RADIO-ACTIVE FOOD TESTED ON A ROBOT

CLEVELAND (UP) Scientists here have a radio-active breakfast food on their shelves, but they promise it won't cause anyone to disappear in a mushroom of vapor or light up like a neon sign.

The "radio active food" was fed to an animated torso constructed especially by the Cleveland Health Museum for the atomic energy exhibit at the Mid-America Exposition. The path of the food through the digestive system was followed by a Geiger counter, an instrument used to detect direct radio-active rays.

Dr. Homer L. Friedell, professor of radiology at Western Reserve University, said work with radio active food and tracer elements will aid medicine in determining the role played by antibodies in protecting humans against disease.

He said radio-active atoms could be injected into food by several methods. "Sugar extracted from vegetables grown in an atmosphere of radio-active carbon and oxygen will contain radio-active atoms," Dr. Friedell said. "Meat containing the same atomic quality can be provided by feeding the vegetables to rabbits."

Wisconsin Plans Helicopter Training For Vets

MADISON, Wis. (UP)— Wisconsin may have one of the first state veteran-training programs for the development of helicopter, amphibious, and float airplane instruction.

The program was endorsed by members of the Wisconsin Aero-

autics Commission and recommended to the governor's education advisory committee for action. The commission emphasized the definite future for veterans in flying and maintenance of these type of aircraft.

T. K. Jordan commission executive secretary said experiments in Milwaukee have proved the value of carrying mail by helicopter to nearby cities.

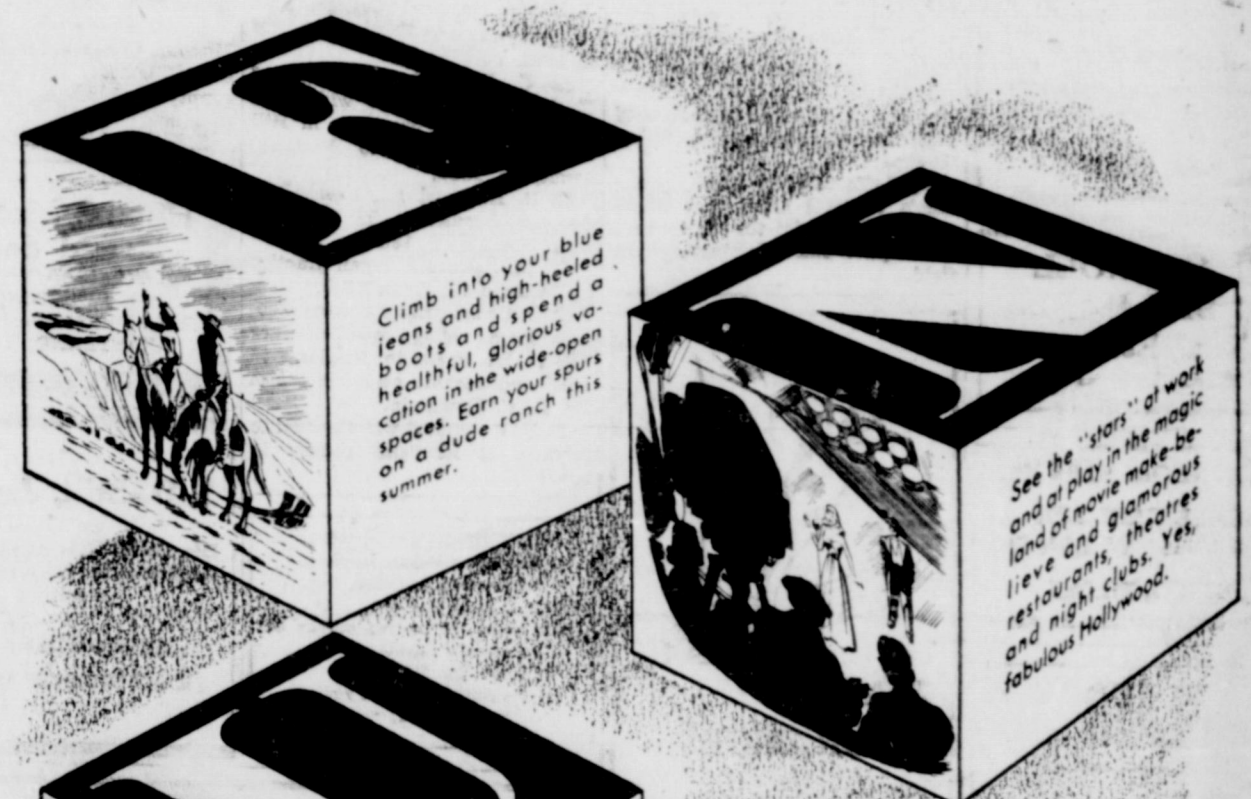

Questions and answers on Veteran Welfare matters, prepared by the Veterans Administration and the V. F. W. National Rehabilitation Service.

Q. What is the average age of World War II Veterans?
 A. Of those hospitalized, the average is 30 years.

Q. What papers should a veteran take to the lender when he goes to apply for a loan?
 A. Original discharge papers or certificate of eligibility.

Q. What must a veteran, who has lost his original discharge, do about getting a replacement?
 A. He must apply for a certificate in lieu of the discharge paper from the branch of the service from which he was discharged.

Q. Will a certified true copy or a photostatic copy serve in place of the original discharge paper in getting a guaranteed loan?
 A. No.

Q. At what rate of interest can I borrow on my National Service Life Insurance policy?
 A. After your converted NSLI policy has been in force by payment of premiums for one year or longer, you can borrow an amount up to 94 per cent of the cash value. The interest charged out on the loan will be 4 per cent.

Q. I am going to college under the GI Bill but am dissatisfied with the school and would like to know if I can transfer to another College?
 A. Yes, under the regulations of VA you may change your school, but you must have an approval of VA in advance.

Q. Can I make NSLI premium payments on my policy at any VA office?
 A. All VA offices except contact offices are authorized to receive premium payments on National Service Life Insurance.

Q. I was discharged from the U. S. Army in May, 1945. Are readjustment allowances still available to me?
 A. Yes, readjustment allowances are available to any eligible veteran until two years after the date of his discharge or release, or until two years after the official termination of the war, whichever is later.

Q. Under what conditions is a veteran entitled to out-patient treatment from the Veterans Administration?
 A. A veteran whose disabilities are service-connected may receive out-patient medical, surgical and dental service for service-connected diseases or injuries. Treatment may be given to a VA field station or VA may authorize it to be given by a physician or dentist in the applicant's place of residence.

Q. Is there any way that I can get the Veterans Administration to deduct my National Service Life Insurance premiums from the monthly disability compensation check mailed to me each month?
 A. Yes, you may go to any VA regional office or to a contact office and fill out a form which will authorize Veterans Administration to make the deduction from your compensation check.

TRUMAN TO ATTEND WAR OUTFIT MEET

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UP)—President Harry S. Truman and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower are among the notables scheduled to attend the reunion here June 5, 6, and 7 of the 35th Division, midwestern aggregation which saw the blood and mud of Europe in both World Wars.

It will be the first get-together since before Pearl Harbor of the veterans who spearheaded the breakthrough at St. Lo in the recent conflict and fought in the Argonne of World War I.

President Truman, a captain of

Battery D, 129th Field Artillery in the division in World War I, is slated to make the major address at memorial services concluding the three-day reunion.

The services will be conducted by the 35th Division Association's chaplain, Col. (Monsignor) L. Tieran, who was head chaplain of the division in the first World War and chief of chaplains in the European Theatre of Operations in the second.

Mayor Georges Pierre La Valley, French underground leader who received the warning from Eisenhower that his city would be destroyed to permit the breakthrough of American forces advancing from Normandy, will arrive in Kansas City June 4 to be a guest of the division.

Henri Bonnet, French ambassador to Washington, will arrive with LaValley and will decorate the division's massed unit battle flags. He will present other decorations cited by the French government during the battle.

Governors Phil M. Donnelly of Missouri, Frank Carlson of Kansas and Val Peterson of Nebraska have been invited as special guests to receive from Eisenhower the remainder of the division's battle flags of World War II which have just been returned to this country.

The division was formed of Missouri, Kansas, and Nebraska national guardsmen in World War I and served more than a year in France. It was reorganized as a national guard division in the three states after the armistice. It was mobilized in 1940 for World War II.

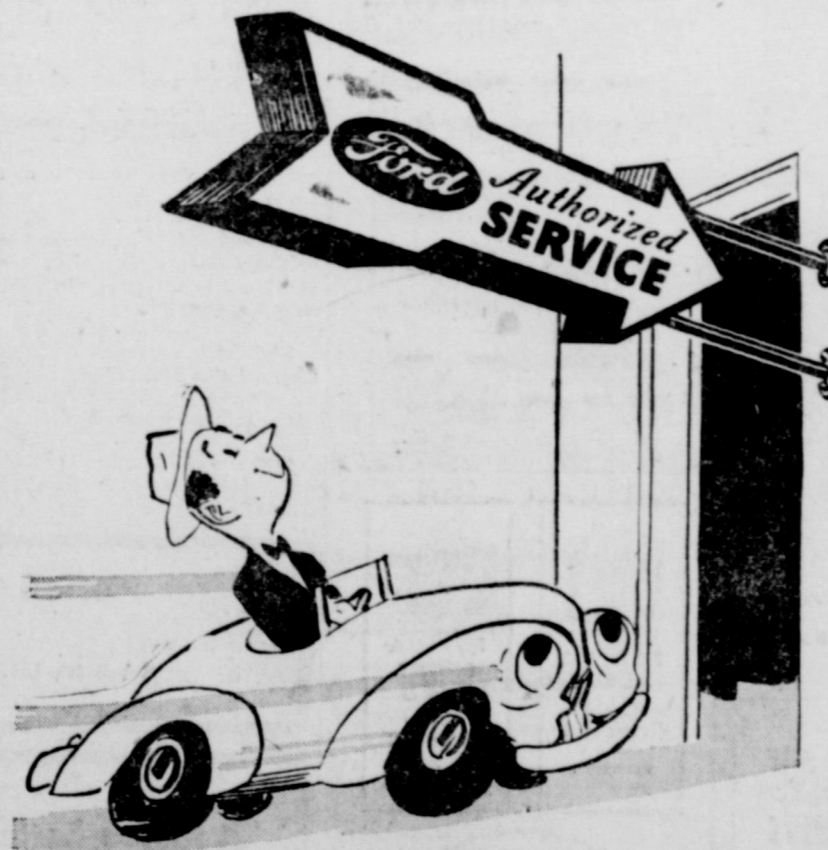

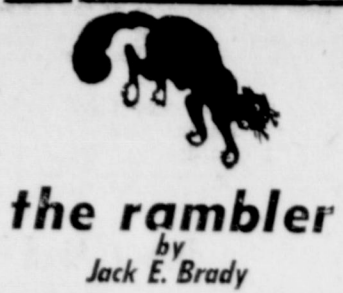

Reading Boys, Girls Behave, Chief Says

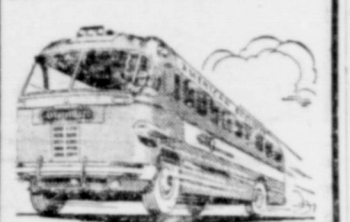
