Rains Help Farms, **Put Much Water** In Lake Eastland

The week-end rains that brought 2.95 inches of moisture to Eastcrop such as sorghum and maize, and renewed hopes for a bumper peanut crop.

O'Brien said he figured gave the city possibly a month's additional water supply.

The rainfall itself put only about 15,000,000 gallons of water in the lake, O'Brien estimated, but other benefits include less evaporation in the moister weather following the rain, and much less water use as Eastland residents quit watering lawns and gardens.

Regardless of any factors, the ake water supply should be good until next summer, O'Brien said.

An epidemic of infantile paralysis in Texas more severe than any previously known at this time of the year led Eastland County a plane crash at Ranger, is much and city health officers this week to warn the public to take all possible measures to prevent the disease

City Health Officer L. C. Brown said that the cause of infantile paralysis, or polio, is not definitely known, but had a list of instructions from Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, on how to take all known precautionary measures to halt advance of the disease.

Dr. Brown said he had heard that a polio case had been discovered in Ranger Wednesday and sent to Fort Worth.

Dr. Cox's advice is given in a separate item in today's Record. In a letter to the public of the county, Dr. F. T. Isbell, county health officer, told of the wide spread of the disease in all sections of Texas, and said that 74 new cases reported in the state last week brought the grand total to 502 reported cases. He added that there always are quite a num-

ber of cases not reported. "We do not know the cause of the disease," he said, "but we have a history of the disease for more than a thousand years. This year the disease is running true to form-it makes its appearance in a community, and in the community there seem to be certain 'pockets' which provide more cases than other parts of the community. This leads us to believe that sanitation has a great part in producing the disease.

"To prevent the disease, it is necessary to put on a cleanup campaign and continue the campaign until the disease quiets to its normal numbers.

We should spray our windows and flowers with DDT, and spray all weeds.

"The city can wash out our sewers with oil and kill the mosquitoes (which, by the way, are making their appearance.)

"With complete community cooperation, we can rid our community of mice, rats, flies and all insects in a few days."

Dr. Brown emphasized the importance of cleaning up cow, horse and other livestock and chicken lots every day to keep down flies. Otherwise, he said, DDT spraying will do small good.

A. H. Brown, operator of the spray equipment, said that private garages and barns and other private property can be sprayed with the city DDT equipment if the owner will pay a small amount to meet the cost of the chemicals and expense of running the sprayer.






