



### **Has Limits On Some Claims**

Avoid the last minute rush and act now. Because there are time limits for submitting medical insurance claims, you have only until December 31. 1983 to file claims for services you had 10/01/81 through 09/30/82.

The Medicare office reports that you will receive more accurate and expeditious service if you will submit your medical insurance claims as you incur the charges during the year. Since many people wait and submit their claims January of each year, this causes extremely heavy workloads which in turn causes delays in the processing of your claim.

They also report that if Medicare needs to contact either you or your provider for additional information on a particular service and charge, it will delay your entire claim until the matter is resolved. Remember, you always have at least 15 months to submit a Medicare claim but time is running out on some claims.

**Court Okays Bill For Courthouse** 

Payment of the bill for the new roof which was applied to the courthouse was one of the main items of business for the Parmer County Commissioners' Court on November 28.

The bill amount was \$13,490.00 and the contractor was Leaway Roofing of Hereford.

The search continues for a new County Agent to replace Seth Ralston. Dr. Catherine Crawford, county Extension Department supervisor, said there were apparently some additional applications on the way to her as of November 28.

A motion was passed to advertise for a used farm-type tractor for purchase and use in Precinct 1.

The court had received a bill for pre-adoption physicals for three of the county foster children. It was explained that when foster children are being considered for adoption, they must have physical examinations periodically until the adoption process is completed. A motion was passed to pay the bill, in the amount of \$69.00.

Further discussion was held on the sale of used sprinkler pipe belonging to the county. Judge Roberts was instructed to talk to the interested parties, and sell the pipe to the highest bidder.

Payment of the expenses of a visiting court reporter, in the amount of \$37.89, was approved.

## **Postmaster Offers Xmas Mailing Tips**

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, Postmaster Gene Ezell is offering tips for customers to assure that their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state, and ZIP Code reserved for the last line.

It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 31/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers

DON'T OVERWRAP: Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in processing equipment.

SEAL PROPERLY: Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive.

AVOID SMUDGES; Use smudgeproof ink for your addressing.

**POSITION ADDRESSES PRO-PERLY:** Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

USE ZIP CODES: Be sure to include the ZIP Code in both the recipient's and your return address.

TIME IT RIGHT: Mail early in the month and early in the day.

**USE THE RIGHT SERVICE:** Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other valuables, should be sent by registered mail.

IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME: Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch or through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings. The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and special delivery. Customers interested in Priority Mail should contact the post office for details.



## New Rules Apply **To Social Security**

Starting in 1984, part of the Social Security benefits received by people with substantial other income may be subject to the Federal income tax, a Social Security spokesperson said recently.

IN 1984

This change in the law was part of the 1983 Social Security amendments which were designed to strengthen the Social Security program for many years into the future.

Up to half of the person's Social Security benefits for 1984, and for later years, will be subject to tax if his or her adjusted gross income for Federal tax purposes, plus nontaxable interest income and half of the Social Security benefits exceed a base amount.

The base amount is \$25,000 for an individual, \$32,000 for a couple filing a joint return, and zero for a couple filing separate returns. The amount of benefits subject to taxes will be the smaller of:

\*One-half of the Social Security benefits, or

\*One-half of the amount of the person's combined income-adjusted gross income, non-taxable interest income, and half the Social Security benefit--exceeds the base amount.

Some adjustments in benefit payments may be possible. Any overpayment that person repays during the year can be deducted. Also, any lump sum received can be prorated to the year for which it was paid if that is an advantage. Any Medicare medical insurance premium deducted must be included in total benefits.

The Internal Revenue Service will provide complete instructions on how to file tax returns. Social Security has a free leaflet which briefly explains about taxing benefits.

**Donations** Are Being

Accepted Now For

**Project Christmas Card** 

Many of these appliances are quite useful. Most are relatively inexpensive and take little energy to operate. Does this make them ideal Christmas gifts for those special people on your list? Maybe yes, maybe no.

First, ask yourself if the intended receiver has a place to put another appliance. If the answer is "no" you might want to consider a magazine subscription, a box of Texas citrus, or a gift package of homemade preserves instead.

If the answer is "yes," then consider whether the person will actually use the appliance.

A gift will be much more appreciated if it is actually used than if it is this season's "hot item" that sits on a shelf the rest of the year. We know from research that people are less likely to use electrical appliances received as gifts than those they select for themselves. So it's probably a good idea to get some idea of the person's opinion and preferences about a small appliance before buying one.

Some other questions to guide the would-be gift giver include:

\*Does the appliance do a task now performed by another appliance? If so, will it do the job faster or less expensively?

\*Will it serve more than one function? If so are these functions truly useful?

\*Does it have an Underwriters' Laboratory (US) seal certifying the electrical safety of both the appliance and the cord?

\*Is adequate wiring available? Too many small, especially heat producing appliances can overload a circuit.

\*Is service available locally? Or will the appliance need to be sent to a central service center at the owner's expense?



Is there any test data available you can use to make brand comparisons before buying the item?

We often say that it's the thought that counts rather than the gift itself. But a truly thoughtful gift is one that considers the real needs of the receiver.

If you're that receiver with a self full of unneeded appliances, try clipping this article to your Christmas list to give Santa a hint.

Family Reunion--Pain or Pleasure? During the holiday season most adults and children yearn to touch base with home and home folks. In today's mobile society, however, a family reunion can be a strong support for reaching out to the family's past and gaining insights for the future, or it can be the beginning of disharmony. Four generation families are now common in the U.S. Young parents and their children do not ordinarily live with the grandparents, but the various generations usually keep in touch. When total families get together in reunion-settings, large numbers are commonplace. The more people, the more expensive the event. Mass kinfolk gatherings are fun but occasionally disappointing. To enjoy days of good will and personal growth, family reunions take planning. Food, lodging, special activities and events, entertainment items and time off from jobs are costly, especially if one family assumes an unequal share of the responsibilities. Kin are very important in cultures when marriage is not mandated or the culture is accepting of singlehood. Kinfolks usually provide aid in situations of stress or deprivation. Belongingness and the sense of integrity are enhanced by kin gatherings, family history and symbols of family continuity. Many psychologists today are looking at the effects the

family of origin has on selfconcept. Family therapists are encouraging families under stress to tackle unresolved emotional issues with the families in which they were raised. Reunions give stressed family members an opportunity to view family situations first-hand.
