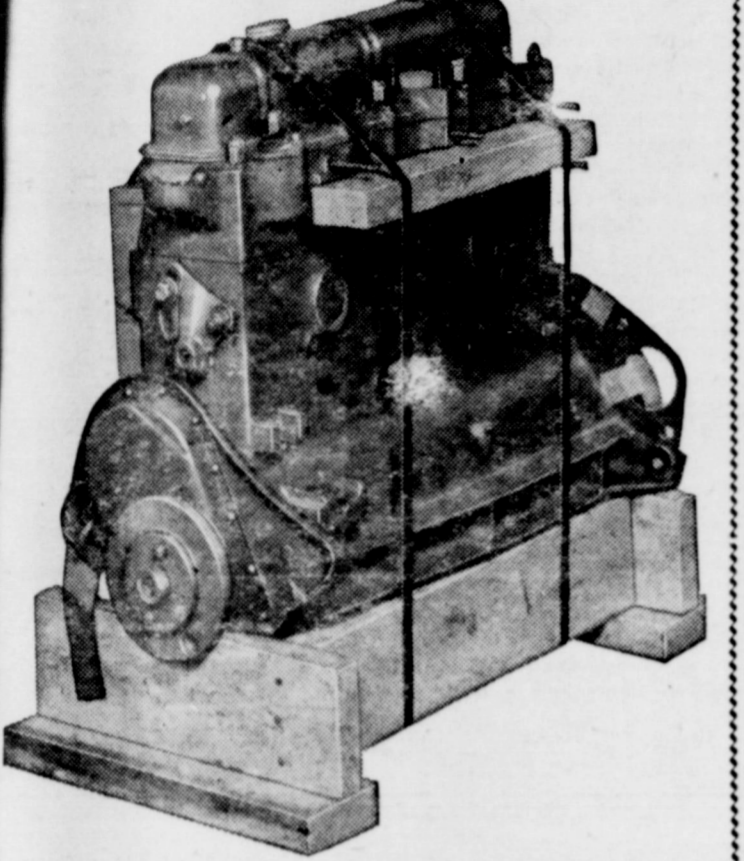

### Facts About Feed

A. A cheap feed is cheap because it contains low priced ingredients. B. Cheap feeds do not have the feeding value of quality feeds although the analysis tag may be similar. C. It often requires 25% to 30% more cheap feed to produce a dozen eggs, or pound of meat or a gallon of milk than does a quality feed.

### QUALITY FEEDS PAY DIVIDENDS

1. It costs more money to make good feed. 2. Quality feeds contain quality ingredients of high nutritive value. 3. Quality feed will produce more eggs, more pounds of meat and more gallons of milk and at a lower unit cost than a cheap feed.

### RED CHAIN BROILER MASH

Let's consider for a moment the broiler producer—Where 9 pounds of good quality feed will produce a 2 pound fryer, while 9 pounds of cheaper feed will produce only 1 1/2 pound of fryer.
