Farmers Urged To Turn In Peanut Acreage Or Face Loss

Side Issues

A rather peculiar thing happened at the corner of Seaman and White Streets, nearly in front of the Record office, the other day.

We heard a crash outside and went to look. A soda pop truck was stopped outside the office, and north on Seaman Street a gray sedan was racing, with a torn front fender flapping in the breeze.

Pack Kilbourne, who lives upstairs, and I went and looked over the soft drink truck, and could see no damage at all.

Why the driver of the sedan felt he had to flee was beyond us.

The car sped north across the railroad tracks and turned west on the road near the Humble bulk station.

Eastland's dog scare seems to have died down, as usually happens where only a single case of rabies is discovered.

However, the scare served its purpose in getting a lot of dogs vaccinated in the meantime, and it should be pointed out that all dogs that have not been vaccinated should be, since there still is plenty of rabies afloat in Texas.

Veterinarian C. M. Patterson has found no cases of rabies since the first one, he said this week, and he hoped the danger period was over.

I might add that dog poisoners have been at work again, but not on as great a scale as in the big Eastland dog poisoning epidemics of recent years.

Once when I was seven I was a collector of the little round paper tags that came on the strings of Bull Durham tobacco sacks—perhaps still do.

It was the last year of the first war to save democracy and the year of the big flu epidemic that killed so many people. We lived in El Paso and dilly on a street a block away I could hear the strains of the funeral marches as military bands from Fort Bliss escorted the bodies of flu-stricken soldiers to the depot.

School had been called off, so I had plenty of time to devote to my collection of Bull Durham tags. And I recall as vividly as though it were yesterday, or an hour ago, the thrill I got when I reached down in the dust of an alley to pick up a tag, and found it was a

Two Ranger Men Get Terms In Oklahoma

Junior Howell and Charles Williams, Ranger residents arrested in Ranger recently and taken to Boise City, Okla., to stand trial on charges of stealing wheat, entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced to four years each on two counts apiece, the sheriff at Boise City wrote Sheriff J. B. Williams of Eastland.

The men admitted taking two truckloads of grain near Boise City and selling it at an elevator at Stratford, Texas.

Pipeline Crew Has F-M Radio Setup For Checking Up With Eastland Office

Possibly the first frequency modulation radio communications system between the office and field crews of a pipeline construction outfit had been set up this week in Eastland by the Oklahoma Contracting Company of Dallas.

The firm is building a 30-mile loop of 12-inch pipe for the Magnolia Petroleum Company south of Eastland.

Wednesday, G. A. Harvey, paymaster for the company in the Eastland office, located in the King Motor Company building, was talking to crew members on the job about 10 miles south of Carbon, getting progress reports and sending needed information and instructions.

County Gets Army Surplus Building For Nurses' Home

Purchase of a 29 by 90 foot surplus Camp Bowie building for use as a nurses home at the county-operated Ranger General Hospital was completed this week when County Auditor Don Parker gave War Surplus officials a check for \$280 to pay for the structure in full.

The sum amounted to an 80 per cent discount from the \$1400 price which War Assets Administration valuation experts had placed on the building.

The structure was used at Camp Bowie for nurses' quarters at the camp hospital.

Parker estimated it would cost another \$600 or \$700 to move the building from Brownwood to the site where it will be erected near the hospital in Ranger.

In addition to that, some funds will have to be used to furnish the building as a home for the nurses at the hospital.

About 20 nurses at the hospital need housing, which now is being furnished partly in rooms in the hospital structure in Ranger, and partly in the former isolation unit of the hospital, Parker said.

The Bowie building has 15 rooms, with 13 bedrooms. It is a frame structure, with wooden siding exterior and sheet-rock interior partitions and ceilings.

County Commissioner Ed Castleberry has had road machinery levelling off the lot in Ranger where the building will be placed.

Parker and other county officials have made numerous trips on behalf of obtaining the building, and have filled out a great many government forms.

Parker said that moving the nurses to the building will release about eight rooms at the hospital for use by patients.

Safety Conference Meeting Set Here

A meeting of the Oil Belt Safety Conference will be held in the office of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Monday evening to elect officers for the coming year and to select the town to hold the next conference in May.

H. J. Tanner of Eastland has been conference chairman for the past year. The conference is made up of representatives from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Breckenridge.

Old Timer Recalls Drouth Of 1886-'87

Eastland County is as dry now as it was at this season in the first year of the two-year drouth of 1886-1887, J. L. Brashears, 75, who was born in a log house in the early days of the County, said this week.

Brashears recalls the early day drouth well. "The Leon went dry away down near Gatesville," he said. "I helped to dig wells in the Leon to water stock. I hope this may not be so long."

Brashears, reared on a farm, says school days were different when

he was a boy. "You can't get off from school now like we did then," he said.

There have been many good changes in life since he was a boy, the long-time resident said. He cited as one example, chopping wood. "I've chopped wood most of my life," he said. "But gas is the only handy fire, I couldn't get back to wood now; too slow, even if I could chop."

Hesaid he has driven a team and wagon up and down the Eastland-Hogtown (Desremona) road

for 60 years. Brashears married Prudie Cooper of Ranger in 1896, and they have reared a large family. He said "We never owned but two places, and now we are down to one." The Brashears farm, two and a half miles east of Eastland, is a prosperous, well-kept stock farm.

Soon after Brashears married, his father and mother moved to Chalk Mountain, in Erath County, and then to Mount Park, Okla., where his father operated a hardware store until his death.

Price Penalties Seen For Growers Who Fail To Act

Peanut growers of Eastland County who wish to avoid being penalized on the price paid for their peanuts next year must have allotments set up for their farms before the marketing quota election to be held between now and Dec. 15, Emmitt Powell, Production and Marketing Administration officer in Eastland County, said Thursday.

If the election carries as it is expected to, farmers who do not have allotments set up will be penalized heavily on the price they receive for peanuts in the 1948 crop, Powell said.

Based on conditions this year, the penalty might be as much as five cents per pound, he said.

Allotments are to be based on the acreages in peanuts on the farm in 1944, 1945 and 1946. The AAA office now is taking the acreage figures for the three base years so the allotments may be established, Powell said.

If peanuts have been grown on any Eastland County farm in the three base years and the owner of the land wishes an allotment set up for the farm, he should go to the AAA office at once and turn in accurate peanut acreage figures for the three years, Powell said.

New Traffic Code In Effect Today, So Take Care!

This is the day the new Texas traffic code goes into effect.

Today and after, you'd better be sure to drive on the right hand side of the street or highway; you had better dim your lights at night when you meet another car, and you'd better do a lot of other things the new law proscribes.

State Highway Patrolmen Oscar Avera and P. A. Zeissel said, perhaps jokingly, that they were going to get up at the stroke of midnight Thursday so as to be out seeing that drivers early Friday morning obey the new code.

The highway patrolmen said that most of the changes made in the new laws are only those that common sense would dictate, and that any driver using his head in an effort to drive safely will be very unlikely to violate the new laws.

The new code is identical with those in 34 other states.

Hole Suddenly Yawns In Middle Of Eastland Football Field, Is Filled In

The fact that Eastland High School football teams have been playing over a hole in the ground for many years was revealed Saturday when gaping cracks in the Maverick Field turf revealed the fissure.

It was guessed by C. A. Hertig, school finance officer who has been chief figure in rebuilding the stadium, that the hole was either an old cistern or the cellar of an oil well that was drilled on the site of the field in the oil boom days.

Ray Laney Named City Police Chief; Tells About Lights

Ray Laney, member of the city police force of Eastland since 1943, was appointed chief of police last Saturday.

Laney said one of his first official acts will be to clarify regulations on stopping and turning at the stop lights in downtown Eastland.

Signs are being painted telling motorists they may turn right on a red light after a full stop, he said. However, pedestrians walking with the green light still will have full right-of-way, he said.

Laney said also that it was his ambition to be known by school-agers of Eastland as their friend, instead of as "that old cop" who was always trying to catch them in some meanness.

Laney's appointment as police chief came soon after the resignation of Bill Harris to become county jailer, a position Harris assumed this week.

No police chief had been appointed following the resignation of Chief Ed Sparr, who died suddenly a few weeks after resigning.

Laney came to Eastland with his parents in 1922, attended the schools here and graduated from Eastland High School. He left in 1935 to work in the oil fields in West Texas.

He served in the Army in the recent war, and after his discharge in 1943 returned to Eastland and obtained his position on the police force.

His wife died a few weeks ago. He is the father of a 10-year-old son.

Laney said he wished to thank the people of Eastland for the cooperation they have given him in the past, and to ask for more of the same.
