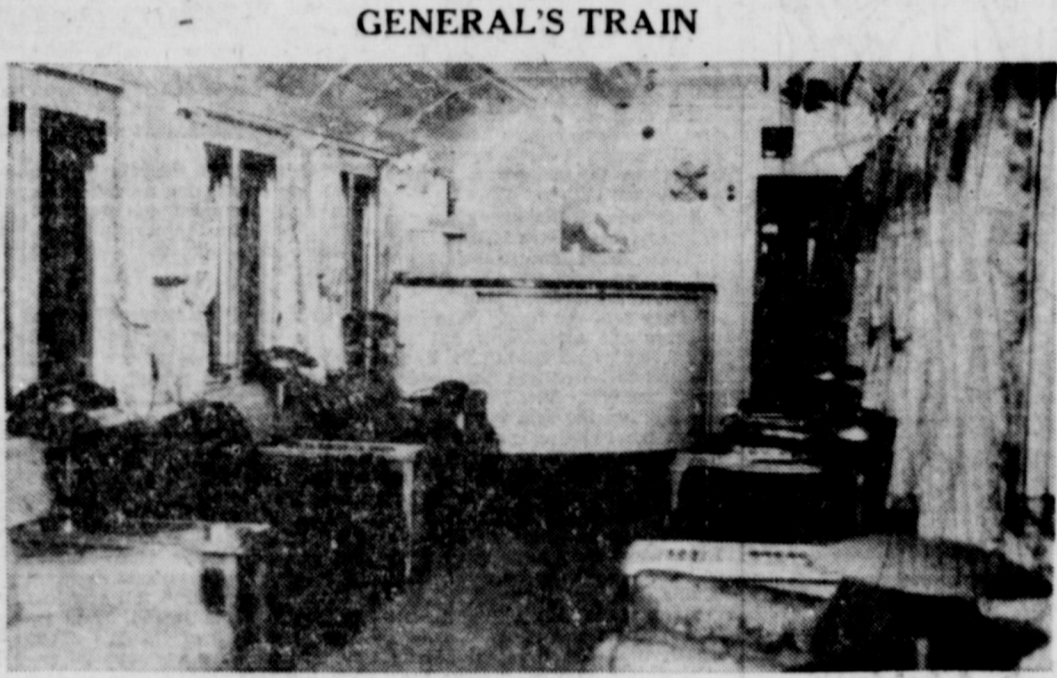

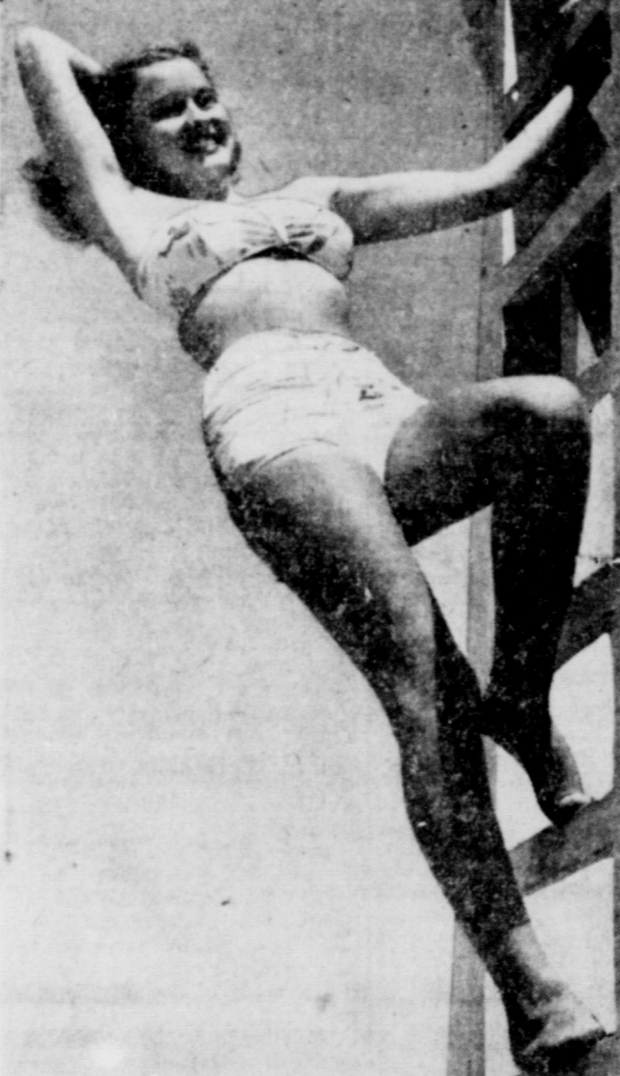

## U. S. Children Learn German Fast In Berlin

Berlin school will be accredited by American schools, although formal announcement of this has not been received here yet. One thing the kids lack is an athletic field. They have no opportunity for sports in the school, but have access to many of the military sport fields. Keeping teachers is one of the greatest problems for schools in Germany. Most teachers stay only a year. They are paid from non-appropriated funds with no assurance of a permanent position. Many come for travel and adventure or to get married. Boyne said Berlin is more fortunate than most places in Germany. About one third of the teachers plan to return to Berlin. Boyne said the Berlin Department's School compares very favorably with the average small high school in the United States. It is located in a large, modern building which before the war was a high school for 800 German girls. "The teachers like it here," he said. "They like Berlin and the teaching conditions. We have far more applicants than we can handle."

## Scorpion Turns German Youth Against Texas

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UP)—Youthful Fred Volbach whose early schooling was in Germany and Italy is a pre-med student at Texas Christian University but he doesn't expect to practice in Texas. He found a scorpion in his room recently and it turned him against the state permanently. Sixteen-year-old Volbach remembers that they had "beasts" in Italy, too. He said they were overgrown mosquitoes. The last school Volbach was enrolled in before coming to America was the Marcantonio Coloniano school in Rome. Previously, he had attended school in Darmstadt, Germany, his original home. His uncle, Dr. Walter R. Volbach, is a speech professor at TCU.
