That Reminds Me

It has been estimated that the damages caused by soil erosion cost this country about four billion dollars a year, directly and indirectly. More than 280,000,000 acres of crop and grazing land have already been ruined or badly damaged. Another 775,000,000 acres have been eroded to some degree, leaving us with only 460,000,000 acres of high-grade productive crop land in the United States.



PRESIDENT REJECTS 2ND INCOME TAX CUT BILL

WASHINGTON — President Truman today again rejected the \$4,000,000,000 Republican income tax reduction bill, but this time the House promptly overrode his veto.

The Senate, however, is expected to sustain the veto late in the day. This would kill the tax reduction bill for the second time in a month and eliminate all chances for enactment of a tax cut this year.

The House vote was 299 to override the veto and 108 against. This was 27 votes more than the two-thirds majority necessary to override.

In vetoing the revised bill with its Jan. 1 effective date, Mr. Truman repeated his previous objections—that it was inflationary, unsound and unfair to the low-income group.

And he injected a brand new argument—the international crisis caused by the recent sharper division between the Russian bloc and the west.

Although the House overrode his decision, a veto sticks unless both the House and Senate override by two-thirds majorities.

The Senate was expected to fall two votes short of the necessary two-thirds.

The House had sustained the veto of the first tax measure a month ago by a two-vote margin, making it necessary for the Senate to act that time.

Republican spokesmen charged Mr. Truman with abusing the presidential veto power for political purposes.

National Chairman Carroll Reece said in a statement that "apparently Mr. Truman is determined that his three-and-a-half year tenure in the White House shall go down in history as the veto administration."

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Says Tito Has Fifth Column Working Here

WASHINGTON — Chairman Charles A. Eaton of the House foreign affairs committee said today the United States is "with a sight of a shooting war this minute in Greece."

The New Jersey Republican told the House rules committee that the Soviet Union, as a result of Secretary of State George C. Marshall's "plan" for the rehabilitation of Europe, "has taken off its mask."

"Either America will stand and hold the fort," he said, "or Russia will take over Greece, and if Russia takes over Greece, the destiny of mankind is at stake."

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Truman Signs Bill On Presidency Succession

COAST DAMS CALLED THREAT TO SALMON

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (UP)

—Columbia River salmon, known the world over, are doomed to extinction by the great dams rising in the Pacific Northwest, fishery interests told a federal hearing here.

Proposed new dams across the Lower Snake and Columbia Rivers would block off the salmon's wondrous migration to their spawning grounds, witnesses testified before the Columbia Basin Interagency Committee hearing.

Commercial and sport fishermen advocated a 10-year moratorium on downriver dam construction while the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service tried to relocate the major portion of the salmon run below the silt of the new dams.

Value of the present fish ladders at Bonneville Dam, 40 miles up the Columbia from Portland, Ore., was debated at length by witnesses. Proponents of more dams pointed out a record number of fish had passed Bonneville this spring by leaping from pool to pool up the graduated ladder.

But fishing interests charged there were "significant losses" in both upstream and downstream migrants at Bonneville, reflected in decreased commercial catches at Astoria, Ore.

Dr. Paul Needham, Oregon game commission biologist, warned, "The evidence seems to point to the fact we can't have salmon and high dams, too."

Arnie J. Suomela, Oregon master fish warden, said salmon have only a certain amount of stored energy to sustain them on their long upstream battle to their spawning grounds. He prophesied losses would be accelerated at each successive dam the fish had to surmount.

Members of Columbia River Indian tribes, whose forefathers had fished the same waters for untold centuries, also turned out, some in business suits and others in braided hair and colorful tribal costumes, to oppose any new dams.

The Indians called on the government to live up to treaties signed in 1855 guaranteeing the Indians' right to fish the river. Even today, salmon provides as much as 70 per cent of the Indians' diet.

Proponents of the dam construction program stressed the need of cheap hydroelectric power and cheap river navigation to the "inevitable growth" of the Pacific Northwest. They claimed overfishing, and not the dams, had curtailed the salmon catch over recent years, and said a 18-year moratorium on commercial fishing—instead of dams—would salvage the industry.

Remains Cheerful Despite 7 Years Borrowed Time

ST. LOUIS (UP)—Living on borrowed time for seven years has not kept small, attractive Helen Maysee, 17, from being happy.

She suffers from splenic anemia and has been the ward of a hospital here ever since she was one month old. Her spleen was removed when she was four, and six years later physicians gave up, saying that she had only a few weeks to live.

Since that time, Helen has had a blood transfusion every six or eight weeks. She is in the hospital about four months out of every year but remains cheerful.

Without the transfusions, the girl would die, but so far, physicians and nurses at the hospital have been able to donate the blood for her.

Pioneer Grub Planned For Centennial Trek

SALT LAKE CITY (UP)—The Sons of Utah Pioneers will eat venison, elk, buffalo and antelope meat this summer on their centennial trip over the trail of the Mormon pioneers.

From Navajo, Ill., to Salt Lake City, the venison and elk meat has been donated by the Utah State Fish and Game Commission. Fish and Game and buffalo meat was obtained by special permission non hunts in Wyoming.

The group, simulating the pioneer conditions as much as possible, also will have baked beans, boiled potatoes, Irish stew and dried fruits on the menu for the trip over the historic trail.

Nazarene Church Names Rev. W. C. Emberton, Pastor

Members of the Eastland Nazarene Church announce the Church has a new pastor, Rev. W. C. Emberton of Crystal City. He will be in Eastland next week to take over his duties as pastor, and will preach Sunday July 27. The new minister succeeds Rev. John Huley, who moved to Perryton.

Fresh Guerilla Forces Gather

ATHENS — Guerillas in northwestern Greece scattered today under heavy strafing attacks from Greek aircraft, but a fresh guerilla force was reported forming in Albania.

Greek war minister, George Stratos, said the new guerilla force was sighted behind Lake Prespa, at the juncture of the Albanian, Yugoslav and Greek frontier.

SAYS RUSSIA WILL VETO U. S. PLAN

LAKE SUCCESS — A Bulgarian official predicted today that Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko would veto the United States plan for a long-term United Nations border commission to police the Balkans.

The Bulgarian official asked that his name not be used.

The forecast of Russia's decision in the east-west dispute over the Greek question came as the UN Security Council undertook point-by-point argument on the majority-backed American proposals rising out of the UN Balkan inquiry. The proposals are aimed at Soviet-supported Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Albania.

American sources reported, meanwhile, that a pre-meeting huddle between American, British and French officials had resulted in an agreement which apparently put an end to the French efforts to modify the American proposals.


WASHINGTON — The House Un-American Activities Committee is investigating charges that Marshall Tito's Communist-dominated Yugoslav government has a "fifth column" operating in the United States, it was learned today.

Chairman J. Parnell Thomas, R., N.J., said witnesses already had told the committee privately that Tito has an "active" fifth column at work among Americans of Slav extraction. He said an ex-Yugoslav diplomat had been called to testify on the charges.

WASHINGTON (UP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee today approved the long-debated St. Lawrence seaway project but postponed consideration of the measure on the Senate floor until next year.

MAKES HOUSE SPEAKER HEIR PRESUMPTIVE TO OFFICE

WASHINGTON — President Truman today signed a bill which makes Republican Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., his heir presumptive to the presidency.

The new law specifically puts the House speaker next to the vice president in the line of succession to the White House post when the president becomes unable to serve. After the speaker comes the president of the Senate.

Since there is now no vice president, Mr. Truman having left that post when he succeeded to the presidency on the death of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, Martin is the next in line.

The Massachusetts Republican will continue in that role until the term Mr. Truman is serving out expires on Jan. 20, 1949. At that time, an election having intervened, the country will have a vice-president again.

The House speaker will then be no. 2 in the line of succession.

Thus far in U. S. history, the vice president is the only officer in the line of succession who ever actually moved up to the presidency. That has happened seven times.

DeLeon Man Pays Fine of \$69.00 In Eastland Court

A De Leon man entered pleas of guilty in three cases, two on speeding charges and one for operating a car without a drivers license, in Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood's court in Eastland Thursday afternoon. He paid fines totaling \$69.00.

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


Readjustment Allowance Check Be Void Aug. 1
