"MY TURN" By **Carol Ellis**


SEVERAL OF YOU have made some nice remarks about the "My Turn" column of July 9, which was about old expressions.

COMBEST SAYS Drought **Aid Is** Available

Farmers and ranchers experiencing drought conditions in counties previously ineligible for federal assistance can now apply to their local Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service offices, U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) announced this week.

Combest said U.S. Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng is allowing county ASCS boards to determine drought conditions on a farm-byfarm basis.

"This is especially important to ranchers of the 19th Congressional District because, while as a whole the district has received adequate rainfall, some specific areas have received little or no rain," Combest said. "This will entitle qualified ranchers to participate in emergency feed programs."

Producers determined to be eligible for emergency programs can participate in the Emergency Feed Program, a cost-sharing plan in which the federal government pays for a percentage of the emergency feed. They are also entitled to participate in the Emergency Feed Assistance Program, which allows them to receive emergency feed from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks at 75 per cent of the county loan rates. "I appreciate this move by Secretary Lyng to assist those farmer and ranchers who are experiencing adverse effects of the drought while others in neighboring communities are not," Combest added.

"I could count the number of center pivot systems in the county on the fingers of one hand 15 years ago. Now, there are more than 675 pivot systems operating in the county. You would see one or two sprinkler systems go up in a particular area, then the systems would blossom out from there," he says.

"These sprinklers have been a salvation to me since they have helped put me back into a profitable farming situation," Gallman says. He estimates a 20 per cent return on his net investment.

"I can now graze cattle and double crop with the labor savings from center pivots. I couldn't do that with row watering," he says. Gallman uses six center pivot sprinklers on his 840 acre operation. His starter system, a 1975 Zimmatic center pivot, is located atop a hill, and he credits the sprinkler with making the land tract farmable. "This pivot really sold me on these sprinkler systems. When we row watered, the water would break out at a certain point on the hill, go around the sides of the hill and then run down the turnrow. You can just imagine the erosion this caused. Two large tailwater return pits were located at the bottom of the hill to catch the runoff. Another problem in farming this land was the irrigation

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



A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,000 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of \$69.42.
