Deeds For Highway Right-Of-Way In County's Hands

Deeds to right-of-way on 7.2 miles of highway to form a new route for Highway 80 from Cisco to the Callahan County line have been turned over to the Commissioners Court State Highway Department Resident Engineer E. M. Pritchard said Thursday.

County Judge P. L. Crossley said the deeds are in the hands of county Commissioner Arch Bint, whose precinct all the project is located.

What action the court will take on the matter has not been finally determined, but a decision is expected soon, Judge Crossley said. Earlier, the court passed a resolution to the effect that major highway projects will be considered on countywide, not a precinct basis.

Bint has money on hand in settlement funds to buy the right-of-way of the Highway Department lands now. However, if a similar project were to be outlined through Eastland and Ranger in Precinct No. 10 such precinct funds would be available, since the precinct is larger, has more roads, and more lands are used for road purposes.

Pritchard said a contract on the highway project will be let in August if the right-of-way has been obtained. Work on Highway 80 projects in Callahan County already has begun, he said.

ROADS OPENED ON COUNTY PROJECTS

Actions of the State Highway Department in bid letting this week indicated that four highway projects soon will be under way in Eastland County.

Austin Road Company was low bidder on an asphalt concrete paving course of paving on the highway between Eastland and Carbon, and on a smaller job just outside Cisco.

E. Huter Strain was low bidder in retopping a farm to market road southwest of Cisco. The road, finished only last fall, had its pavement badly cracked by the winter's record cold.

Resident Highway Engineer E. Pritchard said that work on the town Hill rerouting job probably will be completed by Sept. 1. Final work on the hill portion of the highway has been completed, he said.

Two \$10,000 Bids Made To County On Prairie Building

Two bids of \$10,000 each were reported this week to have been made to Eastland County for the Sinclair-Prairie Building on South Seaman Street.

Earlier, the Commissioners Court had rejected a bid of \$7,500 for the building, which reportedly cost about \$100,000 to build in the 1920's and was saved from razing in the late 1930's only by the determination of C. W. Hoffmann, who did not want the building, but bought it anyway to save it.

County Judge P. L. Crossley said that the state and government agencies occupying the building had been quizzed on paying the county rent on the space occupied but that none had replied on Thursday.

Judge Crossley said he personally favored selling the building if the bids reach as high as \$12,000 or \$14,000, but that a majority of members of the court have favored keeping it if the tenants will pay enough rent to defray maintenance costs.

Trades Day Plans Completed

1948 Peanut Quotas May Be Expected, Burleson Says

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson conferred with Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson relative to the imposition of peanut quotas for 1948. He was advised by Anderson that, under the law, such quotas must be reinstated for the coming year. In all probability, according to the secretary, the announcement will be made about July 1.

The secretary told Burleson that "the only way in which controls will not be reimposed is by resolution of Congress, which was the case during the war years." Such a resolution is now before the Agriculture Committee, having been presented by Congressman Pace of Georgia.

However, it was felt there is little likelihood the resolution will be approved, because under the present price support of peanuts, the cost of continuation is estimated to be in the neighborhood of fifty million dollars. It has been estimated that 2 1/2 million dollars will be needed to inaugurate the program of quotas, and with controls to maintain the price support—considerable savings would obviously accrue to the government.

Burleson expressed his opposition to quotas for 1948, but at the same time pointed out that if controls were inaugurated again, there seems little choice other than the acceptance of the program through a referendum vote by the producers. Burleson told Secretary Anderson and a group of congressmen interested in this matter who represent peanut-producing states that "quotas will in many instances work unfairly to a number of producers of the 17th Congressional District of Texas."

"These producers," he said, "have been encouraged to increase their acreage since 1941 to meet the war needs. In so doing they reclaimed considerable acreage through soil conservation practices; as well as increasing per-acre production by the use of fertilizer. The quotas are not set up with fullest consideration for such acreage increases, as is the case in my district."

WHEAT GRINDINGS ON INCREASE

AUSTIN—Wheat grindings totaled 4,425,000 bushels in March to score a 52 per cent gain over March 1946 grindings, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports reveal.

The 6 per cent hike over February grindings failed to come up to the seasonally-expected gain, resulting in a 14 per cent drop in the Bureau's index.

Wheat flour production totaled 1,895,000 sacks in March to better February's production by 6 per cent.

TEXAS BUILDING PERMITS INCREASE

AUSTIN—April building permits in Texas reported by The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research totaled \$22,970,732, for the greatest monthly total since March 1946.

Although April permits stood 13 per cent above the April 1946 level, the failure of actual construction to measure up to earlier expectations is causing concern among Texas businessmen.

The expected March-to-April slump, based on declines averaging 18 per cent during the last 10 years, failed to materialize this year. The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index shows permits 16 per cent above the March total. Last year the decline for the same comparison reached 52 per cent.

Greatest per cent gain for the month was in Abilene where 7 industrial permits totaling \$852,650 paced the 400 per cent March-to-April gain.

The March-to-April gain is especially significant in view of the 24 per cent hike chalked up in March over February and placed April 1947 lineage 23 per cent above April 1946 figures.

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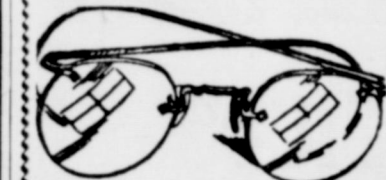
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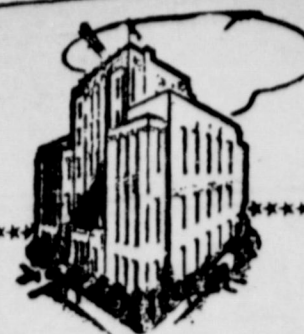
