Purchase of a DDT fog sprayer to get rid of mosquitoes and flies, and help fight the infantile paralysis menace in Eastland, was considered by the City Commission at its meeting Thursday night of

But the commission came up with its usual problems-no money

Members of the commission decided that the city, which is operating on borrowed money now against anticipated tax revenue, could put up a limited amount, perhaps \$400 or \$500, on the pur-

But the balance of the money needed, an estimated \$1000 to \$2.-000, depending on the type of sprayer purchased, would have to come from other sources.

Commission members felt that perhaps individuals and civic organizations would help raise the balance of the sum needed. The city would purchase the DDT spray, and would furnish labor to operate the sprayer, it was said.

Curtis Koen told commission members that he had found swarms of mosquitoes around the city dump, possibly hatching in water in tin cans there, and ofon the dump, covering the refuse with dirt. He estimated the job would take about 100 hours of bulldozer work, and offered to do it for \$900, contributing \$100 toward the job.

However, the commissioners said they didn't have the \$900.

## Moisture Makes Farm Outlook Best In Years

Farm and ranch propects in Eastland County, extremely poor until the recent rains, now are the best in several years, farmers, ranchers and agricultural offi-

cials said this week. The rains came too late for vetch seed, for small grains such as wheat and rye, and for some

early planted corn. But they were just right for peanuts and for late planted corn, and for truck crops that were

withering on the vine. And they brought new life to brown and seared pastures. Joe Manning of Banner Creameries said Monday that most of the milk producers delivering to him had an extra can of milk every day beginning last week end, the result of greener pastures for graz-

The rains, general over the county, assured a good crop of peanuts where the planting was early, and at least a fair crop of

late planted nuts, farmers said. County Agent J. M. Cooper said farmers told him that their early peanuts would make a good crop without more rain, and their late peanuts would make as good a crop as last year, or better, without any more moisture

A Morton Valley stock farmer said his sorghum cane was suffering badly when the rains came, but that now he expected a bumper crop, and the same held true of grain feed crops all over the

Farmers were busy this week fighting weeds and grass that sprung up during the wet weather, and watching clouds form that

held promise of more showers. The rains were worth a whole lot more than the traditional mil-Ward stores in Texas and that had apparently been threatening to turn to dust and blow
