Bergenhus Castle.

Then they travelled up to Stalheim for dazzling views of the Naerodal Canyon then back down to sea level to board the steamer and travelled two hours along blue-green Sognefjord.

They travelled through beautiful country in Norway and this was the Scotts' favorite of all countries. Gene said all of the countryside looked as though it had been freshly manicured and was beautiful!

They were now in Sweden and travelled along Lake Mjosa to the ice skating center of Hamar and across the hills to Elverum, rebuilt after total destruction in World War II.

The Scotts travelled to Stockholm and viewed the site of Alfred Nobel's ammunition factory, the ancient garrison town of Orebro and modern Eskilstuna-renowned for its stainless steel, are milestones enroute through Sweden's Lake District. That afternoon, they visited Gripsholm, King Vasa's fortress-castle on Lake Malaren.

The next day, they went sightseeing in the town of Stockholm and visited Town Hall, shops, saw sky-scrapers, modern apartments and bridges on the shores. They visited Riddarholm Church, burial place for Swedish kings. They visited the Royal Palace, and the medieval island heart of the city.

They travelled to Denmark and saw the industrial centers that contributed to the wealth of the country.

They took an excursion to North Zealand's castles and that evening

they visited Tivoli Gardens.

They boarded a steamer and left Copenhagen bound for Hamburg, Germany. On the way, they went by the fairy-tale island of Funen. They took a fast ride through the rolling plains of northern Germany and saw many sights in the area.

The group visited the world's largest flower auction in Amsterdam. In London, they saw the ornamental gardens of Henry VIII's magnificent Tudor Place of Hampton Court. They saw the vast cathedral in Salisbury, the ultimate in Early English Gothic.

Another point of interest was Shakespeare's birthplace.

In Scotland, they visited the Carlisle Castle, where the blacksmith once used to wed runaway couples.

The eight countries the Scotts travelled in were Denmark,

Norway, Sweden, Germany, Holland, England, Scotland and Wales.

Gene said \$1.07 American money equaled one pound in England. He said there were McDonald's over there, too, and a hamburger would cost six American dollars and a three-ounce steak dinner cost \$25 in American money.

Scott said the farmers in Europe were in financial trouble also because there was too much grain, meat and dairy products. The income tax in Norway was 70 per cent of a person's earnings. All of their health care is paid for by the state and many homes were furnished and provided.

The Scotts thoroughly enjoyed their vacation to these countries but said it was real good to be back home in Bovina.
