Approved Football Stadium Be Ready For First Game

Work On Stands All Under Way; Sitting Lot Ready

With an outstanding Eastland football year just ahead, Eastland High School Coach Johnny Little will go to El Paso this week end to attend the Texas Coaches School there next week.

Football practice on the local field will begin Sept. 1 with two practices daily, Little said Thursday.

The first game will be on Maverick Field against Ranger Sept. 12. Other local games, in order, will be with Masonic Home, Ballinger, Comanche, Hamilton and Gorman.

Little will have 14 returning football lettermen, with experienced men at almost every position. He will have little reserve backfield strength, but in Johnny Hicks, Bobby Blair and Jack Chamberlain, Jimmie Mathews among others he will have some stalwarts.

A number of last year's lettermen have grown so during the past nine months that they will be hard for opponents to recognize this fall.

Little said Thursday that "The wolves are already after me" in saying that Eastland should be an add-on favorite to win the district title this fall. The coach pointed to last year's favored team, which wound up in second place in the district after having suffered many injuries and unfavorable weather breaks.

With six home games, improved parking facilities and larger stands, Eastland football attendance well could set an all-time record this year.

JAYCEE CHARTER APPROVAL GIVEN

TULSA, Okla. — An application for a charter was approved for the Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce, it was announced by John Ben Sheppard, president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Junior Chamber is an organization that is not duplicated by any other group, and it is dedicated to unselfish civic service. Its distinguishing feature is that the membership is composed of men 21 thru 35 years of age who receive training that will prepare them for greater jobs in the community in later years.

Fox, Jr. His newly formed group of young men is also affiliated with the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce and Jaycee locals in more than 1500 communities in the United States and 250 cities in 35 foreign countries. Can't Pay Rent, Internal Revenue Office To Be Moved

With disposition of the county-owned Sinclair-Prairie Building still in doubt, it was announced this week that offices of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, now in the building, will be moved next week into the Eastland County Courthouse.

Employees in the office will be housed in the fourth floor office formerly occupied by the draft board.

It also was said that district offices of the State Department of Public Welfare, also housed in the Sinclair-Prairie Building, will be moved to the third floor Court-house offices of the abolished 88th District Court.

County Judge Lewis Crossley and County Auditor Don Parker, who went to Austin last week end to inquire about legal aspects of selling the Sinclair-Prairie, found that if the Commissioners Court sells it, the court will have to appoint a commissioner who must make the sale by public auction.

Also, it was found that there is no provision in such a sale for putting a minimum price of \$15,000 on the building, which the court had voted to do.

Home Building By Ex-GI's Near Final Approval

Conditions appear favorable for building a number of new homes in Eastland for veterans under an insurance loan company-FHA loan setup, Bob and Joe Collins of the Collins Insurance Company said Thursday after a trip to Fort Worth.

Accompanying them was County Treasurer G. A. Fox, who has made application for a loan and FHA approval with which to build an Eastland home.

Bob Collins said one loan had gone through on a small home already built, and that the loan company had approved two more loans for homes to be built. The papers are now in the hands of FHA, he said, but an FHA official privately told the trio that it looked as if they would be approved.

Collins said Carl Butler, Olden contractor, will build the two houses if the loans are approved.

The FHA will insure a 100 per cent loan for building a veteran's home, and an 80 per cent loan for a non-veteran's home.

However, there are several considerations that may have influence on granting the loan, such as the financial circumstances of the person who will own the house, the location, and the size house to be built.

Breakfast Fliers To Come Here From Over Texas

More than 100 airplanes from Dallas, Fort Worth, Brownwood, Wichita Falls, Lubbock, Amarillo and other points in Texas are expected in Eastland Sunday morning for a "breakfast trip" visit, George Howell, manager of the Eastland Airport, said this week.

Private plane owners over north and west Texas make regular occasions of the breakfast visit to various towns on Sunday mornings, Howell explained.

The planes are expected to begin arriving about 8 a. m., and the public was invited to go to the airport to watch the landings and see the planes.

The visit here is under sponsorship of the airport management, the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the American Legion post.

After their arrival, the fliers will be taken by bus to Legion Hall at the City Park, where they will be given breakfast. Most of them are expected to remain for lunch before they take off for the return flights home.

Howell said that every effort will be made to see that the noise of the airplanes does not disturb church services Sunday morning.

Johnny Aaron of the West Texas Transportation Company has promised to furnish transportation for the fliers from the airport to the City Park and return, with buses provided by his company.

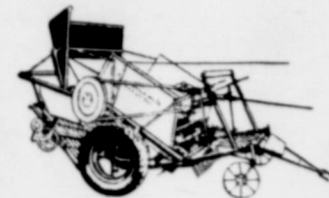

44 ways To get "Something for Nothing"

The railroads have received 44 "rules" demands from the leaders of the operating unions . . . representing engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen. They say they are seeking only changes in working conditions—NOT a wage increase.

More Money For Less Work

But what kind of rules are being asked for? Twenty-eight of them would compel railroads to pay more money for the same, or less work; 7 would require additional and unnecessary men to do the same work; the rest would bring about changes in operating practices at increased cost.

For Instance:

The Union leaders demand additional train and engine crews on Diesel-powered trains—one full crew for every power unit in the locomotive. A freight train hauled by a 4-unit Diesel would have to carry 4 engineers, 4 firemen, 4 conductors, and at least 8 brakemen, or a total of 20 men instead of 5.

"Made Work"—Sheer Waste

The Union leaders demand that full-length freight trains be cut to about half their length, even though such trains are most efficient for low-cost service to you. This rule would call for twice as many locomotives, would double the number of trains, and make accidents more likely.

Additional equipment, yards, and other facilities required to take care of these short trains would cost hundreds of millions. What the Union leaders really want is to make more jobs.

The Union leaders demand that when a crew in one class of service perform incidental service of another class, they will be paid not less than a day's pay for each class, even though all service is performed as a part of the same day's



work. The crew would get at least two days' pay for one day's work.

The Union leaders demand that the present basic day for passenger con-

ductors and trainmen be reduced from 150 to 100 miles, which would have the effect of increasing their pay 50%. Such a run often takes only two or three hours!

You Can't Afford This Waste

Demands like these are against the interests of the whole American people, who depend on railroad service for nearly everything they do and wear and use.

These rules would cost a BILLION DOLLARS annually—a gigantic waste which neither the railroads nor the country can afford.

Railroad workers are good citizens and good employees, with pride in their calling. Their record during the war was outstanding. We do not believe they fully understand the "featherbedding" rules which the Union leaders are demanding. We do not believe they understand the harmful results which these rules would have to the railroad industry, to the millions of men and women dependent on railroads for their livelihood, and to the shipping and consuming public.

The great strength of America is in production—an honest day's work for an honest day's pay.

For only through greater production can we hope to stop the steady upward surge of living costs.

Surely, if ever there was a time in our history when we needed to waste not waste, this is it.
