It would be pleasant to report that a million-dollar rain fell in Eastland County Thursday, but such a report would be premature, if not false.

As The Record went to press. scattered showers had fallen over the county, and a rain had blanketed part of the eastern half of the county, including Ranger, but much of the productive peanut land had received no moisture, or almost none.

A sharp shower which fell on Eastland Thursday morning helped home gardens greatly and revived dying lawns. No measurable rain had fallen in the city during June before the shower.
