Spring Tops List Of Paramedics

The first week-end in May 1982, Don Spring began a paramedic course in Amarillo that would take seven and a half months to complete. The course consisted of eight hours of classroom lecture and eight hours of clinical rotation each week-end until December 11.

Lectures and clinical work during this time involved advanced life support in emergency care including I.V.'s, drug therapy, cardio-monitoring, and respiratory therapy. Don worked in the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center, ICU, CCU, Pediatrics and respiratory unit of Northwest Texas Hospital. He also spent time working with the AMS Ambulance. One week in September, Don had to work every day from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. in surgery practicing respiratory therapy.

To complete the class and become a paramedic, the class had to pass seven skills and a written state exam of 200 questions. On December 11, Don took the state test. The 23rd of December Don received a call from the EMS Region I Office in Amarillo that he had indeed passed the test

Commissioners Hold Final '82 Meeting

The need for maintaining a dump ground in the Lazbuddie area, which would meet state requirements, was a main item of business at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Wednesday, December 22.

Dr. Henry C. Moritz, Jr., Regional Director for the Texas Department of Health, met with the court and explained some of the requirements and needs for the dump ground.

The commissioners stated that before they would accept the responsibility of maintaining the dump ground, they would have to know how much work and expense would be required to meet requirements of the State Health Department. After a lengthy discussion, Dr. Moritz said he would have an engineer meet with the court on January 24, to work out the details.

Discussion was held concerning re-establishing an outreach office for mental health/mental retardation in Friona. This office would be maintained by the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview. This item was also tabled for further study.

The court discussed the new Job Training Partnership Act (Public Law 97-300), which replaces the CETA program late in 1983. A resolution was passed for the county to become a member of a Job Training Consortium, so as to be able to participate in the new program.

Quick Action Averts Tragedy Here Friday

Quick action by representatives of Energas Company, along with the cooperation and work of City of Bovina employees and the residents of Bovina prevented any major problems and kept discomfort to a minimum last Friday following a break in the gas company's line near the city.

The break occurred between the Oklahoma Lane Highway and the Cemetery, just south of town. This was about one-half mile from the main source of gas coming into Bovina, according to Dan Koelzer, Bovina's Energas manager.

As a result of the break, gas pressure to customers in Bovina dropped drastically for a time.

When the pressure was restored, Energas employees had to go door to door and make sure that heaters were still operating, and had not gone out during the pressure drop.

"We found about 30 to 40 places where the stoves had gone off," said Ralph Shirley, Energas manager at Friona. It was explained that pressure in the main line dropped from a normal of 350 pounds to around 198 pounds, and that at the residential source, this pressure dropped from a normal of ten pounds to about two.

Energas employees and officials converged on Bovina at an early hour Friday morning to help with the emergency.

The day had originally been designated as a company holiday for New Year's, but the holiday went out the window in the face of the emergency.

Some 25 Energas officials and employees came to Bovina and worked from around 6 a.m. until 5 p.m., checking each customer in the city, for safety purposes. Koelzer said his day, which started at about 3:45 a.m., lasted until 10:30 that night.

In cases where residents were out of town, and the home was locked, the gas service was cut off temporarily, and at the same time the city cut off the water service, so as to guard against frozen pipes, flooding, etc.

In several cases, where people were gone from home, neighbors had keys, so the homes could be checked. Residents also assisted by calling their friends and neighbors to warn them of the potential danger of pilot lights which might have gone out.

When the city's gas supply had been restored from an alternate source, Koelzer drove to Parmerton Hill and closed a valve to isolate the Bovina section, and assure that the city of Friona's customers would not also have the same problem.

"Everyone worked together like clockwork to eliminate the problem. I really appreciate the cooperation of the City of Bovina, Tommy Bonds, Andy Garza and Pat Kunselman, for working with us," Koelzer said.

"Also, the people of Bovina understood the problem, and jumped in to help the best they could. We feel very fortunate that there were no disasters. We had some luck involved. I thought the response by the Energas people showed the attitude by the company toward their customers," he added.

Koelzer pointed out that in addition to the employees working who were scheduled to have the day off, a couple of men from Hereford came who had been on vacation for the week. Managers came from

Friona and Dimmitt, and the district manager from Hereford was here.

Koelzer was first notified of the break by Lester Rhinehart at about 3:45 a.m. Rhinehart lives close to where the break occurred, and heard a "noise like a jet plane." Before he was completely dressed, Koelzer had another call from C.E. Trimble, he said.

The feeder line is an eight-inch gas line, and Koelzer said the break probably produced a full eight-inch opening in the line.

Company officials said that had action not been taken when it was, within a few minutes the communities of Friona and Muleshoe could each have had their gas service similarly affected.

Area Gets 10'' Moist Snowfall

The Bovina area received a nice snow the day after Christmas, with measurements of around ten inches on the average.

The snow began in the early morning on December 26, and continued throughout the day and into the night. It was accompanied by very little wind, and for the most part, stayed right where it fell.

Trees and shrubbery made some beautiful winter pictures the day following the snowfall. Fences also made a pretty sight, as the tops were lined by the snowflakes.

"I think most people got around ten inches of snow, and it was pretty wet. It should be equal to about an inch of moisture," said Earl Whitten of Sherry Grain.

Whitten said the snow would be a big boost to the area's wheat crop, which was off to a better than average start, and the moisture is well-timed.

The day or two following the snow proved to be a nightmare for travellers, many of whom found themselves in snowbanks off the highways in the area.

Snowplows operated by the Texas Highway Department ran continuously during the week, and by week's end most of the main roads were clear. Hampering the clearing efforts to a large extent were low temperatures which prevented melting and some wind which put some snow back onto the roadway after it had been cleared.

Aside from the general run of fender-benders and drivers getting into the ditches, no bad wrecks were reported in the area during the storm's aftermath, and authorities felt this was a lucky break, due to the after Christmas traffic, which continued in spite of the road conditions.

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Mustangs Win Tourney Make Season Record 11-1

The Bovina Mustangs' basketball team won their second tournament of the season, and also suffered their first loss, just prior to the Christmas holiday break.

The Mustangs captured the Farwell tournament title, scoring wins over Olton, 82-55; Texico, N.M., 71-59; and Plains, 72-59 in the championship game.

The Ponies got good scoring balance during the tournament, running their season record at that point to 10-0. In the win over Olton, Joe Black scored 18 points and Joe Pat Wright 16 points to lead the Mustang attack.

In the hard-fought win over Texico, Richard Shepherd scored 24 points and Dale Gilbreath chipped in 19. When the Mustangs downed Plains, Shepherd scored 24 points, Gilbreath 16 and Greg McClaran 13.

In a game December 21, the Mustangs took on Texico for the second time within a week, and suffered their first loss of the season, 56-54. Texico broke on top, 16-6 at the end of the first quarter, and the

Mustangs, although closing the gap, never could get the advantage.

Fouls cost Bovina dearly, as both Shepherd and Jay Judd fouled out of the game. Each team scored 21 field goals, but Texico had two more free throws for the difference. Bovina shot excellently from the free throw line, hitting 12 of their 15 attempts (80 per cent), but did not get near as many opportunities as did the Wolverines, who took 26 shots and hit 14.

In their final pre-holiday game, Bovina took on Adrian, and won the game in a slugfest, 88-84. The Mustangs overcame a 22-18 Adrian lead at the end of the first quarter. Shepherd scored 27, Gilbreath 20 and Judd 17 to pace the Mustang point makers.

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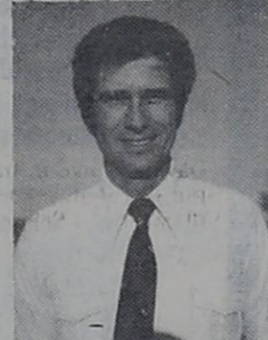

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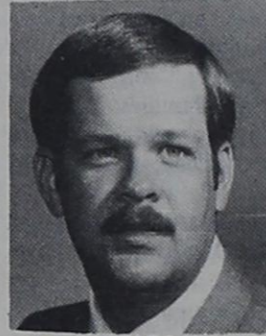

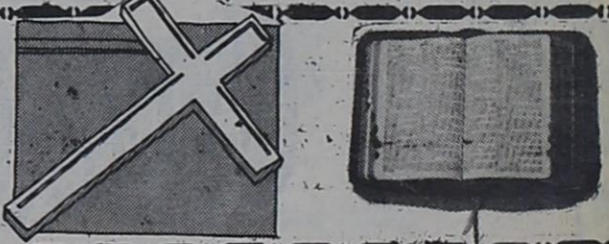
