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## Rains Help Farms, Put Much Water In Lake Eastland

The week-end rains that brought 2.95 inches of moisture to Eastland, brought smiles to farmers and ranchers all over the county, saved much of the small grain crop such as sorghum and maize, and renewed hopes for a bumper peanut crop.

The rainfall also raised the Lake Eastland level about 15 inches, and City Manager Earl O'Brien said he figured gave the city possibly a month's additional water supply.

The rainfall itself put only about 15,000,000 gallons of water in the lake, O'Brien estimated, but other benefits include less evaporation in the moister weather following the rain, and much less water use as Eastland residents quit watering lawns and gardens.

Regardless of any factors, the lake water supply should be good until next summer, O'Brien said.

The largest amount of runoff and the largest amount of rain came Friday when 1.90 inches fell to put about 12 inches of water in the lake. Monday's rain totaled 1.05 inches, said Weather Observer J. A. Beard, and put another three or four inches of water in the lake.

The rains also filled many stock tanks in the county that had been critically low, started pastures to greening again, although many stockmen had sold out of livestock because of the drought, and saved many a home garden in the county.

## Fox Gives Reason For Staying Out Of Treasurer's Race

In a formal statement announcing he would not be a candidate for re-election, County Treasurer George A. Fox, Jr., this week gave his reason why—another job.

"I wish at this time," he said, "to thank the kind people of Eastland County for the privilege of serving you as your County Treasurer during the years 1947 and 1948. It was my deepest desire to continue serving you, and I fully intended to until Friday, June 18, when I was offered a job that will take me outside more and give me a chance to restore my health. Being in a rundown condition, I feel like I owe it to myself to get outside and try to overcome ailments which as you know were caused by my misfortune in the recent war.

"Again thanking you for the privilege of serving you, and I assure you, every friend I have made is indeed a TREASURE."

Fox said privately that he would take a position with an extension educational institution, after his term expires next Jan. 1.

Seeking his office is Joe Collins, now employed in the office of the county tax collector.

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The question of a hospital for Eastland is still being kicked around without definite results. President L. E. McGraw of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce says that organization never intended to get into the hospital business, and still doesn't. The chamber did set up a committee to work on the matter, he said, but only as a civic gesture, because the officers felt it would give Eastland a civic black eye to be without a hospital of any kind.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Helen Begley, owner of the Eastland Hospital who was quoted in last week's Record as saying that the doors of the institution were closed, called soon after the paper was out to say that two patients had been accepted in the "closed" hospital. Dr. T. E. Payne, former owner of the hospital, had prevailed on her to accept one of the patients, under a plan where the family took care of nursing costs, she said, and another local doctor had also talked a patient into the hospital.

As long as her daughter, Mrs. Mary Lou Bogdan, was at the hospital, Mrs. Begley said, its facilities might as well be used to some extent at least.

## Dairy Group's Membership Rising Swiftly

Membership of the recently organized Eastland County Dairy Association has grown from nothing to 99 members in less than two months, and there is \$118 in the treasury, mostly collected at \$1 per member per year, it was announced at the monthly meeting Tuesday.

Next month's meeting will be held early, on Friday, July 9, in the Agricultural Building at Carbon, to hear G. G. Gibson, Texas A. & M. College Extension Service dairy specialist, talk on artificial insemination, it was announced.

Invitation to meet at Carbon was extended by L. R. Higginbotham, secretary of the association and veterans' vocational agriculture teacher at Carbon.

The Carbon meeting will be at 8 p. m. Anyone interested in the dairy industry was invited to attend.

At the Tuesday meeting in the County Courtroom in Eastland, the association paid tribute to County Agent J. M. Cooper for his work on behalf of the association, and recorded a vote of thanks to the Eastland Chamber of Commerce for the recent barbecue held for dairymen and other interested persons.

A constitution was adopted at the meeting, providing among other things that "the membership of this organization shall consist of those who own or manage one or more dairy cows and others who have an interest in promoting the dairy industry of Eastland County and vicinity," and who pay the \$1 annual membership dues.

Aims of the association were set out as:

1. Improve the quality of dairy herds by setting up an artificial insemination program in the county and vicinity.
2. Encourage balanced and economical dairy rations.
3. Improve the market for dairy products.
4. Encourage use of standard milk ordinances in towns.
5. Encourage herd testing for Bangs disease.
6. Assist in development of dairying among 4-H and F.F.A. boys.
7. Co-operate in holding an annual Dairy Show in Eastland.
8. Maintain interest by holding an annual Dairymen's Field Day.

The group elected H. G. Vermillion, publisher of the Eastland County Record at Eastland, as reporter to succeed T. M. Wadsworth, who has taken a job as vocational agriculture teacher in Perrin High School in Palo Pinto County.

### Patterson Quits Judge's Race To Safeguard Health

Burette W. Patterson, former Eastland judge who had announced his candidacy for district judge this year, announced Monday that he was withdrawing from the race, to safeguard his health.

In a statement, he said, "Having announced my withdrawal from the race for district judge, I feel an explanation for my doing so is due the people of this county.

"Before becoming a candidate for this office, I had a thorough check-up by a Fort Worth clinic to ascertain if my age and physical condition was such that I could make this race without jeopardizing my health. The report from this clinic to my local physician recites, among other findings, 'Physical examination reveals a well developed, well nourished, exceptionally well preserved man of stated age in no acute distress. . . . I endorse the judge continuing in active practice and entering the race for judgeship if there is no active campaign involved. . . ."

"Anticipating that the campaign would not be a strenuous one, I announced my candidacy. An unusually diligent campaign for this office has since developed, and it is now apparent that the chances of my being nominated will depend largely upon my engaging in an active and persistent campaign for the next 30 or 60 days. To do this, according to the advice of my physicians, my present good health would be jeopardized and it might be seriously and permanently impaired. I regard the hazard to my health too great for me to follow through on these conditions—hence my withdrawal.

"The voluntary and gracious manifestations of their loyalty to me and their support of my candidacy for this office by so many of my friends will ever be among the most pleasant memories of my life. For this, as well as for the several political honors accorded me by the people of Eastland County in the past, I am indeed grateful."

Judge Courtney Gray of Brown County, has announced his candidacy for an elective term to succeed himself as Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, Eleventh Supreme Judicial District at Eastland.

Judge Gray has a background of thirty years of active practice of law, and at one time was a member of the legislature from Eastland and Palo Pinto counties. He served six years as County Superintendent of Schools in Brown County, and four years as County Judge of that county. He also represented Brown and Coleman counties in the State Legislature.

### Advice Given On How To Avoid Polio Infection

Following are actions advised by Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, when infantile paralysis is prevalent:

When suspicious symptoms (headache, undetermined fever, vomiting, drowsiness, stiffness of neck or back) appear, a physician should be called at once.

Sudden chilling and over-exertion should be avoided.

Elective surgery involving the nose and throat should be postponed.

Good personal hygiene, especially of children, is very important at all times.

Children should avoid crowds and sick persons when poliomyelitis is prevalent.

Individual home sanitation should be perfected to include approved water supply, waste disposal and proper control of insects, especially flies and mosquitoes. Raw fruits and vegetables should be cleaned well before using. Garbage containers should be covered at all times.

Community sanitation should be rigidly controlled the year around, with sanitation measures taken to safeguard water and sewerage systems, proper garbage disposal, supervision of food handling, elimination of flies, mosquitoes, rats and mice, and the safeguarding of milk supplies.

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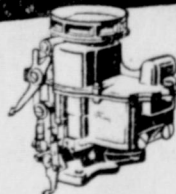

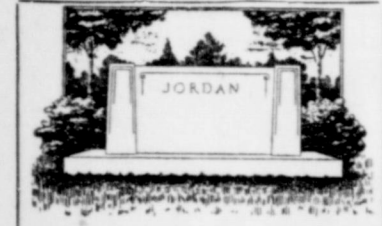

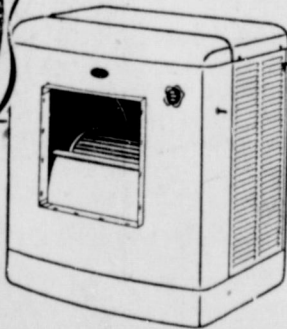
