## Side Issues

With this issue, The Eastland County Record launches its 18th year in this vale of tears, sorrow, laughter and joy, and it undoubtedly is a much healthier 18-year-old than a lot of people predicted when it began its career in the dark and gloomy days of 1931.

The 17 years spanned by The Record in Eastland have seen a lot of things happen in Eastland County, and a survey of the files of The Record would give a person a fair idea of some of the history of that period in the county.

The depression was here when the first issue of The Record was published. The WPA days came and went; war clouds loomed, Pearl Harbor came, and the war with it; The record chronicled the doings of our own men who had a part in the great struggle; there are stories in the files of the draft, of gas and tire and food rationing. Came V-E and V-J Days, and then peacetime problems and accomplishments; Eastland had a resurgence of growth, and the entire county was on the upgrade again, and has remained so until now, despite a temporary setback because of last summer's drought.

It's all there in the files of The Record, but we don't look back often. Our job is to give you the news of today, and we usually let the historians record what happened in all of our yesterdays.

According to County Agent J. M. Cooper, who has made a more or less deep study of the subject, the kind of cigarettes smoked by ranchers is an unusual but fairly accurate barometer of the economic conditions on the farms and ranches.

But let's let Cooper tell it: "Having worked and observed farm and ranch people in three counties during the past 10 years, I believe that rural folks are much better off financially at the present time, if the kind of tobacco they use can be taken as an indicator."

"Ten years ago, when I first started as a county agent, about nine out of 10 farmers and ranchers 'rolled their own' smokes out of two kinds of tobacco. Today the situation is reversed as about nine out of 10 of them smoke 'tailor made' or manufactured cigarettes, which most of them buy by the carton or cartons."

"The eating habits of rural people are changing also. I should know, as I eat with some rural family about twice a week on the average."

"They eat more beef and less pork now than formerly. This might or might not be construed as a barometer of good times. They also eat more salads, whereas back in 1938 it was a rare farm family that had any lettuce or salad on the table for lunch. Light bread is found on the table more often, although biscuits and corn bread have not been forsaken, but still occupy their old familiar place on the table corner."

## Special Programs To Mark Easter In Local Churches

Most Eastland churches will offer special programs Sunday as Easter marks the day observed as the anniversary of the Resurrection of Christ.

First of the actual Easter services will be a special sunrise service at the First Christian Church at 6 a. m. Sunday. Ed Freyschlag will direct young people of the church in the service.

The general public was invited to attend the service, the only one in Eastland at that time that church officials knew of.

At the First Methodist Church, special Easter music will be sung, and soon after the morning service begins at 10:30 a. m., babies of the congregation will be baptised. Following the Easter sermon by Rev. E. R. Gordon, a class of adults will be received into the church. Members and friends of the church were invited to bring Easter lilies or other flowers and place them on the altar in memory of a loved one.

Rev. M. P. Elder, pastor, will be in charge of Easter services at the First Presbyterian Church Sunday morning.

At the First Baptist Church, Easter will mark the ending of an eight-day revival series, with the pastor, Rev. L. M. Chapman, bringing the morning sermon on "The Living Saviour." The church is hoping for 600 in Sunday School that morning. Saturday night, Mr. Chapman will preach on "Heaven," and Joe Trussell, song leader in the revival, will sing "The Holy City."

The Holy Trinity Episcopal Church will hold its Easter services Sunday morning in the Majestic Theatre, despite earlier hopes of being in the new church building on South Seaman Street by Easter. The congregation will, however, be in the new church building the following Sunday, it was said.

Various other churches of the city will hold Easter services on Sunday morning also. This week, pastors of the churches joined in inviting the people of the city to attend the church of their choice Sunday.

### No Candidates Have Filed Yet For School Board

No candidates had filed Thursday for places on the Eastland School Board, with two places to be filled in an election Saturday of next week.

Monday noon will be the filing deadline. School Board Secretary Curtis Hertig will accept applications for filing from candidates. His office is in the Exchange Building.

Little talk was circulating in Eastland about the proposed 25-cent school tax increase to be voted on at the same time as the trustees, but on different ballots. School board members, who voted unanimously to submit the question to vote, were talking to various Eastland organizations about the need for extra money, but apparently without arousing too much enthusiasm or opposition.

School Board Members Frank Sparks and Bob Vaughan talked to members of the Band Boosters Club Tuesday night about the proposal, and Vaughan is due to talk to fellow Lions Club members about it next Tuesday.

School board members whose terms expire in April are Norris Wilson and I. C. Inzer.

Voting in the election will be in the basement of the Court house.

W. W. Linkenhogger announced late Thursday that he had completed the sale of his business to E. M. and Pearson Grimes, and that the place would be under new management Friday morning under the name of Grimes Brothers.

Final closing of the deal had been delayed by the fact that Pearson Grimes, who was to have closed it, was operated on for appendicitis earlier in the week and is in the Eastland Hospital.

Linkenhogger disposed of all of the business except his Goodyear tire line.

E. M. Grimes, who has been living in Cleveland, Texas, and had to make a rush trip to Eastland to close with Linkenhogger, was accompanied here by his older brother, O. C. Grimes, of Cleveland, who will help him until Pearson Grimes recovers.

Linkenhogger said the establishment was to have been closed Friday and Saturday for inventory, but that because of the situation, the Grimes brothers had agreed to take his perpetual inventory system as a basis for beginning operations, and would be ready for business Friday morning.

## - Fishin' -

Well, it seems that the art of fishing is the topic of the day and the ole fishing bug has gotten hold of a great many of our local citizens.

With the professional assistance of Cecil Holifield, the Eastland County director of the Possum Kingdom Game and Fish Association, we will try to keep our rod and reel readers posted on fishing conditions in this part of the country.

Those who went to Possum Kingdom on the bright, clear days early this week reported a lot of big catches, with the bass especially anxious to grab lures.

Since bass, brim, crappie and catfish make up the catch, let's talk about them a little bit. The large-mouth bass is probably the most widely distributed game fish in the world, and certainly more American anglers fish for this hard-fighting gamester than for any other. It is native from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico and from the Atlantic to the Rocky Mountains. The large-mouth bass prefers mud-bottomed lakes and streams with plenty of weed growth; they are cover fish. They like lily beds, rushes and overhanging banks from which they dart out for minnows, frogs, aquatic insects, and other food.

The large-mouth bass does well in water from 55 all the way up to 90 degrees, but prefers 70 to 72 degree water. Bass go into the shallows to spawn in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60 to 62 degrees. The world's record large-mouth bass was taken June 2, 1932 in Montgomery Lake, Ga., and weighed 22 pounds, 4 ounces.

Next week we will discuss another species of the fish family, and before I forget it, I want to tell you fishermen that Cecil Holifield is conducting a general information bureau about fishing, bait, and a thousand and one things you'd like to know about the sport; just drop a penny post card to Cecil Holifield, Eastland, Texas, and he'll try to answer your questions by return mail. Negotiations were under way this week to obtain H. V. Kaltborn, noted news commentator, for a talk in Eastland on the present threatening world situation.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce would sponsor Kaltborn's talk, in lieu of its annual membership banquet, under present plans. A bid had been made to obtain the Majestic Theatre for the talk, if plans go through.

Kaltborn spoke in Mineral Wells early in World War II, and drew a capacity crowd in that city's large convention hall.

## Outlook Is Called More Favorable For Two Projects

Prospects for two new highway programs in Eastland County improved considerably Monday when delegations from Eastland, Gorman, Carbon and Rising Star presented a united front favoring the projects in a session with the Eastland County Commissioners Court.

One of the highways would be a completely new stretch of road from Eastland to Gorman, shortening and straightening the present route.

The other would connect Carbon and Rising Star, putting a paved road where only gravel roads are now.

At present, in wet weather, a person wanting to go from Carbon to Rising Star is advised by Carbon residents that it is safer to come back to Eastland, then go to Cisco and on to Rising Star, than to tackle the back roads between the two Eastland County towns.

Members of the State Highway Commission long have been interested in getting a direct route between Gorman and Eastland, so as to serve better those traveling on Highway 6, which is a direct route to north central Texas from Waco and the surrounding area.

It was agreed at the meeting Monday to have Fred Brown of Eastland as chairman of the group seeking the new highways, and that probably later an audience will be sought with the State Highway Commission in Austin to press the matter of the two highways.

County Judge P. L. Crossley told the group that although the county is in the best financial condition that it has been in many years, financing the right of way for the highways will be a problem, especially since the county probably will be faced shortly with a demand for right of way for re-routing Highway 80 from Cisco to the eastern county line.

As much as \$300,000 in right of way and fencing costs for all the proposed highways might be sustained by the county without a bond issue, he said, if the people would vote a special 15-cent road and bridge tax.

Judge Crossley, who has been favorable to both of the new highway proposals, said that prospects for them look more favorable than they ever have.

## Eastland Entry In Baseball League To Begin Practice

Eastland will have an entry in the Brazos River League, an amateur hardball group, this spring and summer, with play on Sunday afternoons in Firemen's Park, it was decided at a meeting in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Wednesday night.

The five other towns in the circuit are Strawn, Mineral Wells, Weatherford, Dublin and De Leon.

At the meeting, it was decided to ask local business houses to sponsor the team by buying uniforms and donating funds for initial operation. Gate receipts will be used for later financing, sponsors said, with probable gate charge of 25 cents for children and 50 cents for grown-ups.

First practice session of the new team was set for the firemen's ball park at 5:30 p. m. next Tuesday, with George Par-rack and Willis Smith, temporary field managers, in charge. A permanent field manager will be named later, probably by the team. Anyone interested in playing on the team was invited to the practice.

O. H. Dick was elected business manager, with H. G. Vermillion as assistant business manager, at the Wednesday night meeting.

Buck Carraway, manager, Ben Weekes, business manager, and Bill Williams, assistant business manager, of the Strawn team attended the meeting and explained the workings of the league to the more than 30 men present.

E. M. Pritchard said the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department had agreed to let the hardball team use the softball field and stands, and it was agreed if possible to roof the stands, build an outfield fence, and level the outfield.

Several potential players from Cisco and Olden, as well as a group from Eastland, attended the meeting.

## Eastland High To Enter Baseball Race

Eastland High School will have an entry this year in the district hardball baseball competition, with two games set with each of the other five teams in the district, one at home and the other away from home. Coach Wendell Siebert said.

Home games by the Eastland team are scheduled April 13 with Comanche, April 16 with Gorman, April 23 with Hamilton, May 7 with Dublin, and May 14 with Hamilton.

Out of town Eastland games are scheduled April 20 at Dublin, April 27 at De Leon, April 30 at Comanche, May 4 at Gorman and May 11 at Hamilton.

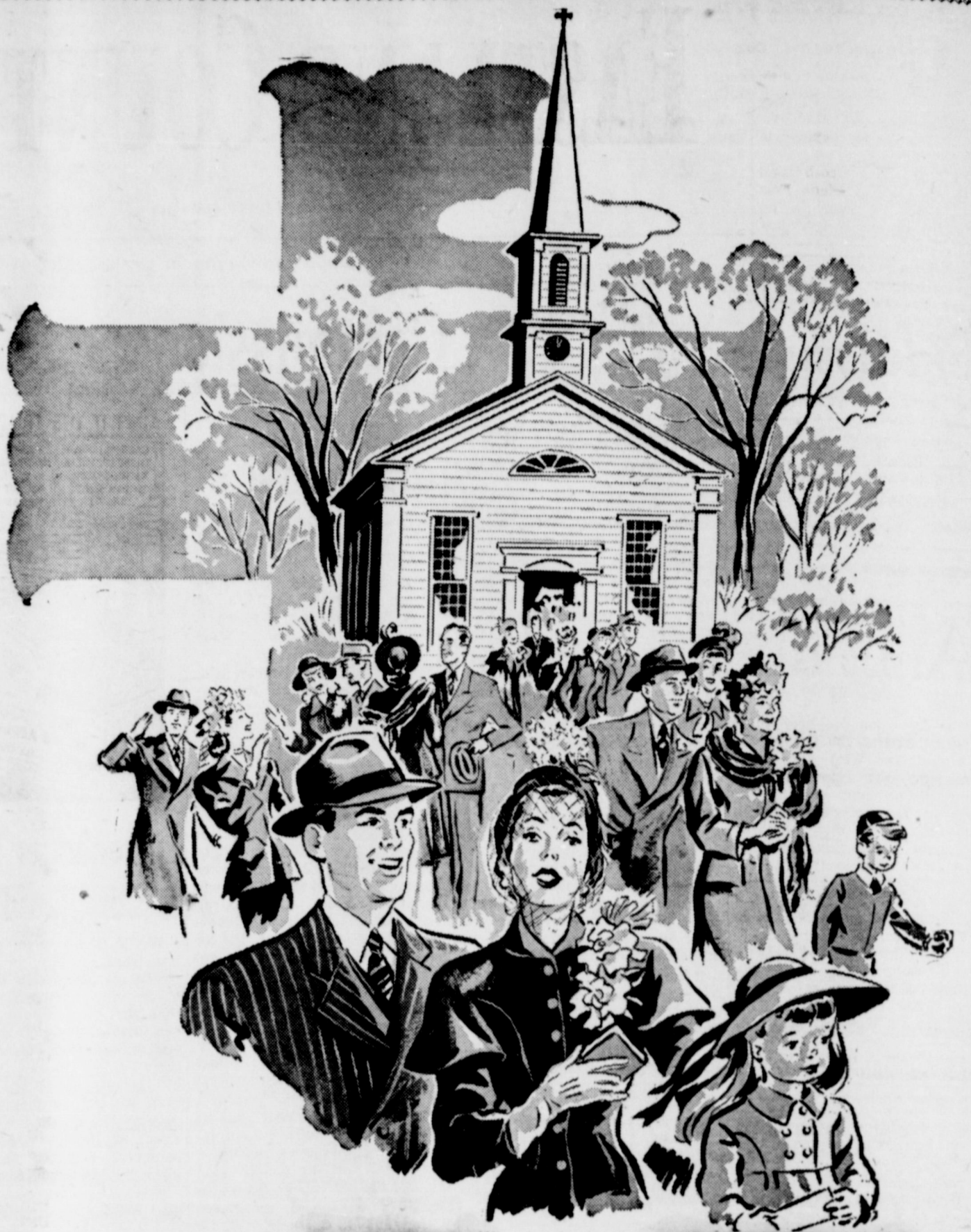
The Olden High School students saw two educational pictures last Tuesday, March 16. They were "Pure Water" and "How Tomatoes were brought to the United States."

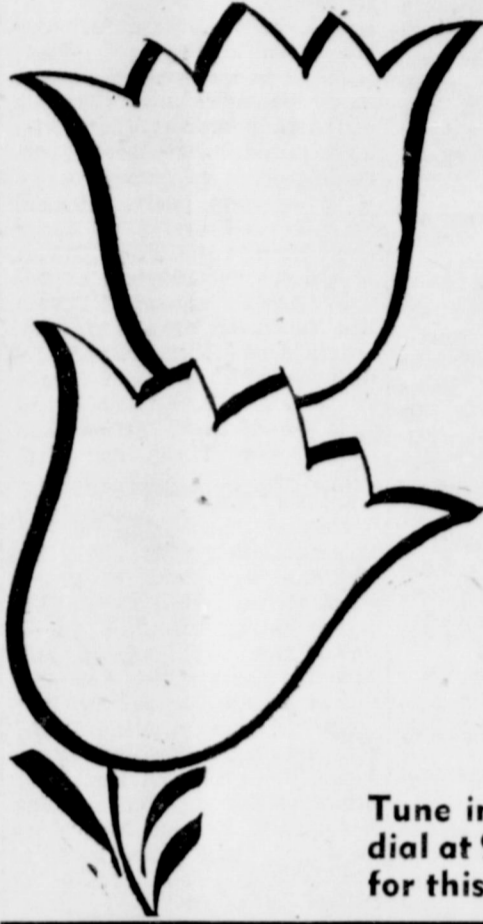

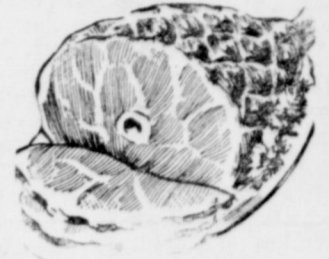

### Two-County Job Figures Compiled

Over 4500 workers are employed in Eastland and Stephens counties on jobs covered by the federal social security program, Ray L. Miller, Dallas regional director of the Department of Commerce, reported. The report made public by the Department of Commerce reveals the annual payroll in the two counties covered by social security taxes amounts to \$6,500,000.

The figures do not include non-taxable wages, nor do they include wages drawn by workers in industries or occupations outside the social security law. (Taxable wages under the old-age and survivors insurance program are limited to the first \$3,000 which a worker received in a year from one employer in covered industries.)

The report was the first made available on social security tax data broken down in detail by states and counties. Miller said the basic data presented in the bulletins are "of prime value in deriving and analyzing market potentials and sales quotas, in the measurement of efficiency and effectiveness of sales operations and advertising efforts, and in the planning of sales territories."

In Texas, 1,224,135 workers are employed in jobs covered by social security. The total pay roll in the state from which social security taxes are drawn amounts to nearly \$2,250,000,000 a year.

The statistics were compiled as a joint project by the Department of Commerce, Federal Security Agency, U. S. Employment Service and other interested government agencies. The information was taken from social security tax reports by 2,254,445 American employers in 1946.

Throughout the nation, almost 31,000,000 workers are employed on jobs which fall under the social security law. Their pay roll, from which taxes were deducted in 1946, amounted to more than \$65 billion dollars.

Of 735 employers in the two counties making reports for social security tax purposes, only one had more than 100 employees from which the tax was deducted, and only nine had more than 50 employees. Six hundred ninety-five employers, or 97 per cent of the total, had fewer than 20 employees.

The reports may be consulted by businessmen at the field offices of the Department of Commerce and at business libraries.

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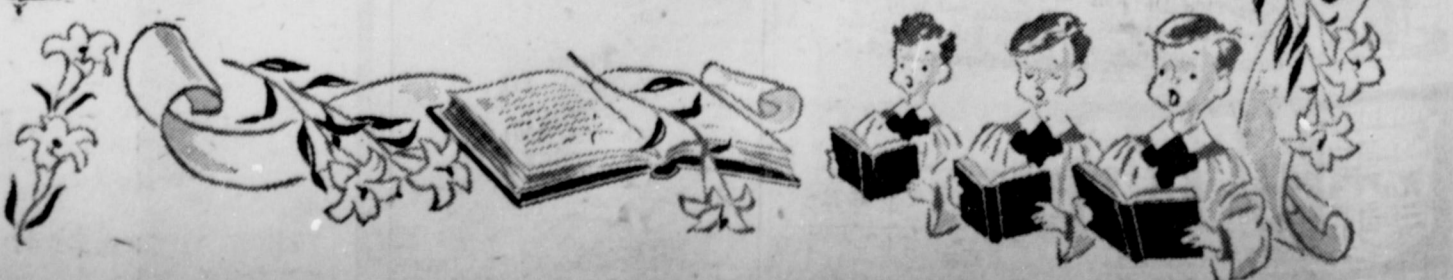

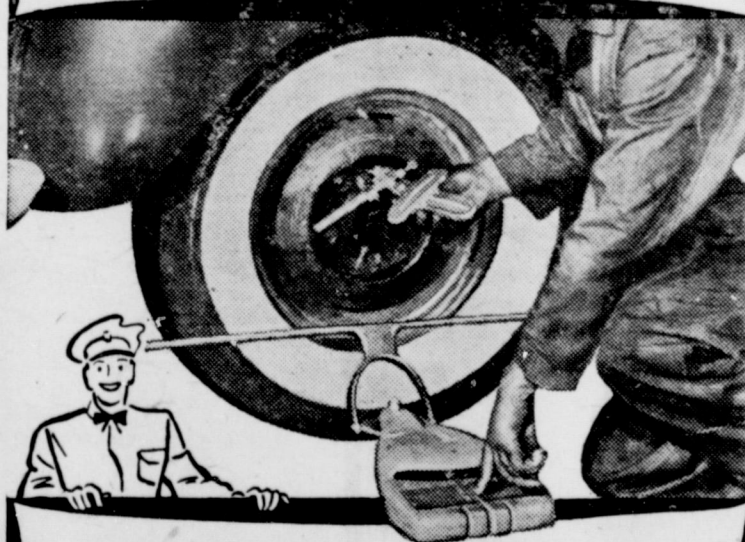

erage farm family, if there is such a thing as an average family, had few of the comforts of civilized life, and when farm children were extremely poorly educated.

That time is passing, what with rural electrification, butane gas systems, rural telephones that tie into the national network, radios, tractors, milking machines and a host of other industrial products available for the farmer and his family, and with rural consolidated schools that offer better educational advantages for the children of farm families.

The important thing is that the farmers are getting more money for their products, and they must continue to do so if the farms of the country are going to appeal to the intelligent young people of the country as a place to live and make a living.

All population figures in the past few decades in America show a slow drift of population away from the farm. And although the mechanization of farming will take care of some of the difference, we still must have people willing to put up with the hard work and long hours of farm life in return for the independence and the financial returns that it can offer.
