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Mavericks Beat Comanche 25-0; Lay For Hamilton

The Eastland Mavericks, probably over their biggest hurdle in their race for the district title after beating Comanche 25 to 0 last Friday, rest this week before another important district game with Hamilton on the Eastland field next week.

The team emerged from the Comanche game with no serious injuries, and should be primed and ready for Hamilton, a team that was rated as co-favorite with Eastland in the district before a disastrous 6-0 loss to Comanche. With Eastland favored to beat Hamilton and Gorman to emerge victorious in district play, some attention centered on Tuesday's game between Coleman and Ballinger, favorites in District 9A. Few here relished the thought of playing Ballinger again. However, if Ballinger and Eastland do emerge the winners in their respective districts, the bi-district game will be played in Eastland. Eastland started off slowly, as usual against Comanche and failed to scratch in the first period despite a drive to the Comanche that died with a fumble.

But early in the second quarter Comanche kick was partly blocked and carried only to the 36-yard line, and in three plays with Johnny Hicks running two of them and Bobby Blair the other, the Mavericks scored. Hicks carried over, but missed kick for point.

Dick Sparks shone in the third and as Eastland recovered a Comanche fumble on the visitors' end on the next play Sparks led to the 2 on a sweep off the left. Sparks went over on the play, and in two tries, granted because Comanche was offside on the first, Hicks kicked the point.

When a Maverick intercepted a Comanche pass on the Indians' end on the next play Jimmy Hines took a lateral and whizzed down to the 5. Comanche was penalized to the 1 for offside, and on the next play Hines went over, but Eastland offside, so a couple of plays Blair went over for the point. The passback on the try point was fumbled, and Hicks led the ball around the field and finally knocking it out of bounds.

In the next touchdown sequence, in the third quarter, took seven plays as Comanche recovered the ball.

It was a shame in a way that we had to treat their team so roughly. The Indians got within Eastland's territory only once, to the 42-yard line, and made two first downs to Eastland's 12. The score, of course, was Eastland 25, Comanche 0.

Incidentally, I don't think I ever reported the final wind-up of last spring's attempt by Eastland High to get out of its present athletic district and move into District 9A, which houses Coleman, Ballinger, Brady, Winters and others.

Coach Johnny Little tells me the deal was turned down in Austin where Interscholastic League officials said the move would tear up both districts. So that was that, I suppose.

Hico, which doesn't play Eastland this year, will be dropped from the district in all likelihood next season, making the district more compact.

Successful Sale Marks Opening Of Auction Barn

It was a big day for Eastland and for Sig Faircloth Tuesday when the Sig Faircloth Livestock and Commission Company's new livestock auction barn was opened.

The barn, located east of town on Highway 80, was thronged with people, and its pens were thronged with stock when the opening ceremony was held at 1 p. m. The Eastland High School band played, the ceremonies were broadcast over Station KSTB, Breckenridge, and a big time apparently was had by all.

Between the opening and 9 p. m., about 1100 head of cattle, plus various lots of sheep, hogs, and horses, were shoved through the auction ring at top speed to set a probable new record for day's sales in an auction barn in this section of the state.

After Fred Brown had welcomed Faircloth to Eastland and Faircloth spoke briefly, Auctioneer Tom Estes of San Angelo opened the sale, and he and Auctioneer Joe Coates kept it going in rapid fire order until the last calf was gone.

Prices bid were generally good, with buyers from the big packers well represented in the crowd.

A big buyer was Johnny Trigg of Cisco.

The barn was not finished for the auction, but all the essentials had been completed. Workmen this week were putting in windowpanes and other finishing touches, and a ceiling is to be added.

Estes touched on what the barn will mean for Eastland, and said that it ranked with the best in the state in size, layout and construction.

Hundreds of Eastland people attended the opening ceremony, and others dropped by from time to time during the sale.

Faircloth will hold auctions in the barn each Tuesday, and said he might add Friday sales days if the volume of livestock received makes it necessary.

Two Girls Injured; Driver Is Charged

Hilda and Lois Harpool, both of Eastland, received severe facial cuts and abrasions late Wednesday afternoon when the car in which they were riding collided with a car driven by J. J. Smith of Mingus about three miles east of Eastland on Highway 80.

C. B. Rhyne of Carbon, driver of the car in which the girls were riding, was charged later with reckless driving and aggravated assault with a motor vehicle, and was released on bond.

State Highway Patrolman Oscar Avera said Rhyne applied the brakes on the car he was driving, skidded sideways, and the car struck Smith's vehicle from that position. The Harpool girls were thrown from the car to the pavement.

At the Eastland Hospital, they were reported Thursday to be doing well, and their injuries were reported not serious.

Roper Fined \$100, Costs In Bus Case

John Lee Roper, charged before Justice of the Peace Tom Greer with passing a school bus while unloading passengers, was fined \$100 and costs in Carbon last Friday morning.

Roper gave notice of appeal to the County Court.

Officers said the case was the first of its kind in the county.

Raise Broilers To Make Money, Eastland Processor Advises

Want to make some money? Start raising broiler chickens for market. Or at least that was the advice this week of J. O. Earnest, Eastland frozen food locker owner and food processor.

Earnest said his plant has a capacity of at least 1000 broilers, eight to nine weeks old chickens, each day, 365 days a year. The plant is only handling a fraction of that number, he said.

Anyone having any sort of plants to exchange may bring them, place them on the exchange table, and in turn find something else to take home for her own garden or yard. Dust Storm Rides In With Norther

To add still more variety to a weather picture that had changed frequently for several days, a dust storm blew in from the Panhandle Thursday afternoon as the apparent forerunner of the second norther of November.

Weather men had been predicting the norther, but said it would be fairly mild. Texans versed in the ways of weather here in the fall were waiting to see.

Date of the first average frost of fall was only a week away.

Farmers with cover crops and winter grains planted were hoping for some more rains, but peanut farmers who had not completed harvesting their crops at the time of the recent rains were more than willing for the cold spell to be a dry one.

Farmers reported that planting of winter cover crops and grain was under way throughout the county.

The largest cover crop planting in the history of the county had been planned before the dry weather of early fall disrupted planting plans. Large plantings of vetch and rye and other cover crops are still expected, but it was believed the lateness of the planting season might cause a change of plans by some.

Converted Hebrew To Preach At Church

Rev. Samuel Goldberg, Hebrew Christian minister and missionary who has toured the nation speaking on behalf of Christ, will preach at the Eastland Church of the Nazarene at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. services Sunday, it was announced this week.

Elliott To Conduct March Of Dimes Campaign In County

The Eastland County March of Dimes campaign, scheduled for January, will be headed by County School Supt. Carl Elliott of Eastland. Elliott was named to head the fund drive at a recent meeting of the executive committee.

Composing the executive committee are Judge P. L. Crossley and Victor Cornelius of Eastland, Leon Kirk of Gorman, E. M. Howard of Rising Star, E. T. Thomas of Cisco and W. F. Creager and Mrs. Ella White of Ranger.

Personnel of a staff to assist Elliott will be announced soon, according to R. V. Galloway of Ranger, county chairman of the Eastland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis Fund.

The county-wide organization will consist of local chairmen and committees in every town in the county. Schools will also be asked to participate in the campaign, the chairman stressed.

Of the money raised in the drive, 50 per cent will remain in the county for local use. One case is now being aided by funds which were made available in previous March of Dimes campaigns.

Poppy Day Sale Set For Saturday Here

Next Saturday is "Poppy Day" in Eastland.

The annual American Legion Auxiliary Poppy day sales will be held, with Mrs. W. M. Coopeck as chairman and the Girl Scouts as salesmen.

Mrs. Coopeck will maintain a stand on the north side of the square at the entrance of Hollifield's Firestone Store, and will direct sales from there all day.

Poppies to be sold are made by disabled veterans of World Wars I and II in veterans' hospitals. The men are paid for their labors, and the proceeds from the sales go to buy materials used and to help them further.

Prizes are offered the girls selling the greater number of poppies Saturday. Last years total was \$257.21, which included sales in Eastland, Gorman and Olden. Mrs. Coopeck said she hoped last years sales could be topped next Saturday.

Blunk To Speak At Ceremonies Around Fountain

Armistice Day will be observed Tuesday in Eastland by a ceremony at the Memorial Fountain on the Courthouse grounds, and by the closing of most retail stores in town.

All veterans were asked to meet at the Connellee Hotel at 10:15 a. m. Tuesday and march to the fountain.

There, the Eastland High School Band will play two numbers, and Rev. J. B. Blunk, pastor of the First Christian Church who served as a chaplain in the recent war, will give an Armistice Day talk.

A wreath will be placed on the fountain by the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club, an annual observance of the club.

Following the ceremony, taps will be played honoring all of Eastland's war dead.

In observance of the day, the Lions Club has voted not to hold a meeting Tuesday. Stores will close under an agreement reached several years ago through the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

V.F.W. Post Plans Bronze Plaque To Honor War Dead

Plans for a bronze plaque bearing the names of Eastland County men who gave their lives in World War II were announced this week by officials of Karl & Boyd Tanner Post No. 4136, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Karl K. White, adjutant, said it is planned to place the plaque in the Courthouse, and possibly to have a duplicate cast to place in a veterans' center building it is hoped will be built later.

As Armistice Day approaches, the V.F.W. post released the last list of names of World War II dead from the county, and asked that corrections or additions be sent in at once so the list on the bronze plaque may be as accurate as possible. Meat Inspection Ordinance Passed

In special session, the Eastland City Commission Tuesday night passed an ordinance for meat slaughter inspection in Eastland.

Sponsors of the ordinance, which had been discussed for more than a year, said it would make possible the sale of locally slaughtered meat in Dallas, Fort Worth, and other population centers, when terms of the ordinance are complied with.

It was agreed that under the ordinance, meat from animals slaughtered here may not be graded unless all requirements of the inspection ordinance are complied with.

City Manager Hari O'Brien said Thursday that final work of the ordinance had not been completed, but that it would be released for publication next week.

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


