Mavs' Rugged Defense Big Factor In Beating Coleman 26-

Eastland Players Fired Up As Team Takes Bi-District

It was a great day for Eastland, when the Mavericks beat Coleman.

For years, Eastland football followers had watched their boys show promise, and then fail to come through when the chips were down.

So to many it was like a dream, a lovely but unbelievable dream, when the underdog Mavericks administered a sound licking to the Coleman Bluecats in Friday's bi-district game, 26 to 7.

The Eastland boys were fired up as they had not been all year. Some, like Bobby Blair and Jimmy Mathews and Wayne Lambert, played their usual hard games, and starred as they usually have.

But there were others, such as Dan Amis, Winfred Ward, Pat

Crawford, Dick Sparks, Johnny Hicks, Bill Hardeman, who played almost better than they knew how.

And in between somewhere were Lewis Crossley, Dwain Lusk, Jack Kelley and others, who did not reach inspired heights, perhaps, but played good, hard football.

And don't forget Jack Chamberlain. Jack didn't play too long, but he made the first of Eastland's four pass interceptions that turned the tide and upset Coleman's vaunted passing game until it looked feeble indeed.

On the basis of first downs and yards gained from scrimmage, the Eastland club would have lost the game, but they still don't award titles that way. Coleman racked up 15 first downs to Eastland's nine, and gained 228 yards net from scrimmage to Eastland's 222.

But just the same, it was Eastland's ball game almost all the way, because the Eastland defense, worked out carefully by Coaches Johnny Little and Wendell Siebert after Coleman had been carefully scouted, were ample at all times to take care of Coleman's offensive thrusts when the Bluecats got down into dangerous territory.

Ample, that is, until late in the game when Eastland was 26 big points ahead and Coleman made its lone score on a pass, run, 15-yard Eastland penalty and two short thrusts at the line.

But a lot happened before that. The night was cool and cloudy, but dry; the field was a bit soft but not too much; the crowd was big, but not as large as expected.

After Coleman received the kickoff and ran it back to its own 35, the Eastland line showed how it felt about things by breaking through the Bluecat forwards on the first scrimmage play to put White back for a five-yard loss.

It was this Tommy White, you know, who had been boomed for all-state, and he did connect during the evening for seven passes that gained 69 yards. But he also threw six passes that were incomplete, and Eastland intercepted four and ran them back for a total of 122 yards, so White's passing game was much more of a liability than an asset.

But back to the game—Amis

broke through and threw White for that first loss, and when the next play netted Coleman only a couple of yards, the Bluecats attempted a quick kick on third down and the partly blocked ball went out on the Eastland 48. The Mavericks found no holes and Mathews kicked out on the 17.

From there the Bluecats started rolling, and with Norton and Dozier carrying, mixed in with a pass from White to Dozier, reached the Eastland 35, but bogged down there and chose to kick, over the goal.

Eastland got the ball on its 20, and decided to roll some on its own. Mathews squirmed to the 26, Blair blasted to the 41 in two tries, Hicks swept the end to the 49, and Mathews made it a first down on the Coleman 48. Blair hit tackle to the 44, and then Mathews took off on a wide off-tackle sweep and raced to the Coleman 23. But there two Coleman tacklers managed to steal the ball from him to end the drive.

This legal larceny led nowhere much for Coleman, and a couple of minutes later Mathews took a Coleman punt on his own 5 and returned it to the 18. Eastland couldn't gain, and Mathews kicked out of bounds on the Coleman 44. On the last play of the first quarter, Chamberlain intercepted White's pass on the Eastland 30 and returned 21 yards into Coleman territory.

Blair got four yards, and here Eastland went into a spread formation, but a pass to Mathews from the spread lost a couple of yards—this was the only pass the Mavericks completed all night—and Hicks' run from the spread failed to get a first down, so Mathews kicked out of bounds on the Coleman 5.

The Bluecats got out of that hole all right by running the ball

out to the 31 with Dozier and Norton carrying, but bogged down there, and on fourth down on the 32, Amis smashed through to block a punt and the ball slithered out of bounds on the Coleman 18.

A trick pass play that had Crossley in the end zone all by himself failed when the pass was a bit long, so Blair tore through the left side of the Coleman line to the Bluecat 9, and then got a first down on the 5. Blair drove to the 3, but Hicks lost a couple of yards on the next play, and on third down Blair blasted to the 1. It was do or die on the next attempt, and with a mighty surge the Eastland forwards pushed the Coleman line far enough back for Hicks to push across. The low kick for point was blocked.

Coleman got the kickoff on its own 12 and returned to the 37, but could not gain there, and kicked to the Eastland 25, returned by Mathews to the 37. The fumbled there and Coleman recovered on the Eastland 35. After driving to the Maverick 29, White tried a fourth down pass that Sparks intercepted on the 22 and returned down the sideline to the Coleman 34. Hicks drove to the 28, but two incomplete passes ran out the half.

That 6 to 0 lead did not look too big as the second half began, but the Mavericks quickly changed that as Mathews took the kickoff on the Eastland 15, handed off to Blair, and Bobby ran all the way to the Coleman 29, the last five or six yards with a couple of Coleman tacklers hanging on.

In just seven plays Eastland had its touchdowns, with Mathews carrying to the 26, Blair to the 25, Mathews to the 22, Blair to the 17, Sparks to the 14, Blair to the 4, and Blair over for the score.

Hicks kicked the point and it was 13-0.

Shortly, the Mavericks were deprived of another good scoring opportunity when Crawford intercepted White's pass on the Coleman 35 and returned to the 28, and Mathews broke loose to run to the 12. But that play was called back and Eastland penalized to the 33, and a couple of plays later, Winfred Ward was ejected from the game and Eastland was penalized to the 49.

What happened on that deal will be talked about a long time. From the stands, it was clear that a Coleman player kneed Johnny Hicks after the Eastland signal caller had been thrown for a yard loss. Ward then roughly shoved the Coleman boy off Hicks, and the referee, who apparently had not seen the kneeling, saw Ward's action and ejected him and assessed the penalty.

Eastland was forced to kick, and the short punt went out on the Coleman 34. A couple of plays later, Sparks intercepted a flat zone pass, just as he had before, but this time on the Eastland 45, and threaded his way down the east sideline to score standing up. On the way he passed two or three apparently dazed Coleman players who looked from the west stands as if they could have pushed him out of bounds by putting out a hand and shoving. The try for point by Hicks was good on this one, too.

Coleman returned the subsequent kickoff to its 41, and picked up a first down on the Eastland 45, but there Eastland re-

covered a fumble, and could go because of a 15-yard holding penalty. Mathews kicked out on the Coleman 22, and Norton took a first down on the 44 as the quarter ended.

The Bluecats in the fourth period ran and passed to the Eastland 29, but lost the ball on downs, and Eastland began its only long, sustained scoring drive of the evening. Hicks and Blair did most of the ball carrying, with Mathews adding a few yards here and there, as the Mavericks drove to the Coleman 15-yard roughing penalty. Hicks took the ball on downs to the 10 and Mathews swept end to score untouched. The kick for point was blocked.

It might be of interest to note that every starting Eastland backfield man scored one or two touchdowns.

Coleman took the kickoff and drove for its only score as he had before described, with Jim Carr, a substitute back, making the score and Claude Kirk, another substitute, kicking the point.

The Mavericks took the kickoff and had time to make a first down before the game ended.

After the game, Eastland players said that after the first Eastland touchdown, the Coleman team got rough, and after the second, it got dirty.

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


