The peanut crop in Eastland County ranges from very poor to very good this year, with the light crop areas probably the largest, farmers, buyers and farm officials said this week.

None of the better peanuts have been harvested yet, but Emmett Powell, Production and Marketing Administration administrator, said he had heard of one 10-acre patch near Gorman that was harvested and produced 30 bushels of peanuts-a little more than enough to cover price of the seed. Also, the nuts were poor quality, Powell said.

On the other hand, H. C. Jordan of Flatwood said that rains there a month or so back have put the peanuts in excellent shape, and some farmers are expecting to harvest 30 to 35 bushels to the acre

Jordan and Powell both stressed that cover crop plantings in past years are increasing yields on some farms all over the county.
