CONGRATULATIONS to Coach Marks Lanham and the Bovina Mustang basketball team on a super year. Very few people imagined when their season started that the Mustangs would stampede to the district title, let alone win it with an unbeaten record.

It had been 22 long years since the team made it to the playoffs, but the 1983 Mustangs made up for that discrepancy. And they added frosting to the cake with an impressive win over state-ranked Shallowater in their bi-district game.

The team's battle against Clint in the area playoff game at Monahans will long be remembered by the team and its fans as the "game of fouls," or the time the team and its fans made a two-day trip for a 1½ hour game.

When you outscore another team by 14 points in field goals, most time you expect to win, and the Mustangs definitely played well enough to win.

Coach Lanham gives credit to Clint on their free throw shooting. "They took advantage of their opportunities. Some teams might get 36 free throws in a game, but not many would make 32 of them," he said this week.

The fact that Clint beat Lorenzo in the regional tournament and went on to face Morton in the finals proved they were a good team. It was unfortunate for Bovina that they came up with one of their top performances against the Mustangs (but on the other side of the coin, so did Bovina against Shallowater)

did Bovina against Shallowater).

The fact that both Bovina and Clint had to make killing trips for their area playoff has come in for a lot of discussion, particularly following the 500-mile round trip by the team and fans for the playoff.

Why couldn't the UIL incorporate this game as a part of the regional tournament, and make it a three-game tournament instead of two?

For years and decades, the state tournament in Austin has been a three-game affair for the lower classification teams.

This would put teams from this area getting an extra trip to Lubbock (or Levelland in the case of class A schools), instead of one of those mankilling trips.

This may not be a big factor downstate, but here in our area, it's a definite factor. Since the two-team format is just coming into being, this might give the UIL officials something to chew on.

When you have to take a "short cut" that involves driving over 200 miles across the edge of New Mexico to get to your playoff game, I think even the folks in Austin might admit that they don't have the playoff system completely refined at this stage.


WE SINCERELY appreciate those advertisers who gave their salute to the individual Mustang players in last week's issue of the Blade.

# Producers To Elect Director On March 15

Parmer County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Producer Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at an 8 a.m. breakfast meeting on Tuesday, March 15 in the Bovina Restaurant, Bovina.

Announcement of the election comes from Bert Williams of Farwell, current Parmer County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Donald Christian, also of Farwell, Businessman Director.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG By-Laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, review and answer questions about current farm programs and about recent and planned PCG activities.



# Local Youngsters Win \$18,000 At Houston

Bovina youngsters had a successful trip to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo last week, with one estimation placing the amount of prize money at almost \$18,000.

Billy Cupit, Bovina FFA member, exhibited the breed champion Duroc, and then showed his animal for Grand Champion Barrow honors. Cupit had earlier won the heavyweight class with his entry.

In the auction sale on Saturday, the Cupit barrow sold for \$6888.00, or \$27.00 per pound.

Jon Riddle had the second place lightweight Duroc, and his animal sold for \$9.00 per pound, or \$1953.00.

Other FFA members showing barrows which made the sale included Dale Gilbreath, fourth place lightweight Chester White; Misti Boozer, sixth place mediumweight Hampshire; Jeff Steelman, tenth place lightweight Spot; Joe Black, 15th place heavyweight Crossbred; and Marie Pesch, 15th lightweight other pure breeds.

Bret Whitten's Chianina steer placed seventh and made the auction

In the sheep show's medium wool class, Kim McClaran exhibited the-11th place middleweight animal; Bret Whitten had the 19th place middleweight; and Terry Moore owned the 24th place heavyweight lamb.

Ted Clayton and Kevin Smith showed heifers.

Clayton placed 11th and Smith 13th in the "scramble" show. (The boys had won their heifers at last year's calf scramble held in conjunction with the show). In the junior show, Clayton placed 15th and Smith 17th.

Jack Dillard, vo-ag instructor, estimated that the seven animals from Bovina which made the sale brought over \$11,000, and counting floor prices on those which did not, the showmen brought home nearly \$18,000.

Other FFA members showing barrows were Joanna Clayton, Mark Clayton, Denver Riddle, Casey Riddle, Tracy Moore, Donnell Garner, David Boozer and Mendi Rhodes. Jimmy Heard entered a lamb.

Bovina 4-H Club members competing in the show were Sharlet Johnson, whose Berkshire barrow placed second in the lightweight class and Charles Johnson, whose Chester White barrow placed 13th.

Zed Stewart entered a Charolais steer, and David Boozer entered a lamb, a Hampshire barrow and was entered in the calf scramble.

Accompanying the FFA and 4-H youngsters to Houston were Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Boozer, Mr. and Mrs. Jon Riddle, Mr. and Mrs. Billy

Parmer County entered 23 barrows in the show, with 16 of them placing high enough to make the auction sale.

Showing how competitive and the interest level for the Houston show, this year the county was obliged to hold a qualifying show, which was held the Thursday previously at Friona. Some 39 families were seeking the county's alloted 23 barrow entries.

# Friona Bank Named As County Depository

Naming the county's official bank depository for the next two years was a main item of business at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Monday, February 28.

The commission had received bids from the three banks in Parmer County, First State Bank of Bovina, Friona State Bank of Friona and Security State Bank of Farwell.

After a thorough discussion of the bids, which included a call to the office of the State Treasurer to check a provision on one of the bids, a motion was passed unanimously to award the bid to Friona State Bank, for the next two years.

In reply to a request from citizens who had inquired about the possibility of acquiring furniture from the courthouse, the court's concensus was that the county had no excess furniture, and that it would sell none.

An easement was granted to Five Area Telephone Cooperative for laying underground telephone lines in Precinct 4 (the Lazbuddie precinct).

Payment was approved for replacement of two heaters in the courthouse, in the amount of \$1,833.20. Payment of a visiting court reporter's fees, amounting to \$60.26, was approved.

Approval of three bills for work done in clearing the right-of-way for proposed Farm Road 3333 were approved. The bills were in the

amounts of \$222.30; \$3,736.41 and \$3,300.

The court discussed at length the expenses of the Juvenile Probation Officer, who is shared with Bailey County. By majority vote, the court voted to split the expenses of the officer with Bailey County, in the amount of \$363.96 for each county over the past five months.

Approval of attorney's fees to Richard Collard was approved for Collard representing two juveniles in adjudecation hearings.

A contract was renewed with Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Feilder for the collection of delinquent taxes.

Approval was given for soil conservation work on the farm of Luis H. Robles, whenever county machinery is available and not in demand otherwise. The county is reimbursed for this type work.

2 cups sugar 6 tablespoons Cocoa 1 cup salad oil or melted shortening 4 eggs-well beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla 11/2 cups flour

1 cup pecans

Blend sugar, cocoa and salad oil. Beat eggs well. Add to first mixture. Then add vanilla, flour, salt and pecans. Mix well. Bake 25 minutes in 350 degree oven. Do not overcook.

**CHESS PIE** Mix 1/2 cup butter, 3/4 cup sugar, 3 egg yolks, 3 tablespoons milk, 1 teaspoon flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 cup pecans. Cook in double boiler until thick. Add 1 cup cooked raisins--better if chopped into small

Pour into unbaked pie shell. Beat three egg whites. Add 1/2 cup sugar. Spread on top of pie. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes or until a golden brown crispy crust forms on

**SWEET POTATOES** 

3 cups sweet potatoes, which have been cooked and mashed 1/2 cup butter 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/3 cup milk

Mix above ingredients well. Place in Pyrex dish. Top with 1 cup brown sugar, 1/3 cup butter and 1 cup chopped nuts.

Put in oven until topping melts.

CHOCOLATE SHEATH CAKE Thoroughly mix 2 cups sugar and 2 cups flour. Set aside.

Melt 2 sticks oleo. Add 1 cup water and 3 tablespoons Cocoa. Cool. Then add ½ cup buttermilk, 2 slightly beaten eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspon soda and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Blend well.

Add to flour and sugar mixture and mix well.

Bake in 350 degree oven 30 minutes or more.

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### Moisture **Survey Is** Available

helped create nearly excellent soil moisture conditions in the upper three feet of most soil profiles throughout the area. The annual soil moisture survey measurements taken by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service between February 14 and 23 of this year, generally indicate the top two feet are at 90 per cent field capacity and the third foot is at nearly 75 per cent of capacity. However the fourth and fifth feet are generally much dryer. This is especially true for marginally irrigated and dryland portions of the Southern High Plains.

Deep soil moisture reserves were depleted last summer and the area has received an average of only four to six inches of precipitation since harvest, only enough to wet the top two and a half feet of the soil profile. Where plow pans are present they did not appreciably affect the moisture penetration because the snow melt was slow enough to allow infiltration with no runoff.

Even though this year's soil moisture deficits are similar to last years, conditions are better now because 65 to 70 per cent of the moisture is in the top three feet of the profile where the plants need it. Most of the deficit is in the fourth and fifth feet of the profile.


Plant response during the early growing season should be good. However, once the plant uses the upper level moisture, there is currently no reserve deep soil moisture to carry it through an extended dry period.

The soil moisture deficit map is published as a tool to give producers a better picture of soil moisture reserves over the entire area. It can

In evaluating your present soil moisture conditions and estimating how much water your crops will need during the growing season, the probability of rain becomes very important.

The following is a monthly precipitation probability index for the City of Muleshoe. These derived figures are provided by the Texas Department of Water Resources and are based on 51 years of National Weather Service precipitation data from 1930 to 1980.

The specific data in the table indicates the per cent of time when the corresponding precipitation quantity or larger quantities can be expected to occur during the month indicated. However, these figures were derived without the benefit of information about precipitation during the month prior to that for which the estimate is made. These probabilities may be improved if prior month data were included in the calculations. For example, if Muleshoe recorded a three inch rainfall for July then it is likely that the probability of August recording two inches or more may be better than the indicated per cent due to the persistance of weather regimes.



help them make more informed irrigation decisions and help avoid both over and under irrigating in the spring. It can also give an indication of potential production.

The map's soil moisture deficit readings are a measure of how much water is still needed to wet the soil in the crop root zone to field capacity. The sample indicates general trends

over the area, but does not predict exact soil moisture conditions on any given farm. Each landowner needs to check his individual farm soil moisture to determine its water needs.

The survey is a cooperative effort by the Soil Conservation Service and the High Plains Water District with support from the Texas Department of Water Resources.

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### **Around The House**

Chinese cuisine has been on the Texas scene for more than a century.

Railroad construction first brought the Chinese to Texas in 1870. This marked their entry into Texas culture and introduced various types of Chinese food.

Chinese-style food is exciting but different in flavor and takes a minimum fat fryer or heavy saucepan. of time to prepare. "Stirfrying" is the most popular cooking technique. Slivered or diced vegetables and meat are cooked in hot oil over high heat and stirred constantly. Scarcity of fuel in China dictated this rapid cooking method over high

wok -- a round-bottomed, high sided metal pan--can be used to produce crisp, crunchy vegetables and distinct flavors that typify this technique.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR** SELECTING PORK

Pork--fresh or in cured forms--has been a favorite in Chinese dishes. When selecting pork for all types of cookery, use appearance as your guide to quality. Choose fresh or cured pork that has a high proportion of lean to fat and bone. The flesh should be fine textured but firm, and color of the lean in fresh pork should range from grayish pink to red. Lean cured pork, on the other hand, should have a deep pink color.

In stir frying pork, the meat will lose its pinkness 16-ounce can bean sprouts, and turn white when cooked. Never add more than one pound of pork or other meat desired. at a time to the fry pan or cookery. A larger amount will lower the temperature of stir-fry in batches.

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
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
