OLDEN HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Watch For Insects On Shrubs, Cedars

During the month of June arborvitae, Italian Cypress and similar plants should be examined every few days for cedar bag worms, County Agent J. M. Cooper said this week. When the bag worms are young they are so small and so well covered that they are hard to see. Camouflaging is a fine art these little worms practice right along.

They spin a cone shaped waterproofed bag which they cover with bits of bark and leaves. As they grow larger, they add to their tentlike home. They never leave it, only sticking their heads out-

side and front feet out to crawl up and down the limb to feed on the tender tips of small branches. Eventually they seal this bag over.

The cone shaped cover grows with the insect and may be three inches or longer by August. If sprayed once a week with arsenate lead, they may be killed before they destroy or seriously damage a plant. They must be sprayed before they close the end over themselves, however.

The formula is three table-spoonfuls of arsenate of lead per gallon of water while they are still young. Once the bag is closed, no spray or insecticide can get to the worm.

If the trees are watched closely, only two or three sprayings per year are needed to control the bug and prevent its damage.
