the state, farmers of Eastland nonths from now that the wheat harvest look like a

one factor could keep the peanut acreage in the county from rising above last year's record, and that is the record planting of hairy vetch that may be harvested for seed too late to replant the land in peanuts.

About 12,000 to 15,000 acres of the county's sandy land is planted in vetch, and this crop could put a half million dollars into pockets of the farmers of the county, if the harvest is good.

Vetch harvesting in earnest is expected to start in about a week

Wheat farmers are jubilant about setting \$2 a bushel for wheat, but peanut farmers of Eastland County got about \$2.75 per bushel for pea nuts last year, and are assured of a slightly better price this yearand they grow more peanuts per acre than the wheat farmer group

However, there is more in the peanut crop, and acreages of individual farmers usually are a good deal smaller, as a conse-

The farmer who has both vetch and peanuts should have a good deal of money in his pockets by next fall, barring the aforesaid weather calamities.

Next year may be another thing. Powell said marketing quotas are likely to be restored on peanuts





Facts About Feed

A. A cheap feed is cheap be cause it contains low priced ingredients. B. Cheap feeds do not have the feeding value of quality feeds although the analysis tag may be similar. C. It often requires 25% to 30% more cheap feed to produce a dozen eggs, or pound of meat or a gallon of milk than does a quality feed.

QUALITY FEEDS PAY DIVIDENDS

1. It costs more money to make good feed. 2. Quality feeds contain quality ingredients of high nutritive value. 3. Quality feed will produce more eggs, more pounds of meat and more gallons of milk and at a lower unit cost than a cheap feed.
