Lake Not Too Low, City Commission Told By Mayor

Eastland faces no water crisis in the near future such is as engaging the energies of other West Texas towns, Mayor C. T. Lucas said Tuesday in a report to the

City Commission. Asked how Lake Eastland was standing up under the drouth and this year's unprecedented demand, the mayor said that the lake was nearly half full and had plenty of water to carry the city through next spring

However, if there are no big fall, winter or spring rains that will replenish the lake, Eastland will have something to worry about, Lucas said.

Other twons in this area, such as Coleman, Putnam, Baird and others have been out of water for weeks and have been shipping it in by rail tank cars. Other towns will come up

against similar situations soon if the rains do not come. Comanche has more than tripled its water rate in an effort to discourage the use of city water so as to conserve the remaining supply. Lucas said that Eastland Lake

is little below the level which meant a full lake in the days befor the dam was raised after the city ran out of water eight or nine years ago. At that time, the city was using water from Lake Leon, the power

On top of these "rules" changes, the leaders of the operating unions have filed an additional demand for a wage increase of over 30 per cent. If granted, this would be an added cost to the railroads of \$400,000,000 a year.

In addition to this, an Arbitration Board has just granted a wage increase of 151/2 cents an hour to the million employes represented by the 17 non-operating unions. This will cost the railroads \$468,000,000 a year.

Where will all the money come from to pay these increases? They total several times as much as the railroads made in 1946 or will make in 1947.

In July, the railroads filed an application for increased freight rates to close the gap which then existed between wage and material costs, and railroad revenues. Since then it has been necessary, because of further increases in wages and material costs, to supplement that petition and to ask for an additional freight rate

increase. No other course is open. Railroads Do Not Run For **Employes Alone**


