Nearly 200 Attend Of C Banquet; Work Is Recounted

Nearly 200 members of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, their wives, husbands and guests Wednesday night heard of the 1946 accomplishments and 1947 aims of the organization at a buffet banquet in the Roof Garden of the Connelley Hotel.

They also heard Rev. Durwood Fleming of Houston, guest speaker, stress the need for opportunity of a chance to contribute to the welfare, growth, and management of a community by everyone in it, no matter how rich or how poor.

The matter of bigness, so often stressed by chambers of commerce, is not always the measure of how well a town is getting along, he said.

President Fred Brown of the Chamber of Commerce told of the organization's activities during the past year, and of the coming here of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company's Haydite plant, of the Rea Haydite Products Company, of the Hollywood Corset Company's brassiere plant, of the Horton Ceramics plant, and of other industries.

He pointed out displays of these and other local industries that had been placed along the walls of the hall.

Brown also pointed out that the Chamber of Commerce has adopted aims for 1947, including a farmers' market, more adequate housing for Eastland, a highway from Eastland to Lingleville and one from Carbon to Rising Star, rural school consolidation and livestock farm and dairy improvements.

Mr. Fleming, former pastor of the First Methodist Church in Eastland and now pastor of St. Luke's Methodist Church in Houston, was introduced by W. B. Pickens.

Mr. and Mrs. Fleming were to leave Thursday for Houston.

The church there is a new one, and has no building yet, but meets in a high school building. It had not been fully organized when Mr. Fleming took charge.

Former Moran Man Buys Cabinet Shop

Side Issues

During the recent cold weather, we could have filled The Record twice over with feature material about how the cold, ice and snow affected various people of the community, if our limited staff had had the time to get out and dig up the material.

Bill Jessop showed me some ice skates and said he was going to try out the ice on one of the lakes, but I never got a chance to ask him if he did.

Both of the lakes were frozen over solid, a phenomenon rare enough in this land of usually mild winters.

The five youngsters of the Vermillion family, who had never seen so much ice before in their lives, had quite a time Sunday slipping around on the shore ice at Ringling Lake.

Johnny Kilgore told me the Eastland Creamery met unusual demands quite well, since other suppliers quit sending milk into Eastland County during the cold spell, but he had some odd problems at his plant.

For one thing, he had trouble with his refrigeration equipment. In the coldest weather in at least 17 years, this seems odd, but his problem was that he had to keep refrigeration going in his ice cream room, and the cooling tower on top of his building froze solid when they ran water through it.

Johnny also had trouble with his steam line freezing up—it would freeze up a lot faster than the cold water lines, he said a fact which science verified, but which I never could get straightened out in my head.

Something about molecules and stuff like that.

Johnny also had some experiences bucking drifts to get milk from dairy farmers who were snowed in.

A house south of Cisco, he snow-plowed his way through a lane that was piled four or five feet deep, driving a jeep. The farmer and his family, isolated since the second snowfall, certainly were glad to see him, Johnny said.

During the coldest weather, while I was trying to keep various fires warm, my heart went out to postman, milk delivermen, utility maintenance men and others who had to buck the snow and ice every day to get their jobs done. It was quite a task in many instances, and we of Eastland can be proud and thankful that the jobs were done and our lives were upset as little as they were.

Hardest hit, possibly, were owners of flocks of laying hens, most of which quit laying when the hard freeze came.

Basketball Tourney To Begin Friday; Five Sessions Set

With eight teams participating, the Eastland High School Basketball Tournament will begin at 1:30 p. m. Friday, and will continue through Saturday evening.

The first game will be a non-tournament affair between girls' teams from Eastland and Morton Valley. Then will come a boys' game between Olden and Morton Valley.

Eastland and Hamilton will play a District 10-A, non-tournament game in the evening Friday, and Cisco and Ranger will play a tournament game that also will count in District 9-AA.

The Friday and Saturday evening sessions will begin at 7 p. m. Play will begin at 9 a. m. Saturday, and again at 1 p. m. Saturday.

Adult admission to any of the five sessions will be 25 cents, or \$1.00 for all five sessions.

Teams taking part will be Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, De Leon, Olden, Morton Valley, Woodson and Santa Anna.

The tournament will be on a double elimination basis. The third Friday night game, in addition to the Eastland-Hamilton and Cisco-Ranger tilts, will be between Eastland and Olden all-stars. It will not be a tournament contest.

The tournament will dedicate the remodeled Eastland High gymnasium, which has more seating capacity and a sanded and improved playing court.

Mavericks Beat DeLeon In Opener

The Eastland High School Mavericks basketball team started its 1947 title chase in winning fashion Tuesday night by edging out the tall DeLeon team, 20 to 19, in DeLeon.

Second conference game will be played against Hamilton on the Eastland court Friday night as a part of the Eastland basketball tournament. However, Hamilton is not entered in the tourney, and the tilt will not count as a tournament contest.

Wednesday night, the Mavericks entertained for the first time on their home court since the gym was remodeled, and lost to Ranger by a tight 18 to 16 count. The Eastland B team won its game with the Ranger B's by a big score.

Coach Johnny Little of the Mavericks said that Gorman and Hamilton are considered at this time to be chief title threats in the district.

Low Temperature Mark Here 4 Below

Although snow still was on the ground in spots, Eastland County's weather had moderated Thursday to the point that 24 hours had passed without freezing temperatures, for the first time since a cold north wind blew in a week ago Sunday.

Thursday's maximum showed 42 and the minimum 34 on Weatherman J. A. Beard's gauges.

Coldest weather of the prolonged spell came Saturday morning, when Beard's thermometer nose-dived to four degrees below zero. On both Friday and Sunday mornings the low mark was five above.

On Sunday, the maximum temperature reading was 41, the first time it had climbed above the frost level in slightly over a week, and the big thaw was on, with slush underfoot the order of the day for the next two or three days.

Monday's minimum was 14, Tuesday's 25, Wednesday's 27.

Beard said that the moisture content of the 12 inches of snow in two falls was about 60 of an inch.

About 400 Attend Hearing On Works For Leon River

Possibly the most comprehensive arguments yet made for building dams and flood control structures on the upper and middle Leon River were presented Wednesday at a hearing in Comanche attended by 400 interested persons from towns, farms and ranches along the river including about 30 from Eastland.

The hearing was held by U. S. Army Engineers.

The Eastland County case for flood control and water supply dams was made by George I. Lane, Farm Security Administration representative State Rep. L. R. Pearson of Ranger. Dr. A. K. Wier of Ranger County Agent J. M. Cooper, City Manager K. B. Tanner of Eastland and Mayor J. J. Kelly of Ranger.

Lane said that erosion rapidly was devastating the agricultural possibilities of the West Cross Timbers area of Texas; that the life of the section depends on the five inches of topsoil that is left above the clay subsoil; and that about the only other source of wealth left is the pecan trees along the creek and river bottoms that cannot be eroded away.

Pearson made the point that one large dam near Belton, as proposed, would not answer the needs of flood control along the river, but that a series of dams is needed, and such a project would pay for itself in 20 years.

Dr. Wier backed this up by saying if he had the money, he would build the project as an individual, with a profit motive.

Cooper said the Leon has caused an average loss of \$200.00 per year in crops in Eastland County alone by floods, and that 15,000 to 20,000 of river valley lands in the county—the best and richest lands in the county—could be cultivated now if floods could be prevented.

Tanner and Kelly said that Eastland and Ranger both need additional municipal water supplies which could be provided by a dam on the Leon at Colony Creek, about 10 miles south of Ranger and southeast of Eastland.

Other proposed damsites are at Mangum, south of Eastland; near Proctor; on Cowhouse Creek in Coryell County; near Hamilton, and near Jonesboro.

Delegates from numerous towns and communities along the river talked for five hours, telling of flood damage, erosion control needs, municipal water supply needs, and loss of population in rural area because of erosion.

The situation was characterized briefly and humorously by County Agent Dudley Everett of Stephenville when he told of the 50-foot waterfront lots at Matagorda, on the Gulf coast, which now are "five miles deep—stretched out by the silt which has filled in between the coast and Matagorda Island."

"Boys, that's our land from up here that's washed down," he said, "and they don't want it down there. We used to send them good topsoil, but now we're just sending them clay subsoil, and it's no good."

Lots Bring From \$2 To \$34 Apiece; More Suits To Come

Ninety-one lots in Ranger and a 40-acre tract of farm land near Rising Star brought a total of \$2,100.25 in a sheriff's sale held on the south courthouse steps in Eastland Tuesday.

Sheriff J. B. Williams, acting in the capacity of public auctioneer for the first time in his brief career, conducted the sale, while Deputy Sheriff Cotton Graham and Horace Walker, special tax attorney for the county who filed suits to sell the property, did the paper work.

A crowd of 40 to 50 people stood around, with a few bidding on most of the property offered, and many offering bids on specific lots adjacent to their homes.

Former County Attorney Earl Conner of Eastland, who helped prepare the suits under which tax judgments were obtained on the property, was one of the most consistent bidders.

Checks or cash were tendered on all bids at the conclusion of the sale, and Graham said Thursday that deeds to the property were being prepared.

Some lots were bid in as low as \$2 apiece, while the highest bids were \$34 apiece for two lots.

However, the 40-acre tract of farm land near Rising Star was bid in by W. E. Tyler, Rising Star banker, for \$825, or \$20.50 per acre. The one bid thus made up about two-fifths of the sale total.

Walker said many other suits remain to be filed in his program to clear the county's tax rolls of all long past due delinquencies.

Taxes had been delinquent for 15 to 20 years or more on most of the property sold Tuesday.

332 Criminal Suits Dismissed By Judge

One of newly sworn in County Attorney N. E. Grisham's New Year's presents was a clean criminal docket.

In a year-end move just before he went out of office, Earl Conner, Jr., the previous holder of the office, requested Judge G. L. Day-enport to dismiss 332 criminal cases that had been filed over the years from 1932 to 1946.

The suits were for everything from burglary to murder without malice. Conner in his petition for dismissal said officials had insufficient evidence to obtain convictions in the cases.

Dr. Cox Warns Against Insufficient Cooking Of Pork

AUSTIN, TEXAS. — Now that the winter season is here and pork and pork products are more freely used, warning against insufficient cooking of pork is given by Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer. Trichinosis is caused by a parasite in the muscles of pigs.

Dr. Cox explained that a disease condition known as trichinosis is caused by a microscopic organism called the trichina or muscle worm. The young worms, or larvae, are found in the muscles of infected pigs. When this meat is eaten raw or is undercooked, the unharmed larvae grow in the human intestines into adult worms which are carried by the lymphatic tissue and blood stream to the

muscles where they become encysted. This period of invasion gives rise to the symptoms of the disease. The severity of the illness is dependent upon the number of trichinae originally consumed.

"While the adult parasites are in the human intestines they may cause acute diarrhea," Dr. Cox said, "which at first can be mistaken for typhoid fever or dysentery. This may start anywhere from the first to the fourth day after eating the infested pork and may last one to several days. Later a puffiness of the eyes may appear together with various degrees of pain in the muscles, particularly those of the calf of the leg, the upper arm, the shoulders and the jaws."

Dr. Cox declared that since no adequate treatment is known, prevention is very important. The worms cannot be seen by the unaided eye, so inspection of pork cannot be depended upon to protect from this type of infection. The only sure safeguard is to be certain that all pork and pork products are thoroughly cooked,

whether processed at home or purchased. Many of the more serious and fatal cases have been traced to eating raw smoked sausage or raw pork pudding.

Since it has been estimated that approximately five per cent of all swine are infested with trichinae,

it is being emphasized that the invariable rule before consuming any pork or pork product is to see that it is cooked until all natural color is gone and no evidence of blood can be detected. This is the only safe rule to follow, according to the state health officer.

He is fond of fishing and has a lake on the place and is building a clubhouse and boathouse.

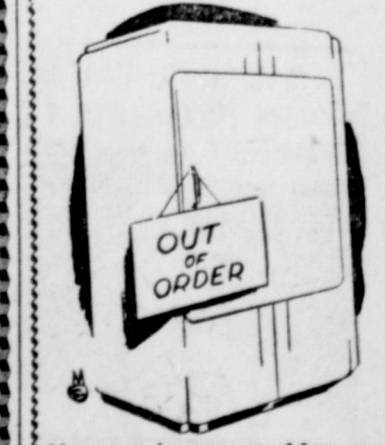

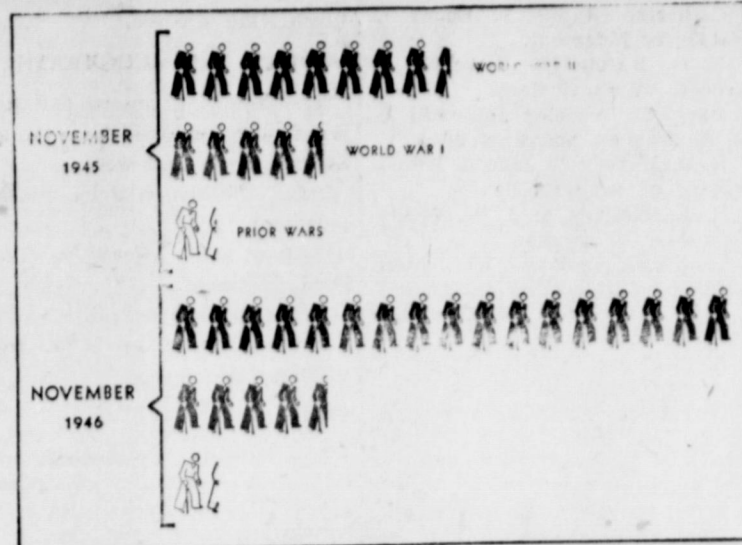

WORLD WAR II PENSION ROLL DOUBLES IN YEAR



The number of World War II veterans drawing disability compensation has doubled during the past year, statistics recently released by the Veterans Administration reveal. While the World War I roll remained stationary, and deaths cut those from prior wars by 8,000, the list from pensionable disabilities incurred during the last year climbed from 859,762 to 1,682,216 between December 1, 1945 and the same date this year. Each figure in above drawing represents 100,000 active cases.

cents a dozen before the northern blew in, promptly responded to the age-old low of supply and demand and scooted back toward the upper 50's.

No severe outbreak of flu or even heavy colds seemed to accompany the extra cold weather, which was a blessing. In past years, many a milder spell of cold has had, it seemed to me, half the people I usually see home in bed fighting off incipient pneumonia.

People in this area of the world aren't equipped with clothing, or even homes, to fight the effects of near-zero weather, and I believe most of us came out surprisingly well.

However, there was many a burst water pipe to be fixed when the big thaw came, and the plumbers of Eastland have had their work cut out for them.

Several people whose plumbing was not protected had no water supply in their houses for nearly a week, an one man told me he had breaks in four water pipes at once.

However, our city water system functioned well, in contrast to Fort Worth where more than 60 breaks in mains were reported.

Retail stores in Eastland report that trade was slowed by the weather, but held up remarkably well considering.

For many, the slow-down was very welcome, since they were in the middle of year-end inventories anyway.

Farmers, while most were snow-bound for longer or less periods welcomed the cold snap as promising better pastures and better tillage in the spring and summer.

The weather especially was seen as a boom for winter cover crops and winter grains, since most such

crops had grown too quickly in the warm parts of November and December, and promised a rank growth that would not be as good as that produced by a mixture of cold weather.

The freezing weather also, I was told, tended to loosen solid around the roots of such crops, promising better growth in the spring when the weather warms again.

Some cattle and a good many goats were lost in the severest cold, but not nearly as many as might have been, ranchers said.

One rancher with several hundred goats reported he lost only three or four old ones, and another with 600, I heard, lost 10, even though he had no shelter.

So, on the whole, Eastland County seems to have come out of the cold spell quite well, and ready for just about anything except another one.

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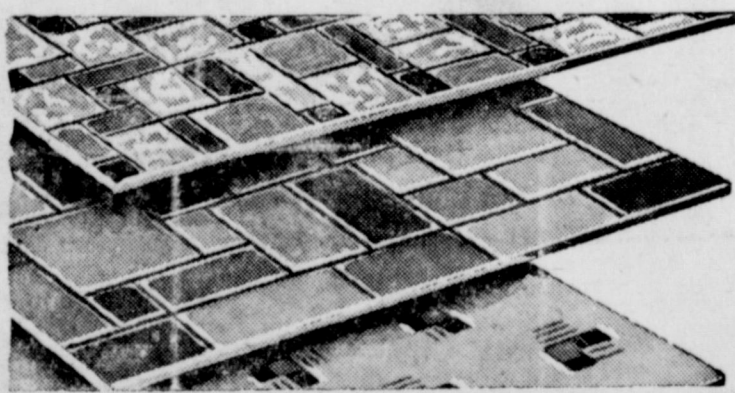
