To Give Full-Time **Mechanics Course**

A full-time class in automotive mechanics will be offered in p. m. Saturday. Eastland soon by the Eastland County Vocational School, Coordinator M. H. Perry announced Thursday.

Courses to be offered will be automotive electricity, engine tune-up, carburetor repair, brake ancing, automatic transmission er allied subjects.

The courses will be both for over the matter for some minutes beginning mechanics and those already employed who wish to add to their knowledge and skill, Perry said. Actual work on the job will be stressed, but sufficient classroom periods will be provided so the trainees will learn the reasons to do the things they work at in the shops, he said.

About \$20,000 worth of repair and testing equipment will be on hand for use by the trainees. Instructors in the course are
