Parking Facilities Cut By New State Highway Controls

Loss of about 30 parking places on the square in downtown Eastland and on Seaman Street in blocks next to the square was the result this week of a Texas Highway Department ruling that angle parking no longer would be allowed on highways leading through the city.

The highways are U. S. 80, leading east and west on Main Street, and State 6, leading north and south on Seaman Street.

However, Mayor C. T. Lucas intervened with the highway department and obtained permission for angle parking on the Courthouse side of Main and Seaman Streets.

With parking facilities already overtaxed, loss of the parking places was a blow to merchants of downtown Eastland, but Lucas pointed out that under a new state law, the highway department has full jurisdiction over parking regulations on highways, in or out of cities.

Lucas said that the City Commission had been assured that the highway department will take over maintenance of the two highways in the city in the future, a burden the city has carried in the past.

He said also that the commission is urging the highway department to give assistance in extending East Commerce Street as a public thoroughfare across the Leon at the east city limits and thereby furnish an exit at the south end of the newly completed football field.

The extension also would give two one-way traffic lanes on U. S. 80 through the city, an end that long has been desired by public-spirited citizens of Eastland, the mayor said.

Lucas appealed to persons who habitually park cars downtown all day to find places off the square for the cars. One such location is the vacant lot just east of the Eastland National Bank Building.

Chief of Police Ray Laney said Thursday that drivers were obeying the new parking regulations fairly well except on North Seaman Street just off Main. He tagged cars that were angle parked there Wednesday and Thursday, telling drivers of the new rules.

District Highway Engineer Leo Ehlinger wrote Lucas that angle parking is allowed on highway streets now only if the streets are 58 feet wide or wider. The streets around the Courthouse in Eastland are only 45 feet wide.

Lucas said about 16 parking places were lost around the two sides of the square as a result of the ruling and a check showed that approximately the same number were lost on the two blocks off Seaman Street just off the square.

Cole, who served as a Navy pilot during the war, will manage the plant, which has a franchise covering three and a half counties in eastern and central New Mexico. Hamner and Cole plan to take over operation of the plant Nov. 1.

Hertig said he bought the best lumber he could find for the seats, but it still had not been cured sufficiently to keep the resin from coming out.

Milk Price Increase Is Announced Here

Announcement of an increase in the retail price of milk in the Eastland County area to 20 cents a quart was made this week by creameries serving the area.

J. P. Kilgore, operator of Kilgore's Eastland Creamery, said the price increase was made to adjust the selling price here to a level already prevailing in Abilene, Brownwood, Fort Worth, and other towns in this area.

Farmers are getting \$5.30 per 100 pounds of raw Grade A milk on the basis of 4 per cent butterfat content, and most of them actually are getting \$5.60 per 100 pounds on the average, Kilgore said. This price to producers, he said, is necessitated by the high price of feed.

Mavericks To Play Ranger Tonight In Football Opener

Crippled more than any team with such few reserves should be at this stage of the season, but with plenty of fire and spirit, the Eastland High School Mavericks will launch their 1947 football campaign at 8 p. m. Friday on Maverick Field against the Ranger High School Bulldogs.

Odds on the game are automatically on the Bulldogs, a Class AA eleven, to those outside Eastland County, but here few points will be given.

Eastland will enter the game with two regular players, Johnny Hicks, back, and Hilton Kuykendall, end, and a reserve back, Hugh Cooper, on the sidelines. Hicks, who broke some foot bones in baseball this summer, is out of condition, but has recovered from the injury and may play some; Kuykendall underwent an appendix operation in August, and Cooper had an ankle bone chipped in scrimmage Wednesday when he went down under a tackle by Pat Crawford. Cooper is expected to be out a month and a half or two months.

Eastland's starting eleven, said Coach Johnny Little, is expected to be Crawford at left end, Jack Kelley at left tackle, Bill Harde-man at left guard, Dwain Lusk at center, Wayne Lambert at right guard, Winfred Ward at right tackle, Lewis Crossley at right end, and Bobby Blair, Jimmy Mathews, Dick Sparks and Jack Chamberlain in the backfield.

The starters will be heavier and more experienced than last year's.

How the team will stack up against Ranger is a question, since most of Ranger's wheel horse veterans graduated last year. The battle should be fought on fairly even terms, as was last year's, won by Ranger 13 to 6.

On paper, Eastland's team is the strongest in many years, but the matter of reserve strength is made. With Hicks still handicapped, there is little reserve backfield strength, and almost any position in the line will be weakened considerably by substitution.

Sparks has been doing most of passing in practice, and will likely bear the brunt in the Ranger game, since Hicks is the only other passer of merit possessed by the team.

Games goers will see the new west stands, and the improved parking lot on the west side of the stadium, with gravelled surface and two entrances to speed traffic.

Breckenridge Chosen For Safety Session

Electricity And Ice Short As September Heat Hangs On

The prolonged September heat wave that has set new weather records in the Southwest had Eastland as well as other towns and cities in the grip of an ice and electricity shortage this week.

Ice was the shortest, with the only local ice house running out most days at an early morning hour. Ice sold here has been brought usually from Weatherford.

The City Commission Monday night discussed inviting an Abilene firm to open an ice making plant here.

The electrical shortage just "crept up" on the power companies of the Southwest, which had no reason to expect such a belated hot spell that kept air conditioning and refrigeration motors running overtime, said W. B. Pickens, district manager for the Texas Electric Service Company in Eastland.

In Fort Worth, and Dallas, the power shortage forced shutdowns of air conditioning units in big office buildings and stores.

In Eastland, merchants were asked to keep electrical use as low as possible until about 4:30 p. m., when the peak load had passed.

Pickens said it is expected the situation will be back to normal by Monday, and that the crisis apparently already has passed.

It is ironic, he said, that the power companies have been helping electrical equipment manufacturers sell all the air conditioning and other electrical equipment possible, and now have had to ask the buyers to cease using it when it is needed most.

Increasing the ice shortage here has been the presence of the crews of the Oklahoma Contracting Company, building a pipeline loop south of Eastland. The crews buy ice in large quantities to furnish cool drinking water while on the job.

The highway is to be resurfaced all the way from Seaman Street in Eastland into Carbon.

The new Strawn Hill highway east of Ranger, virtually completed, will be opened in a few days, it was said.

Eastland Man Saves Life Of Ciscoan With Arm Cut Off In Crash

The life of Darwin Doyle of Cisco, whose arm was torn off north of Eastland on the Breckenridge Highway last Thursday night by a hit-run truck that sideswiped his car, likely was saved by B. T. Fagan of Eastland.

Fagan came along after the accident and applied a tourniquet to Doyle's bleeding stump. The severed arm was found on the highway 15 miles toward Breckenridge from the scene of the accident.

Fagan then took Doyle to a Breckenridge hospital, where he began his recovery.

Saturday, W. J. Harrison, Breckenridge stock farmer, was charged in Eastland justice court with failure to stop and render aid in connection with the accident. Harrison said that he was not aware of having struck a car on the highway, although officers said his truck showed signs of a similar accident.

Gorman Man Charged With Hitting Wife, Biting Judge Greer

Tine Self of Gorman, charged with hitting his wife with a shotgun, shooting at her, threatening to hang her, and with biting and otherwise attacking Gorman Justice of the Peace T. W. Greer, when Greer went to arrest him, was held on multiple charges, including one of drunkenness, in the Eastland County Jail Thursday.

Judge Greer said Self was alleged to have shut his wife in a small tin barn last Friday, and then shot his shotgun through the side of the barn several times. When his wife emerged, he allegedly hit her over the head with the gun. Then he took her to a tree and threatened to hang her, but she fought free, she told the judge.

Mrs. Self, the former Donnie Wright, ran away and hid all night, not appearing until Saturday morning, Greer said.

When the judge and two of Mrs. Self's brothers went to get Self, the latter fought them, and after he was in the car bit Judge Greer three times, the judge said, finally butting him out of the car when the judge started to get out in Gorman.

Two Fifth Grades Are Combined At West Ward

Eastland school students flocked back to classes this week, and aside from complaining about the heat and having to go back to school, seemed to be enjoying themselves.

School Supt. W. G. Womack said that enrollment was just about on a par with a year ago, except that the crop of "war baby" pupils in the First Grade has caused an increase of about 20 there.

Womack also said that because of the small number enrolled in the Fifth Grade in the two grade schools, classes from South Ward and West Ward have been consolidated, with both of the classes attending West Ward as one class.

There were 20 enrolled in the grade at West Ward and 11 at South Ward.

Womack announced, to reassure parents who have been cadged for a bit of extra lunch money, that the noon lunches at all four of the school cafeterias are 25 cents. Lunches consist of a meat, salad, vegetables, dessert and milk. All schools have a cafeteria except junior high.
