



CLEVELAND, (UP)-Women get married more ofen than men do in Cuyahoga County- the Greater Cleveland area-a survey

A study of 1,200 January marriage license applications made by Commissioner William Jenks revealed that the odds were three to one that persons married in that month never tried it before. For every eight people divorced here in December, there were three who married a second, third or fourth time in January.

Of the 2,400 individuals involved in Jenks' study, 602 had been married at least once before. Of them, 317 were women and 285


