Texas Wholesale Inventories Up

AUSTIN — In spite of strong attempts to hold inventories down, Texas wholesalers reported a 54 per cent inventory rise this June to Bureau of the Census figures over year-ago figures, according to releases through the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Wholesale firms throughout the nation as a whole were recording June-to-June inventory gains averaging 64 per cent, however; so Texas dealers were still better off than firms in other states.

Inventories edged upward one per cent from May to June in Texas, with electrical goods wholesalers registering the greatest monthly hike, 22 per cent. Drugs and sundries inventories were upped four per cent, and tobacco dealers reported a two per cent inventory rise as all other kinds of business felt inventories drop.

Automotive supply dealers doubled inventories for the June-to-June comparison, electrical goods inventories were up 84 per cent, tobacco up 63 per cent, and the hardware group reported a 70 per cent wholesale inventory advance for the year.

Wholesaler's sales throughout the state stood 21 per cent above the June 1946 level as the country as a whole saw sales climb 22 per cent. The May-to-June four per cent slump in sales brought the state average down considerably. Only electrical goods sales were upped during the month and all other kinds of business registered sales declines, led by the 23 per cent slump in sales of drugs and sundries and a 22 per cent decrease in sales of machinery, equipment and supplies (except electrical).
