Seen For Growers Who Fail To Act

Peanut growers of Eastland their peanuts next year must have allotments set up for their farms before the marketing quota election to be held between now and Chalk Mountain, in Erath County, Dec. 15, Emmitt Powell, Production and Marketing Administration officer in Eastland County, said Thursday.

If the election carries as it is expected to, farmers who do not have allotments set up will be penalized heavily on the price they receive for peanuts in the 1948 crop, Powell said.

Based on conditions this year, the penalty might be as much as five cents per pound, he said.






