ONE YEAR AGO this week, ye editor and family were on a vacation trip to Salt Lake City, Utah. Naturally, we have watched with more than passing interest the news reports of the floods and mud slides which that area has been suffering during the past week.

One news report credited the work by the Latter Day Saints Church (Mormons) as keeping the damage from the catastrophe from being any worse than it was.

It seems that the Mormons already had an emergency plan ready to place into operation whenever floods should threaten the Salt Lake City area. One spokesman said "If we should need 20 people, or 200, or 20,000 on an hour's notice--we can have them."

It was noted that thousands of members of the Mormon Church gave of their time, tirelessly, packing and placing sandbags, in order to divert the floodwater from homes.

In one instance, the Utah residents were sandbagging around one home where the owners were away from home on a trip, and weren't there to do anything in their own defense. "If it were my home, I would want someone to be watching out for it," said one of the workers.

In another case, a Mormon church member's home was located near where the volunteer workers needed to divert the oncoming stream, in order to keep it from causing untold damage to a huge residential area.

Church leaders conferred with the homeowner, and explained that the new channel might cause his property to be damaged, but they would do all in their power to keep the damage as light as possible, but that they needed to come across his property to save the larger group of homes.

The church member, without hesitation, told the emergency workers to go ahead with their plan. "If it means that I have to give my home, then so be it. But I think the church will repay my losses," the homeowner said.

When we visited Salt Lake City last summer, we saw evidence of the tremendous strength of the Mormon Church, and how its members are so fiercely dedicated to the work of the church. Their regimentation in the face of a natural disaster has been surprising to some, but was much easier to believe when you had seen what they had accomplished in other areas.

The thing that enables the Mormons to succeed in their various projects is the fact that they believe in tithing their TIME, as well as their money, and their faith is such that their time and money seem to be readily donated.

In donating of their time, Mormons donate three full days per month for church projects of various kinds. Some of their projects include growing of vegetable gardens, to help feed their poor members.

Some of the Mormon's neighbors have been critical at times, calling the LDS church members "clannish," or "intolerant" of the non-Mormons.

We don't know if this is true or not, but if it is, perhaps the Mormons have a right to be somewhat intolerant. The Mormons stand for a lot of things which our protestant forefathers taught, and practiced a few generations ago.

The only thing is, the LDS members are faithful to their beliefs, and practice their church teachings. At a time when it has become somewhat fashionable not to be as dedicated to your church as people once were, perhaps we all can learn a lesson from these folks.

Bov. Wheat Growers Will Close Doors

One of the oldest institutions in Bovina, Bovina Wheat Growers, is closing its doors for good on Friday, June 10.

The business has been conducting a Quitting Business Sale, with inventory marked down. Customers are asked to come by and clear all accounts and turn in keys to the key-pump system by Friday.

Bovina Wheat Growers was organized in 1928, with Bob Caldwell as the first manager. Directors were F.W. Ayers, Caldwell, Mr. Miller, Mr. Morgan and Mr. Sides.

The company survived the depression and Dust Bowl days, and in 1939 a marketing agreement was signed between Bovina Wheat Growers and Producers Grain Corporation, which has headquarters in Amarillo.

Early in 1950 a fire almost destroyed the elevator, and did consume many of the records. Lee Thompson was manager at that time. In 1953, A.C. Teeter became manager.

Jim Russell became manager of the elevator in 1958, and served in that capacity until 1973, when Larry Webb was hired as manager. A Rhea Elevator and Farm Store facility was built in 1962. Earl Boyd served as manager of the Rhea elevator for virtually its entire history.

Rising interest costs, grain losses and crop failures in recent years, the elevator portion of the business was closed, and the fuel division, which had been added in 1978, was kept open.

Money Matters Are Discussed By Court

Re-investing of certificates of deposit and substitution of securities pledged to cover county deposits highlighted the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday, May 23.

At the suggestion of Benna Felts, County Treasurer, a motion was passed to re-invest two Farm to Market Certificates of Deposit maturing June 10, 1983 in two new CDs, to mature July 12, 1983.

In addition, two \$100,000 general fund certificates of deposit maturing June 10, 1983 were renewed for a month's time, and will mature on July 12, 1983.

A bill was approved for storage of surplus cheese which was given away

in the county in 1982. Amount of the bill was \$150.20.

Frona State Bank was given permission to substitute securities pledged to cover deposits. The bank had requested that \$115,000 of Ennis I.S.D. bonds maturing June 15, 1983 be replaced by \$140,000 of Texas A&M University Housing revenue bonds.

Soil Conservation work was approved for completion whenever machines are in the areas involved, with the county re-imburse the expenses. The work approved included on the farms of Donald Dale, Leslie McCain, O'Neal & Vincent, Maude Primrose, Nick Bamert, Gene McGuire and Royce Barnes.

Walker Takes Noon Break Here Monday

When Patrick Warren paused for lunch in Bovina on Monday, he may have appeared to those around him like almost any other tourist stopping for the noontime break.

There was one slight difference, however.

Warren is in the midst of a cross-country walk, in order to call attention to epilepsy, and the fact that people with epilepsy can accomplish a great deal.

The Philadelphia, Pennsylvania native began his 3,000-mile hike about a month ago in Los Angeles. If he stays on schedule, he plans to be home in Philadelphia by August 6, in time to help his youngest daughter celebrate her fourth birthday.

And when Monday evening arrived, and Warren had made it to his stopping place for the night, in Friona, he was a full day ahead of his original schedule.

"We've been at it a month, and we've been over mountains and across deserts, but we really haven't lost any time due to weather," Warren said, with a note of thankfulness.

But when Monday dawned, it first appeared that he might have his first "rain out." He had spent Sunday night in Texico, N.M., and when he awakened on Monday, it was raining. However, by about 7:30 Texas time, he was able to resume his journey.

He usually is out and walking by 6 a.m. each day, says the cross-country hiker, who says that walking has always been his hobby.

Prior arrangement, Warren and his accompanist, Ron Mirafior, were given supper and rooms at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Warren said that hospitals from coast to coast are cooperating by donating him a place to spend the night and a hot meal. Also, the Pizza Hut chain is donating meals.

He is receiving no money for the effort, but is doing it solely to call attention to epilepsy.

So far, after about 1100 miles on his trip, highlights include:

- *Killing two rattlesnakes, one near Kingman, Arizona which had six or seven buttons, and another near Portales, N.M.

- *Meeting U.S. Senator Pete Dominici and Agriculture Secretary John Block this past weekend in Portales, N.M., where he was persuaded to stay an extra day in order to meet the two government officials.

- *A little extra excitement Sunday night when he saw the tornado warning put out for this area (complete with the little funnel cloud on the television screen).

Warren says that everyone he has met on the trip has been exceptionally nice. He has received official proclamations from several cities, such as Needles, California, Gallup and Portales, N.M. He also was given the "Red Carpet Award" by the City of Albuquerque, and the "Key to the City" at Portales.

He has been offered rides, water, and even money by passing

motorists, but refuses money, suggesting instead that they send a contribution to an epileptic center.

"Hey, I'm giving the people a little good news for a change. Instead of having to hear about the trouble in the Mid-East or the economic problems, they can read about me, and take their minds off the bad news they're used to hearing," Warren said.

Warren is married, and he and his wife Patricia are parents of two daughters, Denise, 12, and Desiree, three. He said his wife was one of the biggest backers of his making the cross-country walk.

"Ever since I came up with the idea, she has been supportive. She has backed me up all the way," he said.

Warren had the idea of the cross-country walk a year ago, but on the advice of his doctor, did a "trial run" last summer which saw him criss-cross his native state of Pennsylvania a couple of times.

"When I held up all right physically after the Pennsylvania walk, they finally gave up and gave me the go-ahead to go cross-country. My goal was to bring the message of what epilepsy is to the entire U.S.," Warren said.

Both Warren and his companion, Mirafior, were excited about the recent NBA championship won by their hometown team, the Philadelphia 76ers.

"They've had it coming. They had been there three years," said Mirafior, who is a former state Golden Gloves boxing champion.

"I'm going the distance. I'm confident as hell that I'm going to make it," Warren says.

Reacting to having his project termed a monumental task, Warren said, "No, not really. What I'm

Complete Addresses Are Needed

Some people take pride in the fact that they are well known by citizens in their community. It is sometimes felt that a letter addressed to John Doe and the town should be sufficient address to get a piece of mail delivered. This may have been the case in years gone by.

Due to increasing mail volumes, duplication of names, etc., it is very important that each piece of mail be properly addressed, according to Postmaster Gene Ezell.

Each postal customer who has a post office box should use his complete address, including ZIP code, when corresponding so the correspondent's reply will contain the complete address.

One problem encountered by your friends at the post office is what to do with a piece of mail addressed to John Doe when there are two or more John Does. This type situation requires extra time which can cause delay to other mail. "Also, we sometimes have new employees who do not know every John Doe. The box number on your mail is very important," Ezell says.

"The Postal Service wishes to better serve you. You can help. Please use your box number and insist that your correspondents do also. Your cooperation is needed and appreciated," the postmaster concluded.

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Sarpalius Helps Kill Farm Bill

State Senator Bill Sarpalius spent the last few remaining hours of the 68th legislative session fighting against a bill which would adversely affect Texas farmers.

"The farmers of this state are already plagued with serious financial difficulties. It would be extremely unfair to impose additional hardships on our farmers by passing a bill which would force them to pay a lot of money, which some of them do not have," Senator Sarpalius says.

Senator Sarpalius successfully fought against a bill which would have brought most farmers and ranchers under the state's workers compensation law. The senator filibustered against the legislation for more than two hours Monday night. Senator Sarpalius filibustered for more than nine hours Friday night, when the bill was first introduced in the Texas Senate, by Senator Hector Uribe of South Texas.

Senator Sarpalius opposed the legislation despite strong lobbying efforts to pass the bill and despite Agricultural Commissioner Jim Hightower's support of the bill. Proponents of the legislation said the bill would affect a small percentage of Texas farmers. However, a large number of Panhandle farmers, who would have been affected by the bill, disagreed. "The bill would have hurt at least 30 to 40 per cent of all Texas farmers," Senator Sarpalius said.

The senator's filibuster forced final defeat of the bill. "I'm happy the farmers of this state won an important victory Monday night. If the bill had gained approval, it would have forced some Texas farmers out of business," Senator Sarpalius said.

House Calls For Repeal Of Tax

The House of Representatives repealed one of the most unpopular tax measures in history today, voting 382-41 to kill the withholding tax on interest and dividends.

The repeal vote came on a bill sponsored by U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, D-Texas, and six other members of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee.

"This should be a clear signal to the Administration and to all concerned with tax legislation that the American people will not tolerate such an unfair tax," said Hance. "Now that the House has called for repeal, I think the Senate will pass the measure and if President Reagan can read public sentiment at all, he will sign the bill into law before the July 1 starting date for withholding."

Under the Administration-backed law, ten per cent of the income savers and investors earn would be withheld by banks and other financial institutions.

"Withholding would take money out of the savings accounts of Americans who need the interest on that money more than the government does," said the Texas Democrat after the decisive vote.

Gifted/Talented Sessions Are Set

Elementary and junior high school students from area communities will participate in a week on the West Texas State University campus for a summer Gifted and Talented Institute session.

take ticket reservations and to answer any questions that any patron might have.

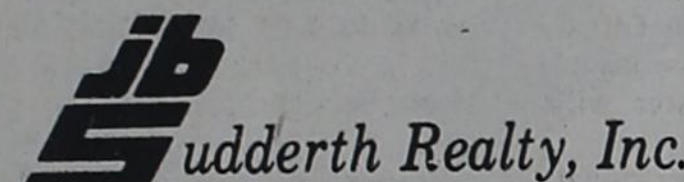

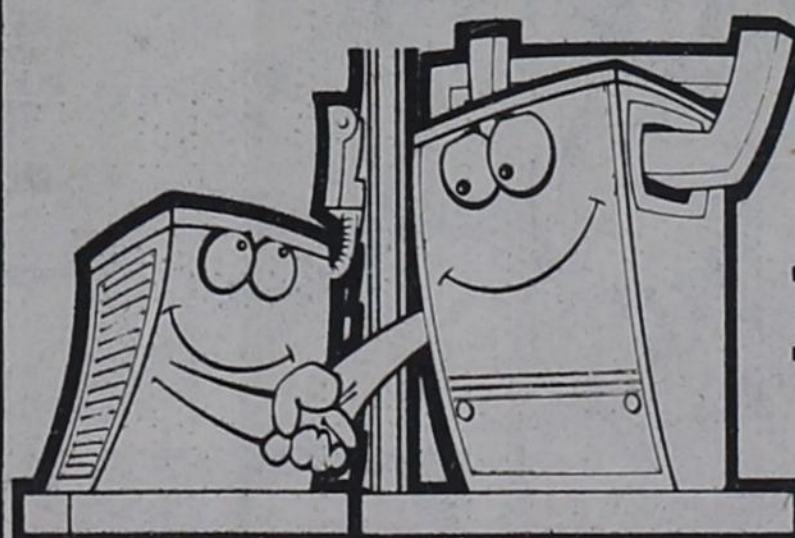
