FIVE INCHES OF SNOW FALLS IN MIDWEST GRAIN BELT

An unseasonal cold snap which left up to five inches of snow on the ground in the western grain belt of the midwest today tumbled the mercury below the freezing point in Texas.

Sen. Albert W. Hawkes, R., N. J., told a reporter he will try to insert such a rent-increase proviso in the pending senate rent bill. He thought it would be adopted. So did Sen. C. Douglass Buck, R., Del., who will manage the Senate rent bill on the floor.
