He said he does not plan to issue a formal statement at this time.

Oil Outlook Aided As City Leases Land Near Lake

Eastland's budding oil boom, which so far has seen far more talk than either boom or oil, was swelled another degree this week when the City Commission Tuesday leased 355.84 acres of land around Eastland Lake to the Tex-Harvey Oil Company for \$250.

The lease covers a period of 18 months, the company must pay another dollar an acre for the last six months of the lease.

Also provided is that drilling must begin in six months, or the lease is voided. The lease specifies that the test well must be drilled to 4,000 feet, or to commercial oil production, whichever is reached first.

It was reported that the Tex-Harvey concern, represented in the negotiations Tuesday by Arthur Harvey of Dallas, president, had obtained drilling leases also on two other tracts near the lake site, and planned to drill at least three wells in the vicinity.

A representative of the company said in Eastland several weeks ago that it would open an office here in two or three months.

The city's lease covers all of the old Brelsford property obtained for the Lake Eastland site, except that the lake itself was specifically withheld from oil exploration.

While all this was going on north and west of Eastland, rotary bits were gouging hole at the Sharples Corporation's wildcat test a little over three miles south and a little east of Eastland. Early in the week, the hole was below 2,000 feet, and a verdict was expected in about two weeks.

A producer at the well would produce more oil excitement than Eastland has seen in some while, since oil now is bringing \$2.65 a barrel or more, compared with a low of 30 cents or below in the early thirties.

And all the while, there was street talk of wildcats here, there and yonder close to Eastland, while more wells were brought in the new Kirk field near Gorman, production slowly climbed from the new wells north of Cisco.

Funeral services for Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Hirst, 79, mother of Mrs. J. H. Parker, 101 South Oak Lawn Street, and J. O. Hirst, 701 West Patterson Street, were held in the Gorman Baptist Church Saturday afternoon. Burial was in the Gorman Cemetery.

Mrs. Hirst, a resident of Gorman almost all of her life, had been in ill health seven years, and died Friday morning in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Parker.

Rev. Taylor Henley, pastor, officiated at the service, assisted by Rev. Ben Clements of Carbon, an old friend of the family.

Other survivors include two sons, B. A. Hirst of Gorman and J. W. Hirst of Arcadia, Calif., four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Big Fish Planted In Lake By Firemen

The department Tuesday night heard a report on fish that were put in the lake from the Cisco hatchery. Some of the fish were almost big enough to be "keepers" when they were moved, it was said.

Return Of Service Dead To Be Discussed

Two men from the Fort Worth Quartermaster Depot will be in Eastland in the 88th District Courtroom at 2:30 p. m. Friday, May 7 to interview those who are interested in returning the remains of servicemen or civilians who gave their lives in the recent war and were buried overseas, it was announced this week.

Bodies of all who died or were killed overseas between Sept. 3, 1939 and July 1, 1946 may be returned free of charge.

'Butch' Griffin Killed By Train

William S. Griffin, 59, Eastland rancher who had lived here nearly 30 years and was known far and wide as "Butch" Griffin, was fatally injured about 7 a. m. Thursday when his truck was struck by a westbound T. & P. freight engine at the first crossing west of the depot in Eastland.

Mr. Griffin, partially deaf, apparently failed to hear the oncoming train. His family said he was crossing the tracks to go to a pasture he was leasing just north of

Eastland. He lived with his family in an apartment above the Brewer Building on North Seaman Street. His wife is the former Maliqua Kilbourn of Eastland.

Mr. Griffin came here shortly after the first World War, and had ranches out of Eastland since that time.

The freight engine apparently struck the rear of Mr. Griffin's truck, badly damaging the vehicle. He received chest injuries and

his head was crushed. He died about an hour and a half after the accident, in the local hospital.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p. m. Friday afternoon in the Hamner Funeral Chapel, with Rev. L. M. Chapman, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be in the Eastland Cemetery.

Survivors include the widow, Harvey Griffin, a son by a former marriage, his mother, now 80, of Robstown, and several brothers and sisters.

Surplus Bowie Buildings Arrive

Clamping down of the lid on highway transportation of surplus Camp Bowie buildings, effective May 1, hastened arrival in Eastland and nearby towns of many of the big structures this week.

The Pipkin Grocery Company got half of a mess hall, 25 by 52 feet, and will convert it into headquarters offices for the big West Texas grocery chain. The building was set up facing North Seaman Street next to the firm's warehouse, in which offices are maintained now. The new offices will be modern in every respect, with air conditioning throughout, officials of the concern said.

A 25 by 90 foot dispensary building was purchased by Dr. J. H. Caton and Dr. W. K. Cowan and moved to the lot previously purchased by the doctors in the old high school hill block. The structure has 12 rooms and a central heating system. Dr. Cowan said he believed the structure will be ready for occupancy in about three weeks.

The doctors plan to use the building only for office space, since they are quite crowded in their present offices. Dr. Caton said.

Buildings from the camp to be converted into homes by at least six Eastland veterans have arrived. Under sponsorship of the American Legion post, the veterans get the buildings for nothing, but must provide the lot to put them on and make necessary alterations at their expense.

It was said that buildings have been moved in for J. B. Williams, Oscar Avera, Bill Harris, Spike Uffelman, James Reid and Cecil Faircloth.

Others who had applied for allocation of buildings under the program will have to abandon the plan or move them piecemeal, it was believed, unless the highway departments rescinds its order of last week whereby a maximum load width was reinstated on all highways leading from Camp Bowie.

The order goes into effect Friday, and resulted in a steady stream of buildings going through Eastland and other towns of this area all this week.

West Ward Health Round-up Days Set

The annual West Ward School Health Round-up will be held at the school next Tuesday and Wednesday by physicians of Eastland under sponsorship of the West Ward Parent-Teachers Association. It was announced this week.

The examinations, to be held at the school, will include physical check-ups and tuberculin patch tests.

Members of the P-T.A. will be present both days. Boys and girls will be examined at different times.

Earl Conner, Jr., Asks Support In Race For District Judge

Earl Conner, Jr., this week issued his formal announcement of his candidacy for district judge in Eastland County, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

In his statement, Conner said: "In announcing my candidacy for district judge of the 91st Judicial District of Texas, I desire to again express my deep appreciation for having been permitted to serve as your district attorney for several years. The experience received in that capacity, together with my experience in private practice, has, I think, qualified me to hold the office of district judge. I am 43 years of age and have had 17 years' experience in civil and criminal law."

"Many of you will recall that when I made first campaign for the office of district attorney, I advocated that a public official should seek promotion after serving in the same capacity for several years. That was still my belief two years ago when I returned to the practice of civil law in order to further qualify myself for the promotion I am now seeking. I now believe that I am fully qualified to serve the citizens of this county as your district judge; and if promoted to the position of district judge, I assure you that the duties of that office will be discharged in a fair, impartial and conscientious manner."

"It will be my purpose to dispose of litigation as speedily as possible by acting promptly upon all matters presented to the court. I will appreciate sincerely your support."

Highway Survey Of County Asked

Members of the Texas Highway Commission have been invited by the Eastland County Commissioners Court to send an engineer from Austin to this county to lay out a four or five-year highway development program. County Judge Lewis Crossley said this week.

To be considered especially are financial and other needs for such proposed highways as a direct line route from Eastland to Gorman, a road connecting Carbon and Rising Star by pavement, and the extension of the improved Highway 80 through the eastern three-fourths of the county.

Resident Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard said that the project of re-routing and improving Highway 80 west from Cisco to the county line is half complete, and that the contractor, T. C. Cage, will have the pavement laid by Oct. 1, if no hitches occur.

The work will be completed months ahead of schedule.

Since the road does not follow the present route, and the Callahan County part of the new road has not been contracted yet, Pritchard said the new highway probably will not be usable before next summer.

Old Rip V. To Uphold Eastland Prestige

Old Rip V, Eastland's annual entry in the California Horned Toad Derby at Coalinga, Calif., will be sent from Eastland by air express about 10 days before the derby is run May 22.

Last year's entry, Old Rip IV, placed in the third heat of the derby.

Chamber of Commerce Manager said that Carl Johnson, because of his experiences as a trainer of race horses, will train Rip V, with the idea of bringing the derby cup back to Eastland.

Tanner said that Old Rip V has not been selected yet, but that among the native horned toad stock of Eastland County he is sure to find some ambitious, speedy youngster to represent its native town in the West Coast race.

Forger Is Assessed Three Sentences

J. A. Maxwell Wednesday was given three sentences of two to seven years each in the state penitentiary on his pleas of guilty to forgery before Judge George Davenport in 91st District Court. Maxwell was charged with passing worthless checks.

The sentences are to run concurrently. Sheriff J. B. Williams Thursday went to Abilene to return an alleged forger, Luther Pritchard, to Eastland for trial. He was charged with passing a forged check in Cisco.

Celebration Marks Highway Opening

A celebration marking the opening of the new Desdemona-Lingleville farm to market road was held in the Desdemona School gymnasium Friday night of last week, with a large crowd on hand.

Biggest delegations, outside the Desdemona people, were from Stephenville and Lingleville.

The new paved road shortens the paved route from Eastland to Stephenville by many miles.

Attending the fete from Eastland were County Judge P. L. Crossley, District Judge George Davenport, Earl Conner, Jr., and several others. About 40 from Stephenville were on hand.

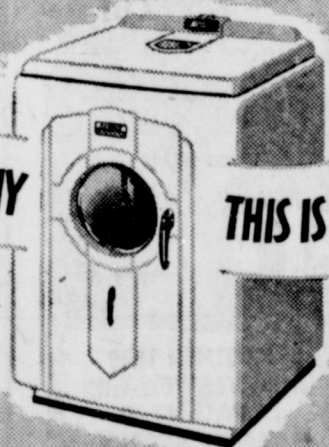

Judge Gray In Race For Appeals Court

Judge Courtney Gray, of Brown County, has announced his candidacy for an elective term to succeed himself as Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, Eleventh Supreme Judicial District, at Eastland.

Judge Gray has a background of thirty years of active practice of law, and at one time was a member of the Legislature from Eastland and Palo Pinto Counties. He served six years as County Superintendent of Schools in Brown County, and four years as County Judge of that county. He also represented Brown and Coleman Counties in the State Legislature.

While a member of the 44th Legislature, Judge Gray secured the enactment into law of a number of important measures, including the Central Colorado River Authority. He helped to frame the constitutional amendment providing for Old Age Assistance, and was a member of the Conference Committee which wrote the law as finally passed. He broke the deadlock on the bill making appropriations for Old Age Assistance, resulting in the beginning of payments twelve months earlier than would otherwise have been the case.

Since retiring from the Legislature, he has written several bills that were enacted into law.

Judge Gray has held his present position as Associate Justice in the Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland since August 24, 1945, and none of his decisions have been reversed on the merits by the Supreme Court. (Pol. Adv.)
